Historical society volunteers will sell homemade cookies and a historical society calendar during the event.

"Around 1,500 people walk through the door each year, which adds up to about 750 kids," said Elaine Simpson,

village clerk and chairperson for Lollipop Lane. Simpson is also a Wheeling Historical Society director.

Decorations inside the community center, which used to be a church, include a penguin display, Christmas trees, old tovs and more.

"It is an old-fashioned

setup," Simpson said. "It looks like you are in a Winter Wonderland. When the trees are lit and everything, it looks very special."

Volunteers from the historical society and Wheeling Park District spent time this week hanging decorations. They also help bring in children

during the event and get them situated, Mr. and Mrs. Claus are also volunteers with the Wheeling Historical Society.
