

L HOUSEHOLD HINTS

- Revarnishing with a small soft lint-free cloth is twice as fast as using a brush. You can rub in any direction, and the varnish goes into the wood better. There will be no splatters and no brushes to clean out. Throw the rag away if it gets too dirty. Use rubber gloves or clean your hands with paint remover.
- ✓ Use a coffeepot brush to clean your sewing machine. It will be long enough to poke into even the farthest recesses and narrow enough to fit into those thousand-and-one crevices where lint clings.
- Put whole cloves in pockets of woolen coats or in bags with sweaters when storing for the off-season. They prevent moth damage and leave a spicy aroma. Also place them in dresser drawers with socks and veryday work clothes.



COCONUT CUSTARD PIE

1 9-inch unbaked pastry crust 2½ cups milk ½ cup Domino® Granulated Sugar 3 eggs 1½ teaspoons vanilla extract ½ teaspoon salt ¼ teaspoon ground nutmeg 1 cup shredded coconut Sweetened whipped cream

In bowl, combine milk, sugar, eggs, vanilla, salt and nutmeg. Beat well to blend. Sprinkle coconut into pastry shell. Pour egg mixture over coconut. Bake at 425°F. for 20-25 minutes or until knife inserted in center comes out clean. Cool. Serve garnished with whipped cream. Yield: one 9-inch pie.

A DOG RETURNS HOME By Palmer Keil November 22,1982


In February 1934, former Wheeling Village Trustee and Fire Chief Walter Piefer, died of severe burns received in saving his garage building on North Milwaukee Avenue when his tow truck caught on fire. One of his prize possessions was a beautiful German-Shepard Dog, named Max, who was a constant compani9on of August Piefer, Walter's father, and they both could be seen riding around town in a model A Ford.

Nine months after Walter Piefer's death, Max disappeared. Many attempts were made to find this pet, or his b dy, but all to no avail.

Three years later a Tri-City Taxi stopped at the Piefer residence and the driver explained to Mrs. August

Max checked over the house and the people and showed he was glad to be home by lying at the fee to August Piefer perfectly content. From there on the people of Wheeling could again see August and Max riding around just like in former years.

No reason was ever found why the dog was taken, or by whom, or why he eventually was returned.


One old school picture and a picture of homes on Willie Ave. across from the old school in 1928 with a group of dancers in the foreground received from Virginia Meier.
