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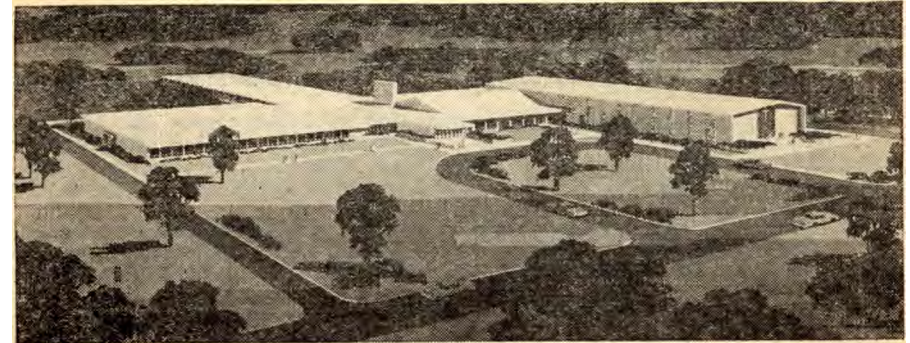

## LET'S BE STYLISH, BEAUTIFUL BUT DECENT

Summertime is, in a sense, a time of dangers from temptation, occasions of sin, bad example and scandal. Extremely dangerous at this season is the impropriety in feminine attire so widespread today.

Indecent dress is, of course, not limited to any particular season. A woman may wear an indecent formal (strapless or with a plunging neckline) to a wintertime dance, just as a girl may indecently expose herself in a summertime swimsuit. But the fact remains that there is a growing wave of immodesty in dress which degrades womanhood and leads to a breakdown of public morals. Objectionable fashions range from the daring to the downright indecent. Health is certainly not the goal of these styles, since overexposure to the sun has been listed as a possible source of cancer. Some women and girls, in their determined effort to be smart, alluring and attractive, have resorted to wearing any daring style, without considering the sinfulness of their actions and without realizing that the very men they sought to impress have formed a low and degrading opinion of them.

Factors in the trend toward indecency in feminine dress have been the high-powered advertising in fashion and picture publications and the decollete styles flaunted by television and movie actresses. So pronounced have these violations of decency been that youths and adults are faced with the grave danger of warped and erroneous consciences about this important matter. Christian modesty demands, under pain of sin, that dress be such as to conceal and in **no way** emphasize the parts of the *body* which, if revealed or suggested, are an occasion of sin to normal individuals.

Many girls and women feign wide-eyed innocence when they are reproved for wearing indecent attire. Let them remember that the suggestive display of their bodies will cause a chain reaction in the normal male: the indecent look, the indecent thought, the indecent desire, the indecent act. Many an innocent victim, an elderly lady or a little girl, has been outraged by someone whose emotions were incited by the sight of an improperly clad female. It's just like throwing a lighted cigaret from a moving car into a dry and parched forest. The person who threw it may be miles away when the raging forest fire destroys lives and property.

There are 2 ways in which we can help to overcome this menace to morals. 1) Develop in each of us the desire to live and fight for Christian principles of modesty and decency. 2) Stimulate a great enough demand for modest and attractive clothing so that retailers will find it necessary to provide stylish, beautiful and decent clothing for all.

## FEAST OF ST. JAMES—JULY 25th

Saint James the Greater (so called because he was taller in stature than the other Apostle James) was the son of Zebede and Salome, and the brother of St. John the Apostle and Evangelist. He and John were humorously called "sons of thunder" by our Lord. By trade a Galilean fisherman, St. James was one of the very first Apostles to be selected by Jesus. He was one of the select three, Peter, James and John, who were privileged to witness Christ's Transfiguration and His agony in the garden of Gethsemane.

Saint James was the first of the Apostles to give his life for his Master, being beheaded by order of King Herod Agrippa at Easter-time in the year of 43. Before his death he had made a journey to Spain, where he preached the gospel of Christ, and where he is honored as the Patron Saint of the nation. Compostella in Spain has a great shrine in his honor. It is said that, for fear of the Arabs who were in control of Jerusalem, the body of the Saint was transferred to Compostella, and that this transfer took place on the 25th of July; hence his feast is celebrated on this day.

## THIS WEEK WITH CHRIST

Monday: Feast of Saint Praxedes

**Tuesday:** St. Mary Magdalen, whom Jesus converted, and who witnessed His last moments in company with Mary, His Mother, and St. John, the beloved disciple, was from the town of Magdala in Galilee. She is identified as the penitent woman who washed Jesus' feet with her tears and dried them with her hair.

Wednesday: Saint Apollinaris, a disciple of Saint Peter, became Bishop of Ravenna. He underwent great sufferings for his faith.

Thursday: Commemoration of St. Christina, is an ordinary weekday.

Friday: St. James the Greater was one of the three Apostles chosen by Jesus to witness His Transfiguration and His agony in the garden of Gethsemane. St. James was beheaded by Herod.

Saturday: St. Anne, mother of the Blessed Virgin Mary and grandmother of Jesus Christ, is great in the sight of God because she was a virtuous mother.
