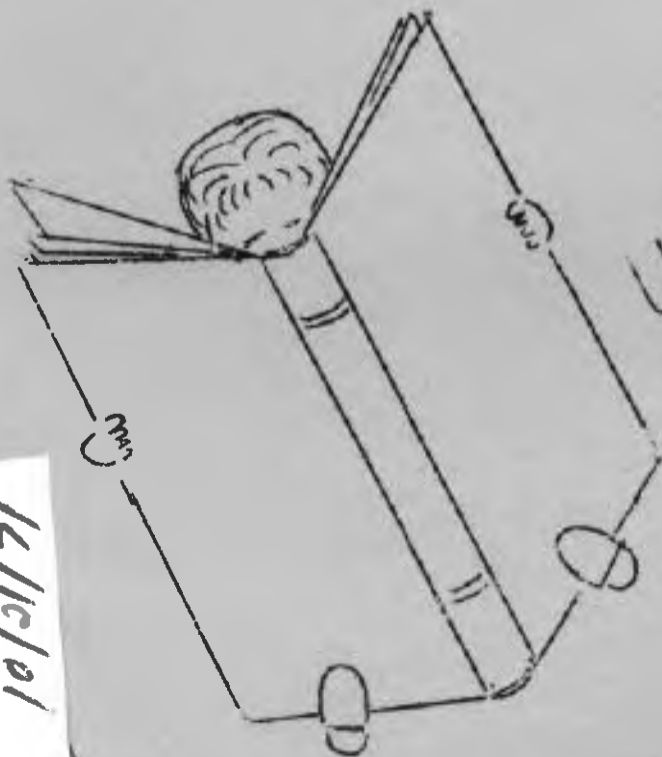

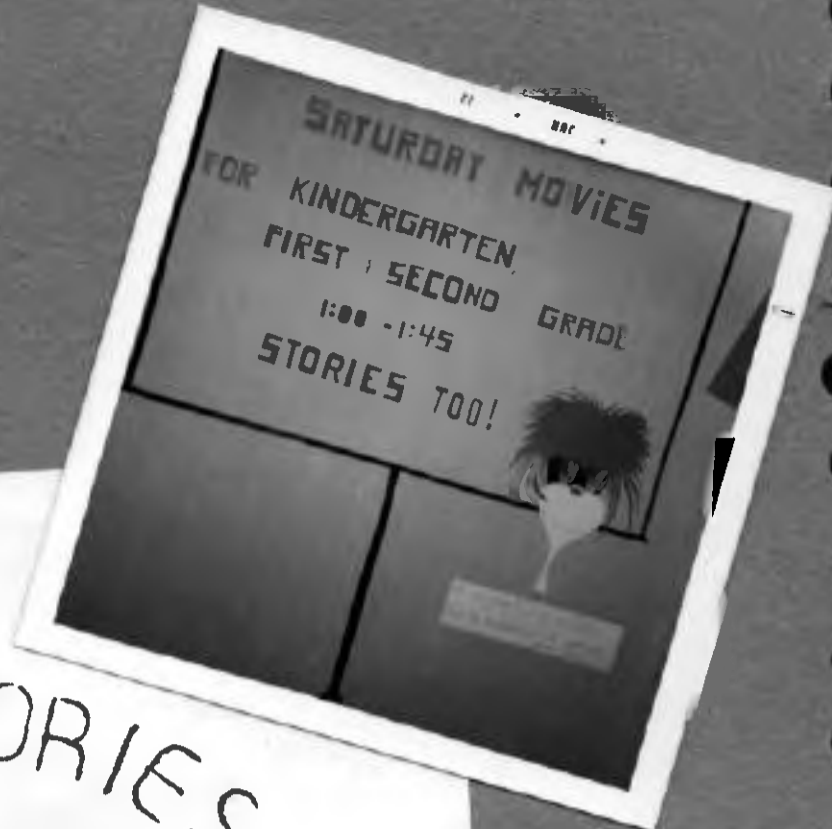

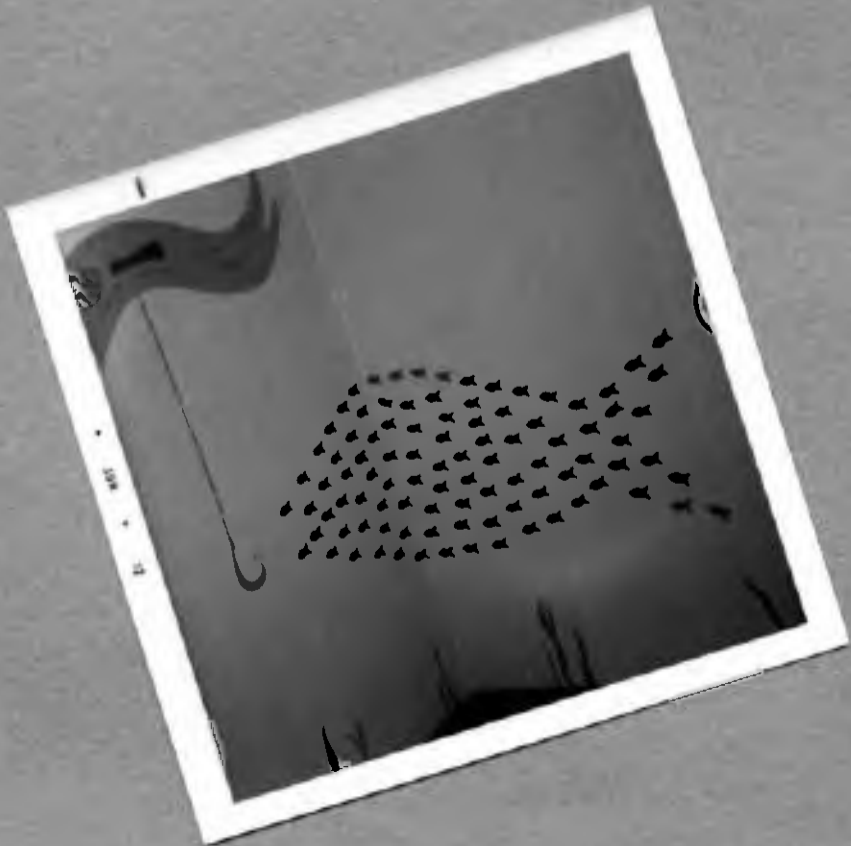

(appropriate motions)

It's dark, better be careful,

Better look around, better be quiet.

STORY-TELLING

WHEELING PUBLIC LIBRARY DISTRICT

Choosing material

Characteristics of a story good for telling:
strong and dramatic plot
clear-cut image from each incident
focus of attention in opening sentence
economy of words--but language strong and meaningful
worthwhile idea--a story worth telling over and over
for young children: repetitive phrases
interesting sounding words

Characteristics of a picture book good for presentation:
above characteristics plus strong, vivid pictures

Qualities of finger plays, songs, and other action activities:
give the children a chance to truly participate
release the children's energy and excitement

How to

Do: be friendly
speak clearly
hold interest by "catching" each child's eye -
use few "he said; she said"
show you enjoy your story
bring out the atmosphere of the story, the distinguishing
words and phrases
PRACTICE telling the entire story, visualizing events,
scenes, tastes, etc.
for young children: cut out unnecessary
descriptions and skip
unessential pictures

Don't: tell too long
admit blunders--instead patch up and go on
talk "down" to children
interrupt story for lengthy explanations
say "listen" repeatedly
be too dramatic
interrupt to discipline a child unless absolutely
necessary

Use:
pauses: before important words or ideas for suspense or
emphasis; before change of ideas; before (and
after, sometimes) to set off speeches of
different characters
change of pitch: for different characters, for
indication of sadness (falling) and joy (rising)
change of speed: for emphasis or sadness (slower);
for expression of joy or climatic event (faster)
all of these to build conclusion

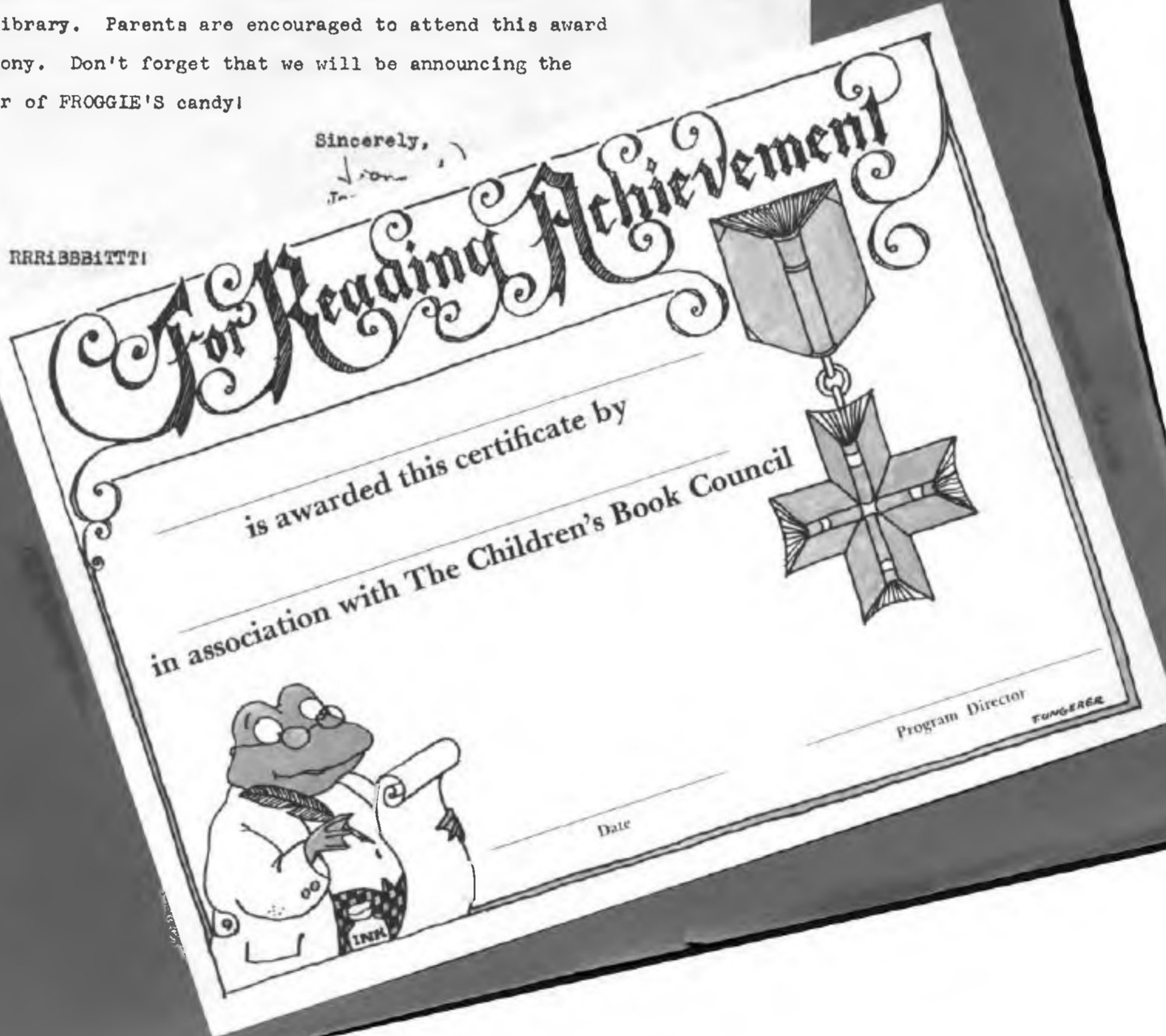

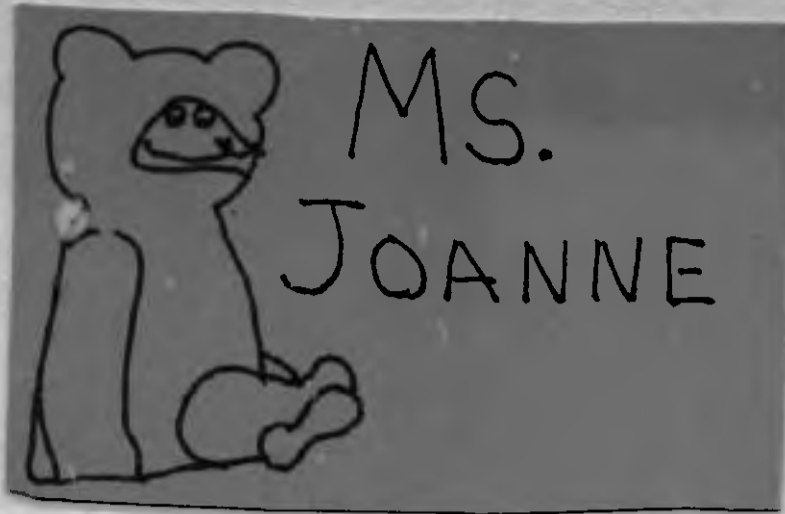

While there is no fee for the five half-hour sessions, registration is required. Librarians are now taking names for either the Tuesday or Wednesday programs.



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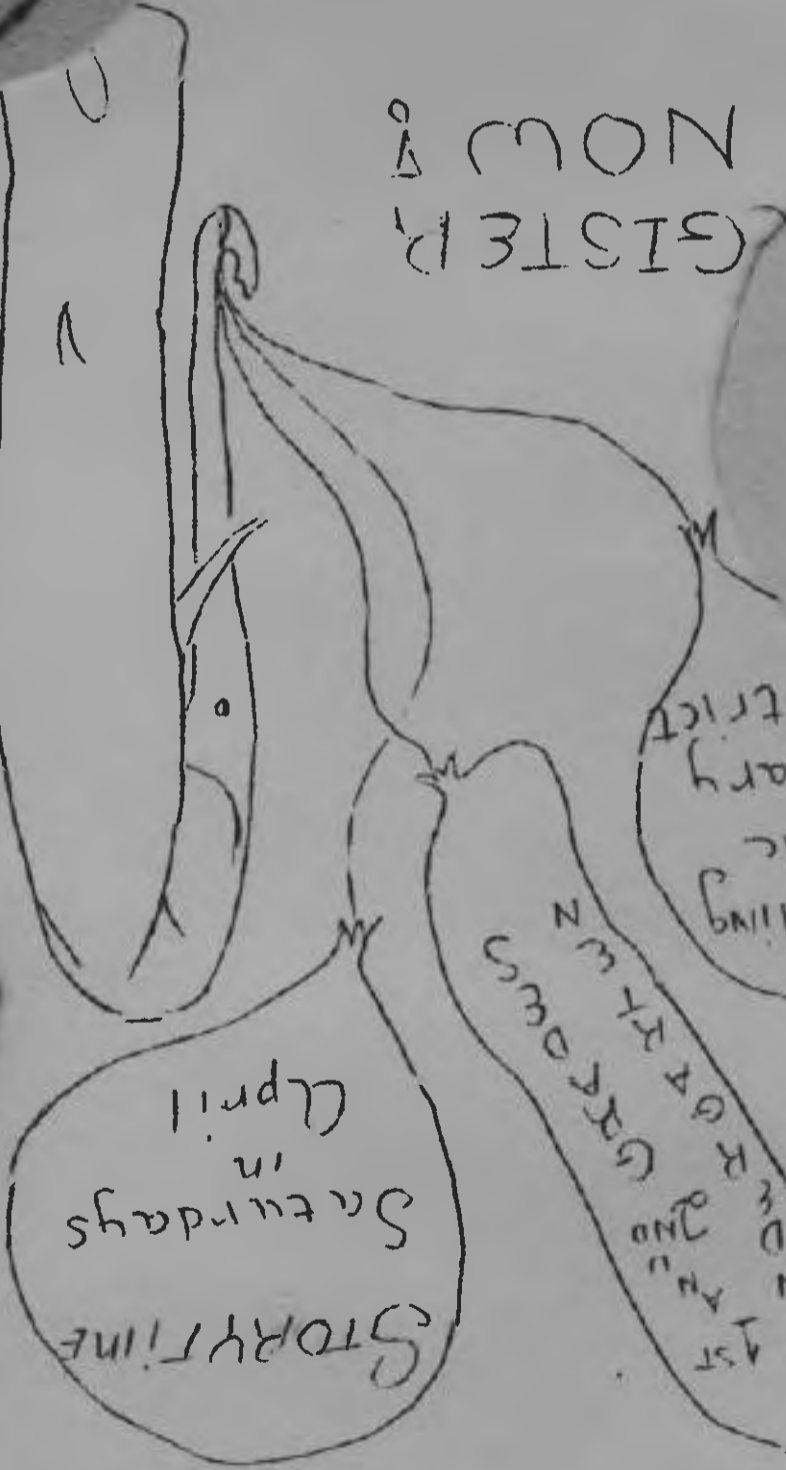

The Library Scene

Students Help Prepare New Posters, Albums

Joanne Nykiel, Children's Librarian of the Wheeling Public Library District, has kept her staff and the Technical Processing Department and a group of junior high students busy getting ready a number of new records and a large selection of colorful posters for circulation as of June 1.

The school children have met at the library for several weeks, helping to choose the new additions to the children's collection. The posters are of all sizes and subject matter and, mounted on durable board with hangers, they may be taken home to brighten up a bedroom (or whatever) and exchanged after three weeks for a different picture. One to a customer, please.

The Circulation Department is gearing up for the extra work involved in any new venture, and for the traditional increase in books borrowed during the summer vacation months. Periodical counts of circulation figures show an interesting and consistent pattern for the days of the week and the months of the year. Mondays and Tuesdays remain the busiest days of the week, diminishing from Wednesday through Friday and climbing again on Saturdays. The monthly graph shows the colored

line dipping to a low low in December because of the Christmas holidays, upwards through April, down again in May and up to its greatest peak in July and August. The super-imposed lines would be a hopelessly unreadable tangle except that, since the library was started, each year's overall circulation has been higher than the last.

Because of the lower numbers of library users at the end of the week, and to ease staff schedules during busier times, the Board of Trustees of the Wheeling Public Library District have decided to close the library on Friday evenings at 5 p.m. from June 15 through Aug. 31. This is just for the summer and we hope few people will be inconvenienced.

The last in a series of three movies shown at the library was "King Kong," which never seems to lose its thrilling appeal. Because of the 7:30 p.m. show time, the audience included many youngsters seeing the monstrous gorilla for the first time. Squeals of delighted terror, added to the sound track, lured curious library users to the doorway of the board room to see what was happening. When it became a bit stuffy in the crowded room, our man in charge of turning on the air conditioner had to wend his way carefully through fingers and toes, since many were sitting on the floor, but nobody seemed to mind the close quarters.

If you have attended some of these movies, you may have

noticed the same man operating the projector. He is Wallace Olson, currently the treasurer of our board of trustees and a film buff of long standing. He happily donates his time and expertise to the job.

In the event that Mr. Olson might not be able to appear, several ladies on the staff have been taught to run the movie machine. One beginner threaded the film right, but watched for the picture to come out of the wrong end; another, after previewing "Mr. and Mrs. Smith," was haunted by the possibility that she had put the reels back in the wrong numbered cans. She called from home and said that if, at the beginning of reel 2, Carole Lombard and Gene Raymond were not still suspended in mid-air in the seat of a broken-down parachute ride in the pouring rain, something was wrong. Her fears were unfounded, however; the film itself is clearly marked, leaving nothing to chance or amateurs.

Our upcoming summer series of films will include "Kind Hearts And Coronets," July 10; "Phantom Of The Opera," July 17, and "Lavender Hill Mob," July 24.

Remember also that 16 mm. movies, such as those mentioned, and many others of different lengths and topics, may be borrowed by any adult with a Wheeling Public Library District card and a projector. No films are owned by this library, but are available from a central audio-visual service, free except for a 50 cents insurance charge per film.

They're great for home entertainment, club meetings and children's parties. Sorry, the films may not be borrowed for school classroom use.

Librarian's material-scrap puppets delight children

Give Randee Hudson a few scraps of material and some yarn and she'll return a full-fledged puppet personality.

Mrs. Hudson, children's librarian and in-resident puppetmaker at the Indian Trails Library, Wheeling, has been perfecting her craft since last December.

"I had never done anything with puppets before I came here. I've gained a lot enthusiasm just working with the puppets and children," she said.

MRS. HUDSON SAID she is a self-taught puppetmaker who gained most of her training through instructing children at the library's puppet workshops.

"To teach them how to make puppets, I had to learn. I'm usually one day ahead of the children for the six-week session," she said.

Mrs. Hudson has limited herself to the basic types of puppets and admits

to "lifting" characters from fellow librarians and puppeteers. One character — a curious rabbit who loses his head from too much snooping — is "based on a story I learned from another librarian, who learned it from a puppeteer," she said.

"I whipped him up one night while I was watching television," Mrs. Hudson said.

DESPITE THE simplicity of her creations, the children react to the puppets as if they were living beings.

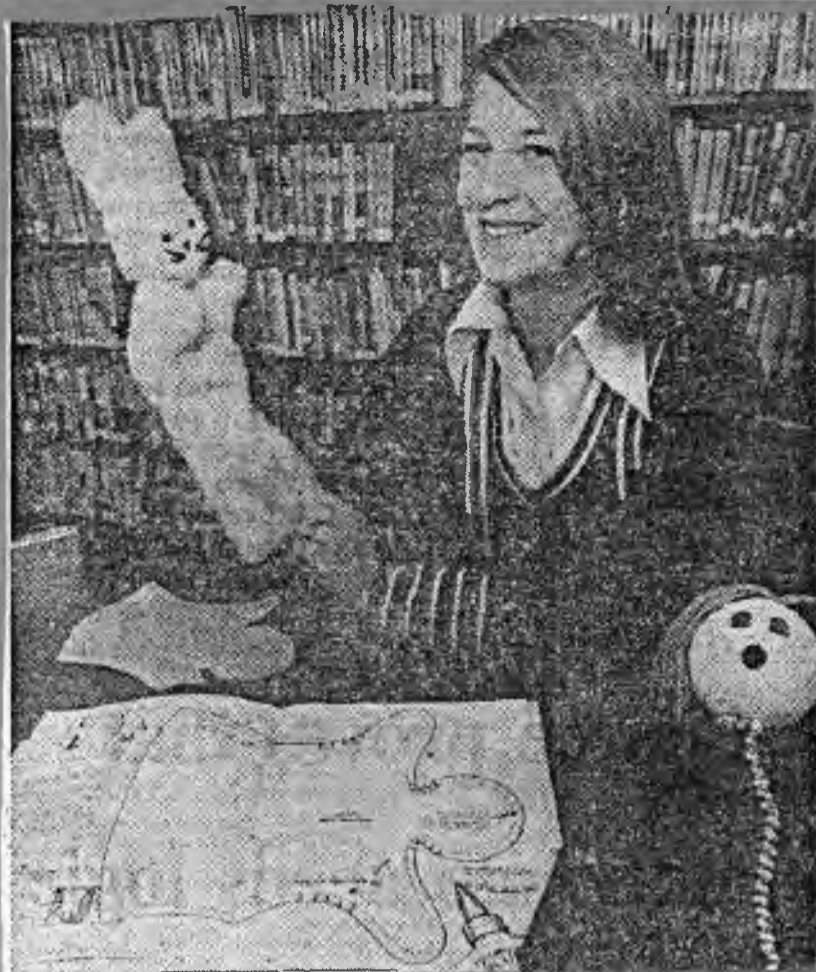
"To me, a puppet looks like a toy — it doesn't really do anything. But the children think of them as little individuals. They respond to puppets as if they're real living creatures," Mrs. Hudson said.

Puppets can be used as an educational tool because children do respond to them, Mrs. Hudson said.

"Many teachers come to us saying a child needs motivation. The child

Alsbury, Virginia: Something New From Illinois Bell

The workshop will show you how to make, create, lead and incorporate simulation games into social studies. This game is designed for sixth grade text but the concept can be applied to all grade levels.

Cerman, Jack: Jack vs. Stem

Watch the science match of the year when Jack Cerman matches wits with the most difficult experiments in the stem science series. Experiments will be selected from each grade level for this hands-on experience. Mini lessons will be developed around each experiment. The program will also include a display of science supplies and a demonstration of new science materials. Don't miss this spine-tling workshop.

Everything You Wanted to Know About the District, But you Didn't Know Who to Ask.

Section 1: Jim Gochis (Business Manager) and Bill Senne (Director of Operations) will answer questions about any aspect of the school operation that they can. (For example, insurance, how things get fixed, your pay, credit union, how materials get purchased, how come you aren't supposed to adjust your thermostat, etc.

Section 2: Ken Gill and Marge Beu will answer questions about anything in the world. Questions can be submitted directly or anonymously. This session was very popular at the last inservice day.

Section 3: John Barger, Larry Weaver and Jerry Kiffel will answer your questions. John is Associate Supt.; Larry is Ass't. Supt. for Administration; and Jerry is Ass't. Supt. for Support Services. Come and find out what all three think about education.

Gilmore, Mary: Metric System

Materials, ideas for classwork and worksheets will be available. Basic explanation of metric terms will be presented. You will have the opportunity to do estimation and linear measurements using metric tape measures. Filmstrips and tapes that we have in the District will be set up for individual use.

Gilmore, Mary: Math Diagnosis and Placement

Have you ever wondered how other teachers decide where to place students in math? Is there anyone who individualizes a math class and gets all the record-keeping done? What about a student who comes in the middle of the year ... Who has a good idea for his placement? Let's share ideas.

Hokanson, Irene: New Bilingual Staff Orientation Workshop

The workshop will encompass a presentation of the goals and objectives of the Bilingual Program. Bilingual teaching materials will be previewed and teaching ideas distributed.

Hudson, Randee: Storytelling! Puppetry! Book Talks! Bicentennial Programs

Randee Hudson will present samples of these and other programs which she will offer to District #21 teachers and classes this year. Randee Hudson, children's librarian at the Indian Trails Public Library.

Jarvis, Kathy: Kindergarten Music Workshop

This workshop will explore various music techniques which will help the kindergarten teacher be more effective in the classroom.

This workshop will include a review of materials currently available on the market, a demonstration of various methods of teaching music, and some ideas to help solve problems encountered in teaching kindergarten music.

Various alternatives to traditional methods will also be discussed and the emphasis will be on participation by the teachers to learn these techniques.

This workshop should be especially helpful to kindergarten teachers with no music background; however, those teachers who play the piano should also benefit from the discussion, demonstration and displays. 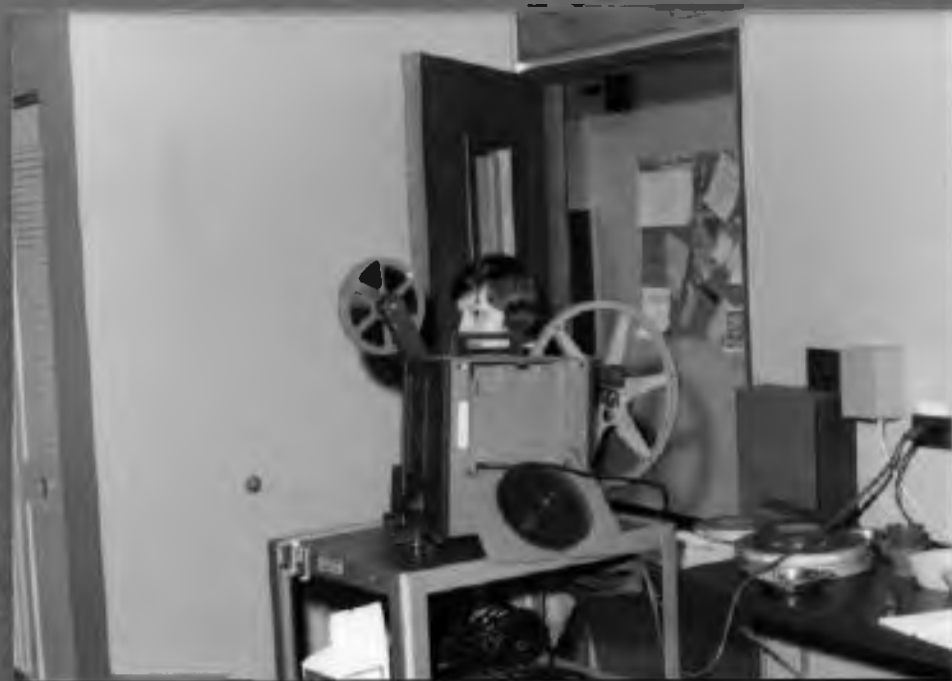
PARKING FACILITIES:

STORYTIME



INDIAN TRAILS PUBLIC LIBRARY PRESENTS SPRING STORYTIME FOR THREE AND FOUR YEAR OLDS

Storytime is great fun for us and will be for your child. Some information can enable you to help your child get the most from this situation. We intend to enjoy various library experiences with your child, not to teach him school skills.

PROCEDURE: Each child is greeted and given a name tag. He/she can then find a place on the "story rug" and join in the pre-storytime finger games. Each session is officially begun with the hello song. Storytime usually includes three stories or picture books interspersed with songs and action rhymes. Often a movie, flannel board story, or record is added. After the good-bye song your child will go downstairs to meet you in the children's department. You and your child may want to browse through the picture books at that time.

SUGGESTIONS: Storytime is a new situation to which each child reacts differently. No one way is correct. Your child may cry, walk around, or sit under the table. Just give us all time to get used to each other and the storytime surroundings. Mothers may not be present during storytime sessions because this makes the children self-conscious. We do ask that you remain in the building and make it clear to your child that you will be downstairs to meet him/her after storytime. Please encourage your child to select only two books each week as there are over 350 children using the picture book collection during storytime.

Lists of the stories, fingergames, and songs that are used will be available at the end of the session so you can share these with your child at home.

NOTE: The four storytime sessions work together as a unit so it is quite important that your child attend each one. Please inform us if your child will be absent.

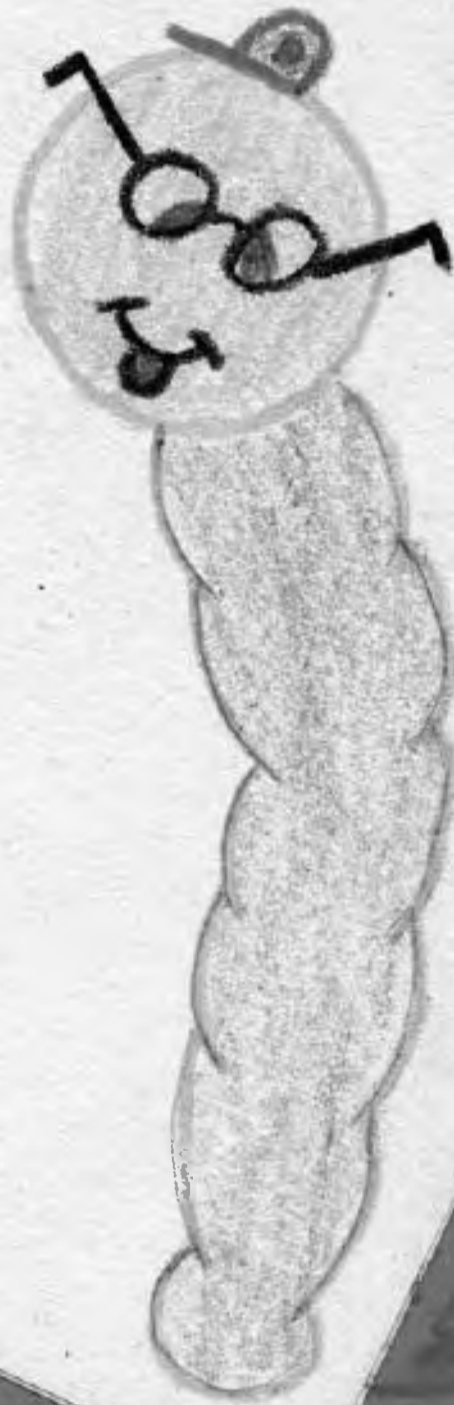
