Pool Opening Makes Big Splash

And that's the way it was Sarurday, June 12th, at Wheeling Community Pool when it opened for the 1965 awim season. In spite of a cool breeze, the pool was well populated during the afternoon by early purchasers of season passes and daily fee L. D. cards.

Clearning of the pool and readying of filter equipment was done by volunteers Al Martin, Frank Wojek, Vern Schuler, and Merle Willis, all members of the Board of Directors of the pool, the week prior to the opening. Members of the Board, all of whom serve without pay, were hosts Friday evening to pool bondholders for a pool-side presentation of this year's plans and personnel and a brief look at the fusancial picture.

This year's pool director is Richard Schuler; concession manager is Elroy Schuler (to quote Richard: "so relation, but I like the name"), Hoad instructor is Kathy McCall; guards are Betty Lawrence, Penny Scanlon, John Bauer, and Robert Schuler. Mary Kay Myera and John Kunowski are this year's locker room attendants.

Treasurer Oscar Tarelman stated the pool would need

Treasurer Oscar Tatelman stated the pool would need a gross income of about \$20,000 this year to meet operating expenses, pay bond interest, and make hoped-for improvements such as landscaping of the area southeast of the bathbouse to provide picnic facilities.

Handling of the concessions by the pool association is expected to yield two henefits, better service and a higher return to the pool than the machines previously used offered. Sugar Bowl toe cream will be available in cones, sandwiches, and bars. Non-carbonated grape and orange drinks, coffee, bot dogs, and candy bars will complete the hill of fare.

Friday evening teen-parties are again being contemplated with games, prizes, and dancing to live combos. Board members at Friday Night's meeting included Vice-President Audrey Christianson, Secretary Donia Nystrom, Treasurer Oscar Tatleman, Personnel Manager Frank Wojek, Pool Director Vern Schuler, and Construction and Maintenance Supervisor Merle Willis. President James Stavros and Building and Groomds Supervisor Al Martin were usable to attend because of previous commitments.




