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SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT Kenneth Gill views work started last Friday on new elementary school being constructed in southwest Buffalo Grove. The school, costing \$229,000, will consist of ten classrooms.

Under contract to the Slezak Construction company, Chicago, it is expected to be ready for occupancy by September 1. Voters approved the school site by a 12-1 margin in an April 9 referendum.

BRIBERY CHARGES PROMPT DENIALS

'Politics' Are Blamed

Two village trustees and a co-owner of the Union hotel vigorously denied charges Wednesday that they conspired to accept a bribe from the developer of the Holland re-subdivision, Wheeling.

Free today on \$2000 bond each are trustees Fred "Scotty" Cargill, 167 S. Milwaukee ave., and Edward Gieseke Jr., 295 E. Walnut ave. Also out on bond is Frank Miramonti, partner in the Union hotel, 121 S. Milwaukee ave.

All three vehemently deny any wrongdoing. They were arrested Monday on warrants signed by Frank J. Budnick, operator of Wheeling Building Trust, contracting firm for 39 homes in the re-subdivision at Wolf and Dundee rds.

"The whole thing, from beginning to end, is political," Cargill told the Herald.

"I'm astounded at these accusations," he added.

CARGILL, 49, and Gieseke, 50, are accused of receiving a bribe in the amount of \$12,000 to settle the bill for an

sulted counsel in Chicago Tuesday.

NEXT THURSDAY Judge Scanlon will hear full details of the case, starting from August 23, 1959, the day Cargill and Gieseke are alleged to have originally solicited the bribe.

Complainant Budnick told Ben the trustees first suggested "campaign funds," but that when he balked at this proposal, the sum was lowered to \$2,210.

★ ★ ★ *Here's Late Summary In Bribe Controversy*

Reporters for Paddock Publications have been investigating the alleged bribery conspiracy in Wheeling since the nature of the case was disclosed Monday.

The following sidelights are published for the first time:

—Fred "Scotty" Cargill, village trustee named in the complaints, strongly suspects his political enemies of "trumping up" the charges. "A reporter for a metropolitan daily was waiting at the police station when I was arrested," he pointed out. "Who tipped her off in advance?"

—At a village board meeting August 3, 1959, accused trustee Edward Gieseke Jr. voted "yes" on a motion to discuss a Holland re-subdivision street base irregularity with Frank J. Budnick, owner of the property. Trustee Cargill did not attend the meeting.

—On October 12, 1959, three days after

the bribe was alleged to have been paid, Cargill and Gieseke both voted "yes" on a proposal to allow the Holland street improvement plan to go ahead.

—Raymond L. Willer, 311 MacArthur, Mt. Prospect, who works for Budnick and paid the Union hotel bill, told reporters he made the payment "because, at the time, it seemed like the only course to take in order to get the streets approved."

—Assistant state's attorney Eldred Benz said Budnick and Willer volunteered their statements in February, and that the case has been under investigation ever since. The accusations, therefore, were made more than five months after the first alleged bribe solicitation.

—Willer said he had "no comment" when asked if influential Chicago politicians had attempted to get the assistant state's attorney to drop the charges.

Septic Refuge Dump Hearing Is Continued

Paul H. Allanson, Mundelein, truck driver accused of dumping septic refuse into the Wheeling sewage system, received a continuance of his case last Friday afternoon in Police Magistrate court.

Allanson, the driver of a Garrison Septic Tank company truck, is alleged to have dumped a truckload of sewage into a Wheeling settlement tank on Tuesday, April 19.

Judge Ted C. Scanlon granted the continuance upon the request of Allanson's attorney. New trial was set for May 13.

JUDGE SCANLON explained the complainant, Mrs. Pitt, decided not to prosecute.

Thiele will answer assault and battery charges in a Northbrook court, Judge Scanlon said.

Rodriguez was arrested on Buffalo Grove rd., between Hintz and Dundee rds, and charged with driving with a revoked operator's license, weaving, having no drivers license, drunken driving, and having a noisy muffler.

Duffy Is Winner Of Vote Recount

Election judges have disclosed a recount of the votes cast April 9 in the school board election indicate the winner of a disputed three-year term is William C. Duffy, not Mrs. Robert Grizzell as originally announced.

Judges recounted the ballots April 21. According to the recount, Duffy, 115 W. Jeffrey ave., received 327 votes to Mrs. Grizzell's 325.

UNOFFICIAL tabulations revealed April 14 showed Mrs. Grizzell, Buffalo Grove, receiving 325 votes to Duffy's 324. Duffy, however, is now apparently the winner by two votes.

The recount was requested by Duffy. His candidacy for the Community Consolidated school district 21 seat was endorsed by the Caucus Committee of Wheeling.

Miramonti, 47, is charged with conspiracy to receive a bribe. He is alleged to have accepted payment from Raymond L. Willer, Mt. Prospect, a salesman for Budnick's firm, for the bill incurred at the Union hotel.

Budnick, a resident of Skokie, claims that after the hotel tab was paid, the village board approved a street base substitution in the Holland subdivision. Prior to that, he said, the board refused to approve the use of gravel as a street base.

Eldred Benz, assistant state's attorney, drew the complaints on the basis of Budnick's statements. According to the complaints, the payoff was made on October 9, 1959.

MIRAMONTI accepted a check from Miller and issued a receipt, noting on it the money was to pay for a "sub-contractor party" which was never held, the statements say.

The check was endorsed by Miramonti and deposited in the Wheeling State bank under the hotel's account on October 15.

Cargill and Gieseke, both members of the Associated Party elected to the Wheeling board of trustees in April, 1959, say they know nothing of any bribe solicitation.

CARGILL, owner of Scotty's service station, 13 N. Milwaukee ave., until a few months ago, admitted knowledge of the bill at the hotel, but said "backers" of his candidacy had promised to take care of it.

"The first I heard of its being paid," he said, "was when I was asked to go to the police station Monday."

Cargill was booked at the station Monday at 4 p.m. Miramonti was brought in at 7:45 p.m. and Gieseke came in at 11:45 p.m.

District Cleared In Ditch Damage

The County court has approved a resolution that drops all wording making the Metropolitan Sanitary District liable for any damages resulting from the widening of the Wheeling Drainage ditch in Wheeling.

The amended resolution

was submitted by Herbert Lemke, sole commissioner of the Wheeling Drainage District.

THE RESOLUTION grants the sanitary district all necessary easements to enter property for the purpose of

enlarging the channel from a point slightly above Jeffery avenue to its outlet at the Des Plaines river. The sanitary district is undertaking the project, designed as a flood relief measure, at its own expense.

Its law department had held up final approval of the drainage district's resolution, which had been worded to make the sanitary district li-

able for all damages to any structure and also had been so worded that the drainage district was without liability for damages that may arise from the project.

Lemke told the court he has no objection to the new resolution that does not contain words rendering the sanitary district liable.
