Accused of Polluting Sewers

Charged with polluting sewer lines is Paul H. Allansen, employed by the Garrison Septic Tank Company of Libertyville.

The complaint was signed by Del Dobbins, Asst. Supt. of the Dept. of Public Works in Wheeling, and the Village of Wheeling and the County Sanitary District are pressing charges.

The complaint stated that Allansen has been emptying septic tanks into the Evanger Settling tank. The contents have gone through the filter system into Wheeling's plant and may be polluting the lines.

Allansen was released on a hundred dollar bond, and will appear with his attorney on May 13th before Judge Scanlon.

Trial Next Thursday

Two Wheeling village trustees and a hotel owner will face bribery conspiracy charges next Thursday, May 5, in Wheeling Police court.

The three men were freed on \$2,000 bond each Tuesday after their arrest Monday night.

Complaints against them were signed Monday by Frank J. Budnick, operator of the Wheeling Building Trust, a contracting firm.

Budnick claims he paid a \$1,210 hotel bill for a village election victory party held April 24, 1959. He said that after he paid the bill, the village board approved his request to alter street requirements for a subdivision his firm is building at Wolf and Dundee Roads.

The trustees - Edward Gieske Jr., former village president, and Fred L. Cargill - were charged with conspiracy to take a bribe and taking the bribe. Frank J. Miramonti, partner in the Union hotel was charged with conspiracy.

At the time the bill was paid, Budnick claims he was seeking village board approval to use gravel instead of macadam in street bases in the subdivision.

Gieske and Cargill have denied the charges.

The three men will face charges before Ted C. Scanlon, Wheeling police magistrate, in the Wheeling police court next Thursday.

Expect 400 Youngsters in Kindergarten This Fall

The registration of children eligible for kindergarten in September 1960, set a record Saturday, according to school officials in the Wheeling elementary district. Registration for Saturday showed 365 children to be enrolled, while ten phone calls on Monday raised the figure to 375.

Kenneth F. Gill, Supt. of Wheeling Schools, believes this figure will pass the 400 mark when school convenes this fall. Said Gill, "With four months left before school reopens, we can expect many more families moving into the district. Many of these families will have

children of kindergarten age so we are anticipating 12 or 14 classrooms."

Parents will be notified at a later date of arrangements for kindergarten classes and bus service.

The previous high registration was 323 students.

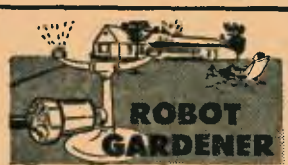

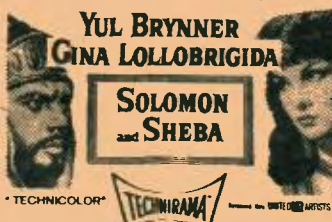
