

## Original village hall houses Wheeling's past

t first glance, the intersection of Dundee Road and Wolf Road in Wheeling appears to be just another example of suburban sprawl. The gas stations, video stores and strip malls don't really distinguish the area from any other.

But just around the corner, at 251 N. Wolf Road, is the Wheeling Historical Museum, where visitors can retreat in time to see what life was like in Wheeling at the turn of the century and earlier. Wheeling's roots date back to its first settlers in 1833.

"Believe me when I say that Wheeling has changed very much over the years," said museum curator Betty Barrie, who moved to Wheeling when she was 2 years old in 1921. "We've gone from being a farm town where people grew their own vegetables to a full-fledged suburb of Chicago. At the museum we try to show people what life used to be like around here."

The white frame building at the west end of Chamber Park, which now houses the museum, was the original village hall. It was built in 1895 at a cost of \$553.26, which included two jail cells. It also was a meeting place for village trustees, a police station and a courthouse, which explains the jails. It was moved from 84 S. Milwaukee Ave. to its current location in 1978.

One highlight of the museum is the many framed black-and-white photos. Wheeling family doctor Henry A. Benz's Old English home, Earl Johnson's Wheeling Filling Station on Milwaukee Avenue, Aug Pieper's Blacksmith & Horseshoe Shop, and Fassbender's Ice Cream Store at the corner of Milwaukee Avenue and Dundee Road are all preserved through photos. Two miniature displays illustrate "Doctor's House Call" and "General Store."

A menu from the old Hartmann House Restaurant on Milwaukee Avenue brags about an "Extra thick T-bone steak" for a whopping \$2.

"Wheeling has always been known for its fine restaurants," Barrie said: "Going back to the 1920s and 1930s, people would come to Wheeling restaurants from Chicago and the North Shore. Of course, that tradition still exists today."

A speed limit sign from 1904 warns operators of motorized vehicles in Wheeling that they risk fines of \$5 to \$100 if they exceed the 12 mph speed limit. And the limit drops to 4 mph when turning corners. Other



a memorabilia includes an Improved New Goodrich footpedal sewing machine, an antique switchboard once used by Wheeling telephone operators, old-time phones and items from local fighting men, including World War I mand II uniforms and other artifacts.

There are also a number of antique school desks and classroom photos, like Mrs. Holt's Wheeling School class from 1910. And a list of rules and regulations from 1872 illustrates how times have changed in 120 years.

A teacher's duties back then included, among other things, cleaning the chimney and hauling water. Male teachers were allowed one evening each week for courting purposes, but getting a shave in the barber shop "gives good reason to suspect his worth, intention, integrity and honesty." And a teacher who "performs without fault for five years will be given a raise of 25 cents per week."

Along with the regular displays, there are rotating exhibits, depending on the time of year. February means "Valentine's Day Memories" and June is "Wheeling Weddings."

"We try to keep things fresh. People who visit us often appreciate that," Barrie said. "We're always looking for ideas for rotating local exhibits, in case anyone has any suggestions."

And local archives are available, including old village documents, newspaper clippings and postcards, and photos of Wheeling homes and businesses, for residents interested in local history or charting their family tree.

There are two other historical structures at Chamber Park. Sicks Carriage House, which was built in 1892, houses an antique Wheeling fire engine and a variety of agricultural implements. It's open some Sundays, depending on the availability of volunteer help. And the original Wheeling Presbyterian Church, which was erected in 1865, is used for Wheeling Park District pre-school classes, historical society meetings and other events. Wheeling Historical Museum meetings are held the fourth Wednesday of the month in September, October,

November, January, March and April. A potluck supperand auction is held each February, and the annual banquet is in May. Yearly museum events are "Lollipop Lane" for children in December and the "Old Settlers' Picnic" every July.

#### Graham Streussel Coffee Cake

350 Degree Oven 13 X 9 pan greased 1 box yellow cake mix (18+ oz. size)

1½ cups Graham Cracker Crumbs 3/4 cup chopped nuts (optional) 3/4 cup Brown Sugar 1½ tsp. cinnamon 2/3 cup oleo - melted

Method - Mix streussel and set aside.

Prepare cake mix per directions on box. Pour ½ of batter into prepared pan. Sprinkle ½ of streussel mix over batter. Spread remaining batter over the portion in the pan. Top with remaining streussel mix.

Bake 35 to 40 minutes.

When cool top with powdered sugar glaze. I cup powdered sugar, 1 tsp. vanilla. Warm water to mix.
