## Rain-Rain Go Away

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The Wheeling Historical Society and Museum celebrates the link between the past and the present. The museum is a cooperative effort of the Village of Wheeling, Wheeling Park District, Indian Trails Public Library.



A major point on Wheeling's historical timeline occurred today, April 10, 2017 – the new and improved library at 355 Schoenbeck Road opened to the public at 9am. After a 2011 referendum passed, community focus groups contributed feedback to help us plan our new library. A 12-month construction project began in April 2016.





The library still boasts a healthy collection of books, but now offers more study space, a computer training lab, an ESL study lab, special areas for early learners and middle schoolers, and a makerspace (wondering what that is? Come on in and learn about this creative space!) and media studios.

Since you are reading this Newsletter, you have an interest in history. Do you have any old negatives, VHS movies or Super8mm movies from your family's treasure trove? In a few months, we will have equipment to transfer your memories to digital format. On the 2d floor, we have a dedicated research terminal for genealogy and local history. You will soon be able to peruse old issues of the Wheeling Independent newspapers from the 1950-60s; to get a glimpse of Wheeling as a growing community.



One of our visitors this morning said he remembered the library when it was located behind the Union Hotel on Milwaukee Avenue. He was awestruck by the new library – we hope you will be too.

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# COOKS CORNER

# **Tuna Casserole**

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#### Casserole:

- 2 tbsp butter, plus more for baking dish
- 1 (12-ounce) bag or 4 cups egg noodles
- 16 oz yellowfin or albacore tuna in oil rained
- 10 ounces frozen peas, thawed
- 3 cups shredded sharp Cheddar cheese
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1/2 teaspoon whole dried thyme

1/2 cup chopped onion

Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper

- 8 ounces baby bella mushrooms, sliced
- 4 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1 tablespoon prepared horseradish
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1 1/2 cups chicken stock
- 1 pint heavy cream

### Topping:

- 3 cups panko breadcrumbs (Japanese)
- 3 tablespoons olive oil

### For the casserole:

Preheat the oven to 375 degrees F. Butter a 13- by 9-inch ovenproof dish or lasagna dish and set aside.

Cook the egg noodles in salted boiling water according to package directions for al dente, about 8 minutes. Drain and immediately place the noodles in a large bowl filled with ice to stop the cooking. Once cooled, drain and then pour the pasta into a large bowl with the tuna, peas and both cheeses. Toss to combine.
