Egg Cup seasoned bread crumbs 1/4 Cup chopped onion 1/2 tea salt 1/2 tea pepper 1 1/2 pd lean ground beef 1 Cup (4 ounces) Pepper Jack or Monterey Jack cheese shredded and divided.

In a large bowl, combine egg, bread crumbs, onion, salt and pepper. Crumble beef mixture and mix well.

Press half of the beef mixture into bottom and halfway up the sides of a greased 8 inch x 4 inch x 2 inch loaf pan.

Sprinkle 3/4 cup cheese over meat to within 1/2 inch of sides. Pat remaining beef mixture over cheese.

Bake uncovered at 350 for 50-55 minutes or until meat is no longer pink or a thermometer reads 160.

Sprinkle with remaining cheese. Bake 5 minutes longer or until cheese is melted. Let stand for 10 minutes before slicing.
