RULES OF ORDER

[NOTE.—In the absence of other rules of order the following may be adopted and used to advantage by local camps.]

1. Opening the Meeting of the Camp.—The time of opening the Camp at its regular meetings shall be at the hour fixed by the By-Laws of the Camp. Special meetings shall be opened at the time fixed in the call therefor.

2. Officers and Members must be Seated.—When the Oracle takes the chair the other officers and members shall take their respective seats.

3. Decorum in Camp.—No member shall disturb another in his or her speech unless to call to order; nor when a member is speaking pass between the speaker and the chair nor leave the hall.

4. Decorum in Debate.—Every member wishing to speak shall rise and respectfully address the chair, and wait for recognition. Members speaking shall confine themselves to the question under debate, and avoid any personalities, indecorous and sarcastic language, as well as any reflection upon the Camp or its members.

5. Oracle Shall Decide Who is Entitled to the Floor.—If two or more members rise to speak at the same time, the Oracle shall decide which is entitled to the floor.

6. Members, How Often May Speak on Question.—A member shall not speak more than once on the same subject or question until all other members wishing to speak shall have had an opportunity to do so, nor more than twice without permission from the Oracle or a vote of the Camp, which vote shall be taken without debate.

7. Officers and Members Shall be Addressed by Proper Title.—Every member speaking shall designate the officer or member addressed or spoken of by proper rank and title, according to his or her standing in the Society.

8. Member May be Called to Order, When.—It shall be the duty of the Oracle and the privilege of any member of the Camp to call a member to order who violates an established rule of the Society.

9. Member Shall be Seated When Point of Order is Being Decided.—If a member, while speaking, be called to order by the chair, the member shall cease speaking and be seated until the question of order has been determined and permission is given to proceed.

10. Questions of Order, Decisions on, and Appeal Therefrom.—The Oracle shall decide all questions of order, which shall be final unless an appeal therefrom is taken to the Camp by a member, when the question before the Camp shall be: "Shall the decision of the chair be sustained?" The Oracle shall have the privilege of giving the reasons for her decision, after which the question shall be put and decided without debate.

11. After Question Stated by Chair, Debate in Order.—No motion or question shall be subject to debate until it has been seconded and stated by the chair, and it shall be reduced to writing if desired or requested by an officer or member.

12. Question May be Divided.—Any member may call for a division of a question, which shall be divided if it comprehends two or more distinct propositions.

13. Amendments, When in Order.—An amendment destroying or altering the intention of a motion shall be held to be in order; but an amendment not germane to the question or relating to a different subject, is not in order.

14. Privileged Questions, When are and Order of.—When a motion or a question is before the Camp no other motion or question shall be in order except, first—to fix the time to which to adjourn, second—to adjourn, third—to take a recess, fourth—to raise a question of privilege, and fifth—to call for Orders of the Day; which motions shall severally have precedence as herein arranged, and the first three shall be decided without debate.

15. Adjournment, When in Order.—A motion to proceed to close (adjourn) is always in order, except, first, when a member is in possession of the floor; second, when the yeas and nays are being called; third, when the members are voting; fourth, when "closing the Camp" was the last preceding motion (no intervening business having been transacted); or fifth, when it has been decided that the previous question shall be acted upon.

16. Question Indefinitely Postponed Cannot be Acted Upon.—When a motion or question has been postponed indefinitely it shall not be acted upon again during the term.

17. Division of Vote, When May be Called.—The Oracle or any other member doubting the decision of a question may call for a division of the Camp and count of the affirmative and negative votes.

18. Previous Question, How and When Called—Procedure.—On the call for the previous question, any two members may call it, a two-thirds vote of the Camp is required. The form may be "Shall the main question be now put?" And until it is decided, all further amendment or debate is precluded. If it is decided in the affirmative the vote shall be taken without debate on the amendment pending in their inverse orders, and then on the main question.

19. Blanks, How Filled.—When a blank is to be filled, and different sums, numbers or time shall be proposed, the question shall be taken first upon the highest sum or number, and the longest or least time proposed.

20. Members, Unless Excused, Must Vote.—Every member present shall, if requested, vote upon any question before the Camp, unless he or she is excused by the Camp, or disqualified by the By-laws of the Society from voting on the question.

21. Reconsideration, When May be Moved and by Whom.—No motion for reconsideration of a question shall be received unless made by a member who voted with the majority in the first instance, but may be seconded by any member. The motion must be made at the present meeting or the next regular meeting following the one at which the question was voted upon.

22. Chairman of Committee, Who to be.—The member first named on a committee shall act as chairman thereof until another is chosen by themselves.

23. Committee May be Discharged, When.—A committee shall not be discharged until all the debts contracted by it have been paid.

24. Personalities, What Are.—The consequence of a measure may be condemned in strong terms, but to arraign the motives of those who propose or advocate it is a personality and against order.

25. Decorum While Oracle is Speaking or Putting Question.—While the Oracle is putting the question or addressing the Camp no member shall walk about or leave the hall, or entertain private discourse.

26. Oracle Shall Put Question—Procedure.—Before putting the question, the Oracle shall ask: "Is the Camp ready for the question?" If no one rises to speak and the Camp is ready for the question, the Oracle shall rise and put it. After she shall have arisen and put it, a member shall not be permitted to speak upon it.

27. Motion Shall Not be Made, When.—No member shall be permitted to make a motion while another is speaking, and no motion shall be recognized unless the member shall have arisen and addressed the chair.

28. Members Entitled to Speak, When.—No member shall arise to speak until the one occupying the floor shall be seated, and if the member wishing to follow has spoken on the question twice, the member shall not be recognized by the Oracle until others who desire have had an opportunity to speak.

29. Before Speaking, Members Must be Recognized by Oracle.—No member shall commence speaking upon a question until recognized by the Oracle.

30. Visiting Member May Speak on Question, When.—A member from another Camp may be allowed to speak upon any question under discussion by permission of the Oracle or of the Camp.

31. Member May Be Admonished or Disciplined, When.—Any member who shall misbehave in the Camp or disturb the order and harmony thereof, either by abusive, disorderly, or profane language, or shall refuse obedience to the Oracle, shall be admonished for the offense from the chair, and for second offense shall be excluded from the meeting of the Camp and afterwards dealt with at the pleasure of the Camp.

32. Rules May be Suspended, When.—Any of these rules may be suspended by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting at any session, or by a unanimous consent.

33. Construction of By-laws of Society, Applications for, How Made.—Whenever any question shall arise in the Camp as to the proper construction of any provision of the By-laws of the Society, the same shall, if the Camp desires, be referred to the Supreme Oracle for interpretation. All decisions of the Supreme Oracle upon such questions so referred shall be entered upon the minutes of the Camp.

INSTRUCTIONS

When recording the proceedings of the Camp—generally called "Camp Minutes"—care should be taken to record the Minutes according to the following Order of Business:

1. Regular opening.
2. Introduction of visitors.
3. Roll call of officers.
4. Reading, correcting and approving the minutes.
 - (a) Minutes of last regular meeting.
 - (b) Minutes of special or adjourned meetings.
5. Applications for membership and referring same to Investigating committees.
6. Reports of committees.
 - (a) Relief committee.
 - (b) Other standing committees.
 - (c) Special committees.
 - (d) Investigating committees.
7. Balloting on applications.
8. Reception of candidates.
 - (a) Transfer.
 - (b) Social and beneficial.
9. Reading and disposing of bills and accounts.
10. Reading and disposing of communications.
11. Unfinished business.
 - (a) Draping of Charter.
12. New business.
 - (a) Election of officers.
 - (b) Installation of officers.
 - (c) Password drill.
13. Does anyone present know of a Neighbor or Neighbor's family in need of sympathy or aid?
14. Recorder's report of receipts since last regular meeting.
15. Receiver's report of disbursements since last regular meeting.
16. Good of the Society.
17. Officers retiring march.
18. Regular closing.

In the back part of the book are several ruled pages, for the purpose of recording matter which cannot conveniently be entered on the "minute" page, viz.:—Written reports of committees, camp officers, resolutions, etc. At the time such reports are submitted to, or acted upon by the Camp, the same should be properly indexed by recording the number of the back page used, on the minute page where the subject matter relating thereto is recorded.

In the front part of this book pages have been provided for recording the attendance of officers, together with proper directions for their use.
