Even in the dead of winter, the business owners along Milwaukee Avenue in Wheeling had to be thinking about how to keep their products cool, even planning forward to summer and cold beer. The history book *Wheeling Through the Years* includes stories of ice chopping for use by Hartmann House (pictured right), Stryker's Meat Market, Balling's Farm Store and Kuffer's beer distribution. As Bob Allison describes it: "Ice houses were double-walled buildings and they used a lot of sawdust to fill the space in between. When the ice was 8-10 inches thick they'd saw up a section, load it on the sleds



and haul it up to the icehouse. Some of the farmers could count on a little winter work that way, hauling ice up from the river."

75 years ago — Feb. 18, 1944 — "A group of young people took advantage of the heavy snow to have an impromptu sleighing party on Sunday evening. After the ride they adjourned to the drug store for dutch treat."

50 years ago — Feb. 19, 1969 — "Wheeling is finally going to get a new post office, despite repeated delays...The old post office is now located in the shopping center on Dundee and Milwaukee avenues."

From Restaurants to Recipes



PINEAPPLE ICEBOX CAKE

1/2 lb. vanilla wafers 1/2 c. butter

1 1/2 c. powdered sugar

2 eggs (unbeaten)

1 medium can crushed pineapple (drained)

1/2 pt. whipping cream

Pan size 8 x 12 x 2.

Grind the wafers or roll them into crumbs. Put half in bottom of well greased pan. Cream butter and sugar, add eggs one at a time. Beat until smooth and creamy. Pour this mixture over crumbs. Whip cream, add pineapple, pour over first mixture, cover with rest of the crumbs. Put in refrigerator for several hours.

Century-old ice house fate unsure

Concern is spreading again over the fate of a 100-year-old ice horse situated behind the Crob House Restaurant, 393 S. Milwaukee Ave.

The ice house, built in the late 1800s and used to store ice for the summer months, has survived dozens of owners who used the building in front of it primarily for restaurants.

Wheeling Plan Commissioners said last week that they will recommend to the village board that current owner, Robert Chinn, he required to keep the ice house intact for one year. what he likes.

When China bought the building two years ago, village trustees agreed that the ice house should remain, But Plan Commission Chairman Paul Elsterhold and other commissioners called the building "an eyesoro" and said if Chinn - or any other owner — wants to tear it down, they should be allowed. "I don't want to see the house de-stroyed and I have heard talk of tear-ing it down," Fantl said. "I'm going to try to talk with him and maybe get a landmark designation and fix it up without any cost to him.

"Then it can be used as a tourist attraction and it will even bring peo-ple to the restaurant," he said.
