WV Cherry-Vanilla Bundt Cake

Sweet cherries and a rich white chocolate icing add tons of gourmet flavor to our mix-easy cake!

Cooking spray with flour

1 pkg. (16.5 oz.) yellow cake mix

1 env. whipped topping mix from 2.6-oz. pkg.

4 eggs

1/3 cup oil

3 tsp. French vanilla extract

1 cup drained stemmed maraschino cherries, chopped, patted dry

1 cup white chocolate chips

2 Tbs. milk

1/2 cup sour cream

2 Tbs. butter, at room temperature

Maraschino cherries with stems, optional


● Preheat oven to 350°F. Coat 12-cup Bundt pan with cooking spray. In large bowl, on low speed, beat cake mix with 1 cup water, dry topping mix, eggs, oil and 2 tsp. extract until just blended, 30 seconds. On medium speed, beat 4 minutes. With spoon, stir in chopped cherries. Spread evenly in pan. Bake 50-55 minutes or until toothpick inserted into center comes out clean. Cool on rack 15 minutes. Transfer cake from pan to rack; cool completely, about 2 hours.

● Preheat oven to 350°F. Coat 12-cup Bundt pan with cooking spray. In large bowl, on low speed, beat cake mix with 1 cup water, dry topping mix, eggs, oil and 2 tsp. extract until just blended, 30 seconds. On medium speed, beat 4 minutes. With spoon, stir in chopped cherries. Spread evenly in pan. Bake 50-55 minutes or until toothpick inserted into center comes out clean. Cool on rack 15 minutes. Transfer cake from pan to rack; cool completely, about 2 hours.

● In microwave-safe bowl, combine chocolate chips and milk; microwave on High in 15-second intervals, stirring, until melted, about 45 seconds. Stir in sour cream, butter and remaining 1 tsp. extract until smooth. Refrigerate until slightly thickened, 15 minutes. Spoon over cake. If desired, garnish with maraschino cherries.




Remembering Shirley McConnell

Shirley McConnell was born and raised in Wheeling and was a major contributor about the history of Wheeling.

She was an avid craftswoman making many needlepoint pictures, particularly the one of the old Presbyterian Church which is in the museum. She wrote "A Century To Remember" about the Presbyterian Church 100th Anniversary Celebration and a colorful history of the Church in Wheeling.

She has donated many items which are displayed throughout the museum and was always willing to be interviewed about the early 20th century and progress made in Wheeling. She had an amazing memory for detail and filled in many blanks about Wheeling's early growth; ie the paving of Milwaukee Avenue, ice skating on the river and swimming too. She could recall where most farms were located and the produce grown there. She will be sincerely missed.
