Businesses Past and Present

Come reminisce with us, while we talk about the old businesses in Wheeling. Bring photos if you've got them! You know you've lived a long time in Wheeling if you can remember Bodel Cleaners, the old post office, Mama D's Pizzeria, King Midas Barber Shop

Wheeling Days was an annual summer celebration sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce and the Volunteer Fire Department. The proceeds went to support local charities and for civic improvements.

In Wheeling Through the Years, Lorraine Haben explained this event as, "the biggest thing in the summertime ... Everybody worked together. The whole town would work together. We would fry millions of hamburgers, and we would make hot dogs for weeks ahead."

"We had one dear old lady whose name was Mrs. Miller. We called her Red Miller because she had red, curly hair. She would spend all the Friday before Wheeling Days cutting onions, and I never knew how that woman could do all that without crying tears.

Wheeling Days was something like the Familyfest they have now. They had Bingo and different games and races for the kids. You met a lot of people you didn't see all year and some of them had moved away and would come back. It was kind of a get-together. I think it was in July, but not on the 4th. It was a weekend. That was always something to look forward to, something like a family reunion in a way.

The Chamber of Commerce bought coal for a needy family. The first car that we bought to raffle at Wheeling Days was \$600." Referring to the old ledger book, Lorraine pointed out that, "Here in 1938 it shows we paid \$604.14 for the Chevy. The ledger shows where they gave money to the school. They bought nuts and apples at the Royal Blue store to distribute to the children at Christmas. Here is the entry, April 24, paid to Frank Forke for funeral for the Gluecks' child: \$15. March 4. Emil Geest for coal and W. Pieper's flowers.



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Wheeling School District for gas (they must have paid for gas), \$19.34. It is interesting, how the town took care of the town, more or less."

John Forke said, "Everybody came from miles around and we had a lot of fun. Kind of like a carnival. All the folks in town would help out and the proceeds went to needy kids, or some other cause. We would raffle a car, but the law came in and we couldn't do that any more. There were about three years in a row when we could have slot machines in town, but then they got raided. At that time they were allowed for the Wheeling Days. Incidentally, the gymnasium at Walt Whitman school was paid for by the Chamber of Commerce during Wheeling Days. They raised \$8000 and that was a lot of money."

Walter Diens summed it up when he said, "I think your Wheeling Days were really a lot of fun. I remember Marge Schmidt cooking hamburgers all the time. And then they found somebody didn't pay off the right person and they confiscated the wheel and the gambling. Somebody broke the windshield of the sheriff's squad car, and somebody let the air out of the tires. Somehow we managed to get the wheel back, but we couldn't operate it. Those were good old friendly days. A lot of friendly people — you knew everybody at the Wheeling Days." *

Grilled Chicken Salad

1/2 Cup mayonnaise or salad dressing

- 1/4 Cup honey
- 2 Tbsp lemon juice
- 3 whole large chicken breasts (3 lbs. total), skinned, boned, halved lengthwise, *or* 1-1/2 lbs. skinless, boneless chicken breasts
- 3 medium apples, cubed
- 1-1/2 Cups sliced celery
- 1/2 Cup chopped walnuts
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1/8 tsp pepper
- Lettuce leaves

For dressing: in a small mixing bowl combine mayonnaise, honey and lemon juice. Cover and refrigerate until serving time.

Rinse chicken and pat dry. Place chicken breasts on the cooking grill.

Grill 10 to 12 minutes or until tender and no pink remains, turning once halfway through grilling time.

Cool 20 minutes or until cool enough to handle.

Cut chicken into 1 inch pieces. In a large bowl, toss together chicken pieces, apples, celery, walnuts, salt and pepper. Stir in dressing.

Serve in lettuce-lined salad bowl. Makes 6 servings.
