The Wheeling Historical Society would like to take this time to congratulate the Wheeling Park District for the following:


At the State Conference of January 30, 2008 Wheeling Park District was formally acknowledged and presented with the IAPD/IPRA Distinguished Agency Award.

A Bit of History

For more than 100 years, Wheeling has been known as a good place to get a good meal.

Today, more than 30 restaurants serve up everything from French gourmet to pizza. You can spend \$150 for dinner for two at Le Francais or about \$2 for a burger at McDonald's. Or, somewhere in between, you can spend \$10 to \$20 for a steak or seafood at Billy and Company, or \$3.50 to \$11 for "family style" at Hackney's.

Like Brookfield's zoo, Wheeling's restaurants are the main attraction of the community.

"The restaurants really are what has put Wheeling on the map," says Jack ie Pollack, executive manager of the Wheeling Chamber of Commerce. "They are a fine tradition that continues today. People are willing to travel here from other suburbs because of the quality" of the restaurants.

Wheeling's restaurant tradition actually is closely linked to travel.... The horse and buggy travel of the late 1800s between Chicago and Milwaukee or the resort lakes of southern Wisconsin. A small community of Wheeling at the crossroads of Milwaukee Avenue and Dundee Road was about half way to Wisconsin on the Milwaukee Avenue route.

Road houses, where travelers could rest and eat a midday meal, sprang up. Most began in private homes where offering home cooked meals to travelers became a farm family's means of earning extra money.
