


It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas...

Message:

Shame on me that I never looked at this site. It's awesome!

It was in 1937-38 the new Wheeling School gym was built. That's the one that now is a part of Walt Whitman. It wasn't strictly a school board thing; it was the whole town. And I was in the class of 1938—the first class to graduate from the new gym. I always felt real good about that because my dad was the one to push that project. He was the immigrant who came over and here he was more interested than a lot of other people. (Hans Schmidt, Lorraine's father, was president of the Village Board at the time when it and the Chamber of Commerce and the Volunteer Fire Department led a drive to raise the money to build the school gym.)

And of course once the gym was built it became the focal point of all activities. We had basketball teams and baseball teams and it was in use all the time. We had dances on Saturdays and it was really used by the community. It was the only place we really had because you couldn't use the Union Hotel anymore, where you

had dances before on Saturday nights. Then there was the big root beer stand down on south Milwaukee Ave. near the dam, that the Stavros ran. It was on the Biebers' property. All the root beer you could drink for a nickel! At that time you could take your bicycle and ride that mile or so down Milwaukee Ave. without any problems and that would be a big treat for us kids. There was a juke box and we could dance and it was a good get-together place at that time.

And another thing was the Chamber of Commerce Christmas sacks during the Depression. The week before Christmas, Santa Claus would come on a big dump truck.

But before that, the Chamber of Commerce would pack the paper sacks. They had oranges and nuts, apples—I don't remember any toys.

We'd have this huge Christmas tree by where the village hall used to be on Milwaukee Ave. and the truck would be there and Santa Claus would give those sacks to whoever came. ☺

Cook's Corner



Cookie bakers alert: it's time for Lollipop Lane cookies!

Walnut Crescents

Melt-in-your-mouth cookies—the dainty kind you like to serve company—

1/2 cup butter or margarine
1/2 cup shortening
1/3 cup sugar

2 teaspoons water
2 teaspoons vanilla
2 cups enriched flour

1/2 cup chopped black walnuts
Confectioners' sugar

Cream butter to soften; then thoroughly cream butter, shortening, and sugar. Mix in water and vanilla, then flour and nuts; chill for 3 or 4 hours. Form dough in long rolls, 1/2 inch across; cut in 3-inch lengths and shape in crescents. Bake on ungreased cookie sheet in slow oven (325°) 15 minutes. (Do not brown cookies.) Remove from sheet, cool slightly, and dip in confectioners' sugar. Makes about 4 dozen.

Cookies:

1 cup honey
4 egg yolks
1 tablespoon cinnamon, or to taste
2 tablespoons pumpkin pie spice, or to taste
3/4 cup rye flour
3 cups all-purpose flour
3 teaspoons baking soda
1 tablespoon water

Icing:

1-2/3 cups sifted powdered sugar
1 egg white
Juice and grated rind of 1 small lemon
Water if needed

Pfeffernusse

Heat honey until lukewarm. Add to egg yolks and mix well, using a wooden spoon. Add cinnamon, pumpkin pie spice, rye flour, and all-purpose flour. Add baking soda dissolved in water. Mix well. With your hands, make balls about 1 inch in diameter. Place on a cookie sheet that has been lightly greased and dusted with flour. Bake at 375 degrees for 8 minutes or until lightly browned. Do not overbake. Cool 5 minutes on racks.

Meanwhile, make icing. Combine powdered sugar, egg white, and lemon juice and grated rind. Beat 5 minutes or until light and creamy. If mixture is too stiff, add a little water.

Put warm cookies into a large mixing bowl and dribble icing over them. Mix cookies by hand until coated. Place on racks to dry. Yield: 85 cookies.
