Kitchen

Fancy Egg Scramble

1 cup (4 oz.) diced Canadian bacon
¼ cup chopped green onion; 3 tablespoons butter
1 (3 oz.) can mushroom stems and pieces, drained
4 teaspoons butter, melted; 2¼ cups soft bread crumbs
¼ teaspoon paprika; 12 eggs, beaten

Cheese Sauce:

2 tablespoons butter; 2 tablespoons flour
½ teaspoon salt; 1/8 teaspoon pepper
2 cups milk; 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese

Cook Canadian bacon and onion in the 3 tablespoons butter until onion is tender but not brown. Add eggs and scramble just until set. Fold mushrooms and cooked eggs into Cheese Sauce. Turn into a baking dish about 11x7-inches. Combine remaining melted butter, crumbs and paprika; sprinkle on eggs. Cover; chill until 30 minutes before serving time. Bake uncovered, at 350 for 30 minutes.

Cheese Sauce: Melt butter in saucepan. Stir in flour, salt and pepper. Add milk; cook and stir until bubbly. Stir in the cheese until melted. Serves 8-10.
