Here's Late Summary In Bribe Controversy

Reporters for Paddock Publications have been investigating the alleged bribery conspiracy in Wheeling since the nature of the case was disclosed Monday.

The following sidelights are published for the first time:

-Fred "Scotty" Cargill, village --Fred "Scotty" Cargill, village trustee named in the complaints, strongly suspects his political enemies of "trumping up" the charges. "A reporter for a metropolitan daily was waiting at the police station when I was arrested," he pointed out. "Who tipped her off in advance!"

—At a village board meeting August 3, 1959, accused trustee Edward Gieseke Jr. voted "yes" on a motion to discuss a Holland re-subdivision street base irregularity with Frank J. Budnick, owner of the property. Trustee Cargill did not attend the erty. Tr

-On October 12, 1959, three days after

the bribe was alleged to have been paid. Cargill and Gleseke both voted "yes" proposal to allow the Holland street improvement plan to go ahead.

-Baymond L. Willer, 311 MacArthur, Mt. Prospect, who works for Budnick and paid the Union hotel bill, told reporters he made the payment "be-cause, at the time, it seemed like the only course to take in order to get the streets approved."

-Assistant state's attorney Eldred Benz said Budnick and Willer volunteered their statements in February, and that the case has been under investigation ever since. The accusations, therefore, were made more than five months after the first alleged bribe solicitation.

--Willer said he had "no comment" when asked it influential Chicago politicians, had attempted to get the assistant state's attorney to drop the charges.

The Cook County grand jury reportedly this week returned a "no" bill in the conspiracy and bribery charges involving two village trustees and a restaurant owner.

Cleared by the grand jury were Fred "Scotty" Cargill, Edward Gieseke Jr., and Frank Miramonti, a partner in the Union Hotel.

The grand jury's action--or rather, the lack of it--however, does not completely free the three men.

They are scheduled to appear in Police court, Wheeling, at 2 p.m. Friday.

The two trustees and long-time residents of the village were accused of accepting a bribe and conin the subdivision.

spiring to accept a bribe by Frank J. Budnick, a principal in the Holland subdivision development,

Businick also charged that Miramonti, in accepting the money, conspired with the two local officials.

Miramonti, who had been called before the grand jury as a witness in the case, said that the money-\$1,210--had been accepted last October 9 to pay for a victory celebration party staged in part by Cargill and Glescke six months earlier.

The three defendants denied that, as Budnick charged, the money was a bribe to approve a road base in the subdivision.
