

Renovations at Husky Park

On June 20, Wheeling Park District held a community dedication ceremony for the new Husky Park playground. Refreshments were served while everyone at the vibrant, new play equipment located at the five-acre park at 1100 Lee Street in Wheeling.

The choice of equipment is the result of the Wheeling Park District "People-Driven Playground Process". Beginning with a "listening session" in May 2012, Husky Park neighbors assisted Park District Staff in planning and designing the new playground. All the play equipment and the new gazebo were installed by Park District staff.

Various slides and climbing apparatus, as well as swings and individual play pieces, accommodate both two- to five-year-olds and five- to 12-year-olds. The individual play areas are sheltered by sail-like shade structures. The soft safety surface is constructed in circular shapes with contrasting colors. The old basketball court was removed and replaced with a larger, full-court. Bike racks, new trash/recycling receptacles, and landscaping were added.

The new entrance on Norman Lane, completed in 2011, "opened up" the park and now allows the new playground to be seen from the surrounding neighborhood.

"Collaborating with the community on projects like this allows us to understand and address their specific needs and wants," said Jan Buchs, Executive Director of the Wheeling Park District. Heritage Park Plan Is a Win-Win for Everyone!

The redevelopment of Heritage Park has been on the radar for nearly 20 years. The recently created Master Plan is now being implemented. And, with the intergovernmental agreement between the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago (MWRDGC), the Village of Wheeling, and the Wheeling Park District, it's proving to be a win-win proposition for everyone involved.

In July, the Wheeling Park District received \$3.6 million from MWRDGC for approximately 14 acres along Wolf Road to construct the major detention basin of the Heritage Park Redevelopment. The agreement also includes substantial site drainage improvements as well as payment of approximately \$10 million towards recreational enhancements to Heritage Park.

"Along with the regional impact on flood control, the reservoir project is a boon to Wheeling residents," said Executive Director Jan Buchs. "Without a partnership like this, it would take a lot more resources and, consequently, much longer to develop, especially given the economic times."

The Wheeling Park District has hired V3, a fullservice engineering consulting firm to assist Park District staff in reviewing documentation prepared by MWRDGC and their design engineer and assure that the design and development of Heritage Park meets the standards set forth by the Heritage Park Master Plan. Park District staff also is working with the landscape architects and architects from AECOM (Project Engineer) to design the athletic complex and concession building, bandshell, pavilion, lake-edge treatment, and creek-edge treatment.

MWRDGC and AECOM expect to complete the Preliminary Design report in early September. A public meeting to present the report to the Park District Board of Commissioners and the Village of Wheeling will follow. At the same time, work will begin on presenting the plans to the Village of Wheeling Plan Commission for the necessary approvals.

Currently, staff is working with the MWRDGC and AECOM to develop the details of the recreational components of the Heritage Park Redevelopment Project. Through this collaborative process, changes in the site master plan have occurred that provide substantial benefits to both the Park District and MWRDGC including:

 Modifying the ballfield complex to change the surface from turf to artificial turf.

- Changing the northwest field to a multi-use field with a full-size football/soccer field.
- Removing the parks/concession building and engineered soccer field located on the west side of the park.
- Relocating the bandshell to the west end of the lake where the pavilion was previously located.
- Relocating the pavilion to the east side of the lake.

Ballfield Complex

The change to the ballfield complex was driven by the desire to provide a full-size artificial turf football / soccer field as part of the ballfield complex. To accommodate this change, the 305-foot field located in the northwest quadrant of the complex was enlarged to 375 feet and modified to become a multi-use field (full-size football / full-size soccer / baseball). The remaining three fields were each slightly enlarged by five feet and changed from turf to artificial turf. The enlargement of the remaining three fields was restricted by the location of the Buffalo Creek floodway.

Parks / Concession Building and Engineered Soccer Field

By creating a multi-use field as part of the ballfield complex, the engineered soccer field at the west end of the property was no longer necessary. In addition, staff believes that purchasing and renovating an existing building to be utilized as a parks building and maintenance facility is more fiscally responsible than constructing a new building on this part of the property as previously proposed. As such, the parks / concession building was removed from the Master Plan.

Dear Residents:

We've planned for it for years; we've talked about it for months, and now you are going to see it happening! Shortly after the New Year, the two-year construction phase of the Heritage Park redevelopment will begin.

It is important to note that during construction, Heritage Park will be closed to all pedestrian and vehicular traffic, and parking around the Community Recreation Center (CRC) and Aquatic Center will be altered. However, the CRC, Fitness Center, Arctic Splash indoor pool, and Aquatic Center (in season) will remain open throughout construction. This project will require patience from all of us. Parking may be inconvenient at times, but please know that Staff will work to keep you informed of any changes that may affect your visit to the Wheeling Park District.

To aid in the communication process, a new Web site, www.HeritageParkProject.info, dedicated exclusively to the redevelopment of Heritage Park, will be launched in January. This site will have up-to-the-minute progress reports on the construction as well as important information that CRC and Aquatic Center guests will need to know. Until then, the Heritage Park Master Plan Report is available for viewing on the Wheeling Park District Web site at www.wheelingparkdistrict.com, or at the Guest Service Desk at the CRC.

While we all understand that the construction process can be inconvenient at times, the Park District Board and Staff could not be more excited for guests to enjoy the end result. Once completed, Heritage Park will feature:

- 2,400-square-foot band shell with a hardscaped plaza
- Athletics complex with lighted synthetic turf baseball/softball/soccer/football fields and electric scoreboards
- 2,500-square-foot, two-story concession and restroom building
- 1,300-square-foot pavilion
- Boardwalk across the basin from Wolf Road into Heritage Park
- Two-lane vehicle bridge over Buffalo Creek to a new parking lot
- Expansion and shoreline improvements to Lake Heritage
- Buffalo Creek stabilization plantings
- Walking paths around the park perimeter with natural landscaping and seating
- Extensive site landscaping

This project was made possible due to an Intergovernmental Agreement between the Wheeling Park District, Village of Wheeling, and the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago (MWRDGC). This agreement will meet the needs of each agency while providing benefits back to Wheeling and other communities along the Des Plaines River. The partnership calls for compensatory storage at Heritage Park for the Levee 37 project on the Des Plaines River without hindering the Heritage Park Master Plan or the operations of the park. The broad-ranging benefits of this intergovernmental agreement serve as a model of what can be achieved when entities partner for the betterment of the constituencies. The agreement, which was authorized by the Park District Board of Commissioners on February 9, 2010, calls for the Park District to transfer property along Wolf Road to MWRDGC for compensatory storage for the levee. This land currently hosts the Park District's Parks and Facility Services building and a water detention area. Once complete, this area will contain a storm water storage basin featuring natural grass and native landscaping. The basin will be bordered by ornamental decorative fencing. Additional storage also is provided throughout the park in a manner that does not compromise the enjoyment of the facilities.

MWRDGC also provided the Park District with additional funds to replace the existing

Parks and Facility Services building located at 222 S. Wolf Road. These funds were used to help purchase and renovate a new facility located at 245 Egidi Drive.

On behalf of the Board and Staff of the Wheeling Park District, I thank you, in advance for your patience and understanding as we work to make Heritage Park the pride and joy of the Wheeling community.

Fifty Years of Memorable Experiences!

The citizens of Wheeling voted to give themselves the gift of a Park District on December 23, 1960, at a special election at Mark Twain School. The first Park Board meeting was called to order January 11, 1961, at Wheeling Village Hall. The next five decades were spent acquiring, developing, and maintaining open space that would serve the recreational needs of the growing community.

First Park Acquired in 1962

The Village of Wheeling donated three adjoining lots on Nancy Lane to the Park District in 1962 to establish the first park, now known as Meadowbrook Park. The Village obtained the adjacent 2.3 acres from the Metropolitan Sanitary District in 1976 and the Park District signed an intergovernmental agreement in 1982 to lease the land for 99 years.

A grant from the Federal Open Space Land Program allowed the Park District to purchase 66 acres of land from G.D. Searle and Company in 1964. Construction began on Heritage Park in 1965 with a community recreation center, a lighted baseball field, and an ice rink. The Park District acquired a residential lot on Jeffery Avenue from Family Homes, Inc. in 1968 to provide an ingress and egress to the park. The land north of the existing property line along Wolf Road was purchased for use as a retention basin in 1969. In 2006, the playground was replaced. Now plans are underway for a complete renovation of the park to include a ballfield complex, concession building, bandshell, pavilion, and many more features.

In 1965, five-acres south of Jack London School were acquired by the Park District for Husky Park. Four years later, an easement was granted to the Village of Wheeling to construct a retention basin and pumping station to control flooding in the area around the park. Husky Park was redesigned in 2001 with financial assistance from the Illinois Department of Natural Resources.

Outdoor Pool Purchased in 1969

After leasing "Wheeling Chamber of Commerce Park" on Wolf Road from the Chamber of Commerce for many years, the Park District purchased it in 1969, along with the adjacent property, an outdoor swimming pool facility, from Wheeling Community Pool, Inc. The Park District acquired a Civil War-era church in 1970 and moved it to the Chamber Park site. The building was remodeled to hold community meetings and recreational programs. The Village sold the original Wheeling Village Hall on Milwaukee Avenue to the Park District in 1978. The building was moved to Chamber Park and now houses the Historical Museum. Ten years later, the historic Carriage House, located on Dundee Road, was acquired from the Village of Wheeling and moved there. In 2005, a new playground was installed.


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On June 9, 1969, the Wheeling Park

Community plays a major role in redeveloping Heritage Park


The "people driven" redevelopment process at Heritage Park is on schedule to make the "Signature Park" a reality.

On September 2, the full Board of Commissioners approved the final concept for the project. Some of the highlights of the design include a main entry feature off of Dundee Road with a large playground, a ballfield complex with concessions and restrooms, an east entrance to the park off of Wolf Road leading directly to the ballfields, a bandshell, a natural area with detention along Buffalo Creek, a relocated parks building with public restrooms and concessions adjacent to an engineered soccer field, and new parking areas off of Dundee Road and Wolf Road. The plan also calls for a large pavilion overlooking an expanded lake/detention area. An enhanced lake edge will feature a walking path around the entire perimeter complete with a raised boardwalk over a natural viewing area.

The concept took shape at the hands of the Heritage Park Advisory Committee who met for an evening design workshop on Thursday, April 10, facilitated by Laurie Marston of the planning consultant firm Laurie Marston and Associates, and Larry Raffel, Superintendent of Planning for Wheeling Park District. Committee members, including residents, a Park commissioner, a Park staff member, and representatives from the Village of Wheeling, School District 21, Wheeling High School, and Indian Trails Public Library, broke into small groups and formulated their ideas into three distinct design concepts for the new Heritage Park. All three reflected Committee members' desires to realign the baseball fields, keep the detention pond on Wolf Road, enhance the lake, and relocate the playground and basketball and tennis courts on the 98 acres of park land in addition to adding more parking within the park.

"I am very pleased with the hard work of the Committee," commented Raffel. "While each of the plans had subtle differences, they all captured a special sense of community."

Park District staff translated the design intent of the plans into presentation concepts that worked with the topography of the site. This



allowed the community to view the drawings at a public forum held at the Community Recreation Center on Thursday, May 22. Those in attendance heard an explanation of the three designs and gave their input. Anyone unable to attend the forum had an opportunity to see the presentation boards in the lobby of the CRC, at Indian Trails Public Library, and on the Wheeling Park District Web site and offer their comments.

All community input was reviewed in order for the Staff Advisory Committee to produce the final plan that was presented to the Board of Commissioners for approval.

Now that the final plan has been approved by the full board, Park staff will generate a report outlining the design concepts, public process, and funding, phasing, and implementation recommendations.

"All information generated throughout this process will be included in the report," said Raffel. "All public comments and listening session dialogue will appear in the appendix. If anyone had anything to say about the Heritage Park plan, it will be included."

The report is expected to be completed this fall and made available to the public.

The redevelopment of Heritage Park is the largest single project undertaken by the Wheeling Park District and is a major initiative in the Parks and Recreation Comprehensive Plan Report. The internal planning process for the redevelopment of Heritage Park began last summer with the site inventory and analysis of the land. Eight of the acres were acquired in August of 2007 in a swap with the Village of Wheeling for the six acres on Dundee Road where the new Village Hall is now under construction. An additional 10 acres were acquired from St. Joseph the Worker Catholic Church with an Open Space Land Acquisition and Development (OSLAD) grant through the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR).

PROS Consulting Hired to Develop Parks and Recreation Comprehensive Plan

The Wheeling Park District Board of Commissioners has entered into an agreement with PROS Consulting LLC to develop a Park and Recreation Comprehensive Plan. This Plan will serve as a guide for the Board and staff to make decisions that best serve the long-term park and recreation needs of the community.

The goals of the Park and Recreation Comprehensive Plan are to:

- Assist the Park District in determining and prioritizing where to invest resources with regard to recreation services, maintaining current facilities, and park improvements.
- Assist the Park District in determining best land use and land management practices.
- Assist the Park District in determining what recreation programs and services should be
 offered and evaluating those that should be discontinued.
- Evaluate the Park District's current open space, indoor recreation space, and recreation services compared to community needs and current standards and trends.
- Provide guidelines for future planning and updates to the Park and Recreation Comprehensive Plan.

In August of 2005, Leisure Vision of Olathe, Kansas completed a Community Attitude and Interest Citizen Survey (CAIS) to help establish priorities for the future development of parks and recreation facilities, programs and services within the community. This document was undertaken as the first step to assist the Park District in developing a Park and Recreation Comprehensive Plan. Prior to finalizing the needs assessment, the Wheeling Park District went through a process to revise its mission statement to better reflect and articulate its purpose. This process instilled a sense of a common purpose, identified shared organizational values and established a set of key, strategic initiatives that provide and aligned course of direction in meeting the Park District's mission.

Upon revising the mission, completing the needs assessment and evaluating community input, the Park District's first vision statement was created. The vision provides direction for what the Park District is working to achieve in the future, while continuing to meet its mission. The Park and Recreation Comprehensive Plan and the associated documents are integral to achieving the Park District's vision over the next five to seven years. The plan will serve as a strategic guide in assisting staff and Board to make decisions that best serve the long-term park and recreation needs of the community.

PROS Consulting is charged with considering the results of the CAIS, the Needs Assessment, the Vision, and the available financial resources in meeting the goals of the Park and Recreation Comprehensive Plan.

The Parks and Recreation Comprehensive Plan is on schedule to be completed in the spring of 2007 and will guide staff in developing park and recreation experiences for all Park District residents and provides long-range direction for open space and facility improvements.

Finance and Business Operations, Facilities and Parks, Personnel, Recreation Services, and Legal. Based on the evaluation, the Wheeling Park District's overall net score was 97 percent. Less than 10 percent of the eligible agencies in the State of Illinois reach Distinguished Agency status.

Jan's efforts to carry out a land exchange with the Village of Wheeling, establish a Park District/Municipal Campus, and increase open space at Heritage Park with an OSLAD-funded land purchase also were recognized.

Lastly, and most importantly, Jan's dedication and commitment to providing memorable experiences in parks and recreation made a lasting impression on the committee for improving the quality of life for the communities of Wheeling.

Jan has been with the Wheeling Park District since May of 1993.



Chevy Chase Annexation Update

The Wheeling Park District Board of Commissioners would like to take this opportunity to clear up any misconceptions regarding the annexation of the Chevy Chase clubhouse and a portion of the golf course by the Village of Buffalo Grove and to provide an update on the continuing efforts to reverse this action.

The Chevy Chase property belongs to the residents of the Wheeling Park District. The Park Board considers the annexation an act of disrespect to the Park District and its residents who worked so diligently to support the initial purchase and subsequent renovation. The Chevy Chase clubhouse and Traditions golf course are, and will remain, owned and operated by the Wheeling Park District. The Park Board continues to pursue an outcome that results in disconnection from the Village of Buffalo Grove of the property that was annexed involuntarily in March of 2004. Whether that success comes through a lawsuit, or through an agreement formed outside the court system, the Park District Board maintains that it has a responsibility to protect and preserve this asset for the future and to uphold Chevy Chase's Wheeling identity. It is important for Park District residents to understand that the only way this annexation could have been prevented was for the Village of Buffalo Grove not to have taken such action in the first place. Since it has occurred, the Park District has disputed their action vehemently in order to disconnect the property.

The following is a summary of the Park District's disconnection efforts to date. This information is current as of April 19, 2005.

March 15, 2004: The Village Trustees of Buffalo Grove voted to involuntarily annex the Chevy Chase clubhouse and a portion of the golf course into the Village of Buffalo Grove at the regularly scheduled board meeting. The Wheeling Park District was given no notice of any impending annexation action and became aware of the situation through the newspaper account the following day.

March 16, 2004: The Park Board began working with legal counsel to evaluate the legal rights of the Park District and to consider every alternative to disconnect the property.

August 31, 2004: The Park District submitted a petition to the Village of Buffalo Grove Board of Trustees requesting disconnection of the property from Buffalo Grove.

No response from the Village of Buffalo Grove Trustees.

October 7, 2004: The Park District submitted a petition to the Lake County Circuit Court requesting disconnection of the property from the Village of Buffalo Grove.

Litigation is ongoing.

November 24, 2004: The Park District filed a lawsuit challenging the legal authority of the Village of Buffalo Grove to annex the Chevy Chase property.

Litigation is ongoing.

March 2005: The Wheeling Park District received Buffalo Grove's Village News, dated March/April 2005. The publication presented the Village of Buffalo Grove Goals for 2005, as declared by Village President Elliott Hartstein. One of the goals specifically cited by President Hartstein is to "Work toward long term comprehensive resolution of land use and annexation conflicts with neighboring communities and taxing bodies..."; another is to "Evaluate and implement new avenues for intergovernmental cooperation with Park District and other taxing bodies to enhance benefits for the community at large."

Park District Commissioners took this public statement as an overture to open a dialogue between the two Boards to work towards a resolution of the Chevy Chase annexation conflict. Representatives of the Wheeling Park District Board and Village of Buffalo Grove Board met with the explicit intent to explore opportunities that would resolve the annexation conflict outside of the court system and lead to improved intergovernmental relations between the agencies.

Unfortunately, at this time, the Park District is unable to report any resolution resulting from this meeting.

The Wheeling Park District will continue to appeal to the Village of Buffalo Grove Trustees' integrity and their genuine desire to improve intergovernmental relations and enhance benefits for the community-at-large. The Park District is responding with viable solutions to the annexation conflict in the hope that this resolution may take place outside the court system and in a more cost-efficient manner.

It is imperative to reiterate that the Wheeling Park District Board pledges to uphold its responsibility to its residents to nurture and protect Park District assets and maintain Chevy Chase's valuable Wheeling identity. Again, the Park Board will only accept an outcome that results in disconnection of the property that was annexed involuntarily on March 15, 2004, by the Village of Buffalo Grove.

The Pieces Are Coming Together

These are exciting times for the Wheeling community. After months of planning, the pieces are coming together for the "new" Heritage Park. By creating a partnership with the Village of Wheeling and working with State legislators and the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR), the Wheeling Park District has secured the funding for a land acquisition that will lead the way for Heritage Park to become the premiere community park for the residents of Wheeling.

On Monday, August 13, the Wheeling Park District Board of Commissioners and the Village of Wheeling Trustees finalized a land exchange agreement to allow for the expansion of Heritage Park and the construction of a new Village Hall on Dundee Road. The swap gives the Wheeling Park District approximately eight acres of land adjacent to Heritage Park and south of the current Village Hall, including the former public works/engineering facility which will be demolished. The Village of Wheeling will receive approximately six acres of land west of

the current facility on Dundee Road for a new Village Hall.

On the same night the Park District and Village finalized this agreement, the Wheeling Park District Board of Commissioners completed the purchase of 10 acres of open space adjacent to Heritage Park from St. Joseph the Worker Catholic Church. The purchase of this property was made possible, in part, by a \$400,000 Open Space Land Acquisition and Development (OSLAD) grant through the IDNR. This grant was available to the Park District, in part, due to the dedicated work of State Senator Terry Link and State Representative Kathy Ryg. Their leadership in preserving the funding for the OSLAD programs is a major reason why the Park District was able to acquire this property.

The Redevelopment of Heritage Park

Over the coming weeks, months, and years, the Wheeling Park District will be working closely with Wheeling residents to redevelop Heritage Park into their vision of a community park

through the unique "people-driven" process facilitated by Park District staff. The purchase of land from St. Joseph and the land exchange with the Village of Wheeling were the two vital pieces needed to set this process in motion.

The history of Heritage Park dates back to 1964 when the Park District purchased 66 acres of land from G.D. Searle and Company with a grant from the Federal Open Space Land Program. Situated between the Wisconsin Central Railroad tracks and Wolf Road just north of the Meadowbrook subdivision, construction began on a community recreation center, a lighted baseball field, and an ice rink in 1965.

The redevelopment of Heritage Park represents the largest single project undertaken by the Wheeling Park District since construction of the Community Recreation Center in 1994. In some respects, it could be considered the Park District's most significant project because it means changing a long-standing community park used by every age group in the entire community.

Heritage Park offers a unique opportunity to develop, not only a community park, but a Municipal/Park District campus, a transit-oriented development, and a variety of natural areas. Because the property is contiguous with Village of Wheeling property, Park District facilities, potential development property, and the Metra rail station, understanding how all these entities will impact the design is crucial to its success.

Pros Consulting Delivers Comprehensive Plan

The winter 2007 issue of *In The Know* outlined the Parks and Recreation Comprehensive Plan PROS Consulting, LLC is producing for the Wheeling Park District. This plan will serve as a guide for the Board and Staff to make decisions that best serve the long-term park and recreation needs of the community. The Park and Recreation Comprehensive Plan goals are to:

- · Determine and prioritize where to invest resources.
- · Determine best land use and management practices.
- Determine what programs and services to offer.
- · Evaluate current open space, and indoor and outdoor recreation space.
- Provide guidelines for future planning and updates.

The complete report is scheduled to be delivered to the Park District Board of Commissioners later this month. However, preliminary information is now available to share with residents.

For comparison purposes, PROS Consulting provided the Park District with information on national parks and recreation in addition to the evaluation of specific Park District programs and facilities. These details allow the Park District to gain an understanding of what is occurring on a national level and anticipate trends in the areas of programs, parks, facilities, and demographics.

The information listed below is a preview of the final comprehensive report.

RECREATION ACTIVITIES

Part of the report details how parks and recreation is being used throughout the country. The national findings revealed that time has the greatest impact on people and their choices for recreation. According to statistics, over 60% of households in America are "dual-working" households, meaning more than one adult is working away from the home. This has put more of a premium on people's free time and the choices they make.

The public has shifted their attention away from traditional team sports. The demand for recreation, entertainment, and leisure near at hand has increased in order to take advantage of small available blocks of time after the work day and on weekends and holidays. Recent studies conducted by the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation indicate that Americans prefer relatively simple outdoor recreation opportunities. To back up that point, on a national level, traditional bat and ball sports, such as baseball and softball, have experienced a decline or plateau in participation. Much of the reason for this can be attributed to the set time schedule of games and practices rather than offering the ability to participate when time permits.

Furthermore, other opportunities outside of traditional recreation play activities also have been attributed to the decline in outdoor recreation. Non-direct competitors to recreation, most notably the Internet and other multi-media outlets, have begun encroaching on the ever-shrinking pool of available leisure time.

POPULATION & DEMOGRAPHICS

The Park and Recreation Comprehensive Report looked at the effects population demographics have on people's choices for parks and recreation. As evidenced by our schools, neighborhoods, and community groups, the Wheeling Park

District serves an extremely diverse community. This diversity also is reflected in the differing ages, cultures, and household incomes of our guests. As with many consumer goods, different groups have different needs when it comes to recreational activities. Two of the most intriguing classifications of community were age and culture.

Age Demographics

It should come as no surprise that as the baby-boomer generation ages, the average age of Wheeling's community mirrors that change. To illustrate this, over the next 15 years, the population of people over 55 years of age will increase 6.3% while the population of those aged 18 to 34 will decrease 10.5%. In population numbers that means the 55+ population will increase by 3,338 people, and the 18 to 34 age segment will decrease by 1,125 people.

This growth and gradual aging of the community will require the Park District to aggressively program to a mature audience in a much more active way. The populace of maturing adults is staying active into their sixties and even into their seventies and eighties.

Cultural Demographics

The vast array of cultural diversities in our community makes Wheeling a great place to live, work and play. This factor also affects the recreational choices of each cultural group.

Utilizing the Ethnicity Study complied by American Sports Data, Inc., participation rates among recreational and sporting activities were analyzed. The most popular activities for those classified groups were categorized into a top five list. Interestingly, the top two activities for each group were the same. The groups ranked their favorite activities as recreational swimming and recreational walking. It is important to note that despite varying cultures the most popular recreation activities are identical.

While much of the information provided in the initial report was intriguing and useful, the full depth and scope of the Park and Recreation Comprehensive Plan cannot be determined until the final report is received and analyzed. At that time, the Board of Commissioners will evaluate the recommendations gathered from the report and work to implement the suggestions as deemed appropriate.

ORDINANCE 2004-C

ETHICS ORDINANCE

PREAMBLE

WHEREAS, the Illinois General Assembly has enacted the State Officials and Employees Ethics Act (Public Act 93-615, effective November 19, 2003, as amended by Public Act 93-617, effective December 9, 2003), which is a comprehensive revision of State statutes regulating ethical conduct, political activities and the solicitation and acceptance of gifts by State officials and employees; and

WHEREAS, the Act requires all units of local government and school districts, within six months after the effective date of Public Act 93-615, to adopt ordinances or resolutions regulating the political activities of, and the solicitation and acceptance of gifts by, the officers and employees of such units "in a manner no less restrictive" than the provisions of the Act; and

WHEREAS, it is the clear intention of the Act to require units of local government and school districts to implement regulations that are at least as restrictive as those contained in the Act, and to impose penalties for violations of those regulations that are equivalent to those imposed by the Act, notwithstanding that such penalties may exceed the general authority granted to units of local government to penalize ordinance violations; and

WHEREAS, it is the clear intention of the Act to provide units of local government with all authority necessary to implement its requirements on the local level regardless of any general limitations on the power to define and punish ordinance violations that might otherwise be applicable; and

WHEREAS, because the Act provides for the imposition of significant penalties for violations of said local regulations, it is necessary to adopt the required regulations by Ordinance rather than by Resolution;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF PARK COMMISSIONERS OF THE WHEELING PARK DISTRICT, COOK AND LAKE COUNTIES, STATE OF ILLINOIS, HEREBY ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: The "Ordinance Prohibiting the Solicitation and Acceptance of Gifts and Adopting the State Gift Ban Act" (Ordinance No. 99-B), adopted on June 22, 1999, is hereby repealed and replaced by the following provisions:

ARTICLE I

DEFINITIONS

Section 1-1. For purposes of this ordinance, the following terms shall be given these definitions:

"Campaign for elective office" means any activity in furtherance of an effort to influence the selection, nomination, election, or appointment of any individual to any federal, State, or local public office or office in a political organization, or the selection, nomination, or election of Presidential or Vice-Presidential electors, but does not include activities (i) relating to the support or opposition of any executive, legislative, or administrative action, (ii) relating to collective bargaining, or (iii) that are otherwise in furtherance of the person's official duties.

"Candidate" means a person who has filed nominating papers or petitions for nomination or election to an elected office, or who has been appointed to fill a vacancy in nomination, and who remains eligible for placement on the ballot at a regular election, as defined in section 1-3 of the Election Code (10 ILCS 5/1-3).

"Collective bargaining" has the same meaning as that term is defined in Section 3 of the Illinois Public Labor Relations Act (5 ILCS 315/3).

"Compensated time" means, with respect to an employee, any time worked by or credited to the employee that counts toward any minimum work time requirement imposed as a condition of his or her employment, but for purposes of this Ordinance, does not include any designated holidays, vacation periods, personal time, compensatory time off or any period when the employee is on a leave of absence. With respect to officers or employees whose hours are not fixed, "compensated time" includes any period of time when the officer is on premises under the control of the employer and any other time when the officer or employee is executing his or her official duties, regardless of location.

"Compensatory time off" means authorized time off earned by or awarded to an employee to compensate in whole or in part for time worked in excess of the minimum work time required of that employee as a condition of his or her employment.

"Contribution" has the same meaning as that term is defined in section 9-1.4 of the Election Code (10 ILCS 5/9-1.4).

"Employee" means a person employed by the Wheeling Park District, whether on a full-time or part-time basis or pursuant to a contract, whose duties are subject to the direction and control of an employer with regard to the material details of how the work is to be performed, but does not include an independent contractor.

"Employer" means the Wheeling Park District.

"Gift" means any gratuity, discount, entertainment, hospitality, loan, forbearance, or other tangible or intangible item having monetary value including, but not limited to, cash, food and drink, and honoraria for speaking engagements related to or attributable to government employment or the official position of an officer or employee.

"Leave of absence" means any period during which an employee does not receive (i) compensation for employment, (ii) service credit towards pension benefits, and (iii) health insurance benefits paid for by the employer.

"Officer" means a person who holds, by election or appointment, an office created by statute or ordinance, regardless of whether the officer is compensated for service in his or her official capacity.

"Political activity" means any activity in support of or in connection with any campaign for elective office or any political organization, but does not include activities (i) relating to the support or opposition of any executive, legislative, or administrative action, (ii) relating to collective bargaining, or (iii) that are otherwise in furtherance of the person's official duties.

"Political organization" means a party, committee, association, fund, or other organization (whether or not incorporated) that is required to file a statement of organization with the State Board of Elections or a county clerk under Section 9-3 of the Election Code (10 ILCS 5/9-3), but only with regard to those activities that require filing with the State Board of Elections or a county clerk.

"Prohibited political activity" means:

- (1) Preparing for, organizing, or participating in any political meeting, political rally, political demonstration, or other political event.
- (2) Soliciting contributions, including but not limited to the purchase of, selling, distributing, or receiving payment for tickets for any political fundraiser, political meeting, or other political event.
- (3) Soliciting, planning the solicitation of, or preparing any document or report regarding anything of value intended as a campaign contribution.
- (4) Planning, conducting, or participating in a public opinion poll in connection with a campaign for elective office or on behalf of a political organization for political purposes or for or against any referendum question.
- (5) Surveying or gathering information from potential or actual voters in an election to determine probable vote outcome in connection with a campaign for elective office or on

behalf of a political organization for political purposes or for or against any referendum question.

- (6) Assisting at the polls on Election Day on behalf of any political organization or candidate for elective office or for or against any referendum question.
- (7) Soliciting votes on behalf of a candidate for elective office or a political organization or for or against any referendum question or helping in an effort to get voters to the polls.
- (8) Initiating for circulation, preparing, circulating, reviewing, or filing any petition on behalf of a candidate for elective office or for or against any referendum question.
- (9) Making contributions on behalf of any candidate for elective office in that capacity or in connection with a campaign for elective office.
- (10) Preparing or reviewing responses to candidate questionnaires.
- (11) Distributing, preparing for distribution, or mailing campaign literature, campaign signs, or other campaign material on behalf of any candidate for elective office or for or against any referendum question.
- (12) Campaigning for any elective office or for or against any referendum question.
- (13) Managing or working on a campaign for elective office or for or against any referendum question.
- (14) Serving as a delegate, alternate, or proxy to a political party convention.
- (15) Participating in any recount or challenge to the outcome of any election.

"Prohibited source" means any person or entity who:

- (1) is seeking official action (i) by an officer or (ii) by an employee, or by the officer or another employee directing that employee;
- (2) does business or seeks to do business (i) with the officer or (ii) with an employee, or with the officer or another employee directing that employee;
- (3) conducts activities regulated (i) by the officer or (ii) by an employee, or by the officer or another employee directing that employee; or
- (4) has interests that may be substantially affected by the performance or non-performance of the official duties of the officer or employee.

ARTICLE 5

PROHIBITED POLITICAL ACTIVITIES

- Section 5-1. Prohibited political activities. (a) No officer or employee shall intentionally perform any prohibited political activity during any compensated time, as defined herein. No officer or employee shall intentionally use any property or resources of the Wheeling Park District in connection with any prohibited political activity.
- (b) At no time shall any officer or employee intentionally require any other officer or employee to perform any prohibited political activity (i) as part of that officer or employee's duties, (ii) as a condition of employment, or (iii) during any compensated time off (such as holidays, vacation or personal time off).
- (c) No officer or employee shall be required at any time to participate in any prohibited political activity in consideration for that officer or employee being awarded additional compensation or any benefit, whether in the form of a salary adjustment, bonus,

compensatory time off, continued employment or otherwise, nor shall any officer or employee be awarded additional compensation or any benefit in consideration for his or her participation in any prohibited political activity.

- (d) Nothing in this Section prohibits activities that are permissible for an officer or employee to engage in as part of his or her official duties, or activities that are undertaken by an officer or employee on a voluntary basis which are not prohibited by this Ordinance.
- (e) No person either (i) in a position that is subject to recognized merit principles of public employment or (ii) in a position the salary for which is paid in whole or in part by federal funds and that is subject to the Federal Standards for a Merit System of Personnel Administration applicable to grant-in-aid programs, shall be denied or deprived of employment or tenure solely because he or she is a member or an officer of a political committee, of a political party, or of a political organization or club.

ARTICLE 10

GIFT BAN

Section 10-1. Gift ban. Except as permitted by this Article, no officer or employee, and no spouse of or immediate family member living with any officer or employee (collectively referred to herein as "recipients"), shall intentionally solicit or accept any gift from any prohibited source, as defined herein, or which is otherwise prohibited by law or ordinance. No prohibited source shall intentionally offer or make a gift that violates this Section.

Section 10-2. Exceptions. Section 10-1 is not applicable to the following:

- (1) Opportunities, benefits, and services that are available on the same conditions as for the general public.
- (2) Anything for which the officer or employee, or his or her spouse or immediate family member, pays the fair market value.
- (3) Any (i) contribution that is lawfully made under the Election Code or (ii) activities associated with a fundraising event in support of a political organization or candidate.
- (4) Educational materials and missions.
- (5) Travel expenses for a meeting to discuss business.
- (6) A gift from a relative, meaning those people related to the individual as father, mother, son, daughter, brother, sister, uncle, aunt, great aunt, great uncle, first cousin, nephew, niece, husband, wife, grandfather, grandmother, grandson, granddaughter, father-in-law, mother-in-law, son-in-law, daughter-in-law, brother-in-law, sister-in-law, stepfather, stepmother, stepson, stepdaughter, stepbrother, stepsister, half brother, half sister, and including the father, mother, grandfather, or grandmother of the individual's spouse and the individual's fiancé or fiancee.
- (7) Anything provided by an individual on the basis of a personal friendship unless the recipient has reason to believe that, under the circumstances, the gift was provided because of the official position or employment of the recipient or his or her spouse or immediate family member and not because of the personal friendship. In determining

whether a gift is provided on the basis of personal friendship, the recipient shall consider the circumstances under which the gift was offered, such as: (i) the history of the relationship between the individual giving the gift and the recipient of the gift, including any previous exchange of gifts between those individuals; (ii) whether to the actual knowledge of the recipient the individual who gave the gift personally paid for the gift or sought a tax deduction or business reimbursement for the gift; and (iii) whether to the actual knowledge of the recipient the individual who gave the gift also at the same time gave the same or similar gifts to other officers or employees, or their spouses or immediate family members.

- (8) Food or refreshments not exceeding \$75 per person in value on a single calendar day; provided that the food or refreshments are (i) consumed on the premises from which they were purchased or prepared or (ii) catered. For the purposes of this Section, "catered" means food or refreshments that are purchased ready to consume which are delivered by any means.
- (9) Food, refreshments, lodging, transportation, and other benefits resulting from outside business or employment activities (or outside activities that are not connected to the official duties of an officer or employee), if the benefits have not been offered or enhanced because of the official position or employment of the officer or employee, and are customarily provided to others in similar circumstances.
- (10) Intra-governmental and inter-governmental gifts. For the purpose of this Act, "intra-governmental gift" means any gift given to an officer or employee from another officer or employee, and "inter-governmental gift" means any gift given to an officer or employee by an officer or employee of another governmental entity.
- (11) Bequests, inheritances, and other transfers at death.
- (12) Any item or items from any one prohibited source during any calendar year having a cumulative total value of less than \$100.

Each of the exceptions listed in this Section is mutually exclusive and independent of every other.

Section 10-3. Disposition of gifts. An officer or employee, his or her spouse or an immediate family member living with the officer or employee, does not violate this Ordinance if the recipient promptly takes reasonable action to return a gift from a prohibited source to its source or gives the gift or an amount equal to its value to an appropriate charity that is exempt from income taxation under Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as now or hereafter amended, renumbered, or succeeded.

ARTICLE 15

ETHICS ADVISOR

Section 15-1. The President of the Park Board of Park Commissioners ("Board"), with the advice and consent of the Board of Commissioners shall designate an Ethics Advisor for the Wheeling Park District. The duties of the Ethics Advisor may be delegated to an officer or employee of the Park District unless the position has been created as an office by the Wheeling Park District.

Section 15-2. The Ethics Advisor shall provide guidance to the officers and employees of the Wheeling Park District concerning the interpretation of and compliance with the provisions of this Ordinance and State ethics laws. The Ethics Advisor shall perform such other duties as may be delegated by the Board of Park Commissioners.

ARTICLE 20

ETHICS COMMISSION

Section 20-1. There is hereby created a commission to be known as the Ethics Commission of the Wheeling Park District. The Commission shall be comprised of three members appointed by the President of the Board of Park Commissioners with the advice and consent of the Board. No person shall be appointed as a member of the Commission who is related, either by blood or by marriage up to the degree of first cousin, to any elected officer of the Wheeling Park District.

Section 20-2. At the first meeting of the Commission, the initial appointees shall draw lots to determine their initial terms. Two commissioners shall serve 2-year terms, and the third commissioner shall serve a one-year term. Thereafter, all commissioners shall be appointed to 2 year terms. Commissioners may be reappointed to serve subsequent terms.

At the first meeting of the Commission, the commissioners shall choose a chairperson from their number. Meetings shall be held at the call of the chairperson or any 2 commissioners. A quorum shall consist two commissioners, and official action by the commission shall require the affirmative vote of two members.

Section 20-3. The President of the Board of Park Commissioners, with the advice and consent of the Board, may remove a commissioner in case of incompetency, neglect of duty or malfeasance in office after service on the commissioner by certified mail, return receipt requested, of a copy of the written charges against the commissioner and after providing an opportunity to be heard in person or by counsel upon not less than 10 days' notice. Vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as original appointments.

Section 20-4. The Commission shall have the following powers and duties:

- (1) To promulgate procedures and rules governing the performance of its duties and the exercise of its powers.
- (2) Upon receipt of a signed, notarized, written complaint, to investigate, conduct hearings and deliberations, issue recommendations for disciplinary actions, impose fines in accordance with Section 25-1(c) of this Ordinance and refer violations of Article 5 or Article 10 of this Ordinance to the appropriate attorney for prosecution. The Commission shall, however, act only upon the receipt of a written complaint alleging a violation of this Ordinance and not upon its own prerogative.
- (3) To receive information from the public pertaining to its investigations and to require additional information and documents from persons who may have violated the provisions of this Ordinance.
- (4) To compel the attendance of witnesses and to compel the production of books and papers pertinent to an investigation. It is the obligation of all officers and employees of the Wheeling Park District to cooperate with the Commission during the course of its investigations. Failure or refusal to cooperate with requests by the Commission shall constitute grounds for discipline up to and including discharge.
- (5) The powers and duties of the Commission are limited to matters clearly within the purview of this Ordinance.

Section 20-5. (a) Complaints alleging a violation of this Ordinance shall be filed with the Ethics Commission.

- (b) Within 3 business days after the receipt of a complaint, the Commission shall send by certified mail, return receipt requested, a notice to the respondent that a complaint has been filed against him or her and a copy of the complaint. The Commission shall send by certified mail, return receipt requested, a confirmation of the receipt of the complaint to the complainant within 3 business days after receipt by the commission. The notices to the respondent and the complainant shall also advise them of the date, time, and place of the meeting to determine the sufficiency of the complaint and to establish whether probable cause exists to proceed.
- (c) Upon not less than 48 hours' public notice, the Commission shall meet to review the sufficiency of the complaint and, if the complaint is deemed sufficient to allege a violation of this Ordinance, to determine whether there is probable cause, based on the evidence presented by the complainant, to proceed. The meeting may be closed to the public to the extent authorized by the Open Meetings Act. The Commission shall issue notice to the complainant and the respondent of the Commission's ruling on the sufficiency of the complaint and, if necessary, on probable cause to proceed within 7 business days after receiving the complaint.

If the complaint is deemed sufficient to allege a violation of Article 10 of this Ordinance and there is a determination of probable cause, then the Commission's notice to the parties shall include a hearing date scheduled within 4 weeks after the complaint's receipt. Alternatively, the Commission may elect to notify in writing the attorney designated by the corporate authorities to prosecute such actions and request that the complaint be adjudicated judicially. If the complaint is deemed not sufficient to allege a

violation or if there is no determination of probable cause, then the Commission shall send by certified mail, return receipt requested, a notice to the parties of the decision to dismiss the complaint, and that notice shall be made public.

If the complaint is deemed sufficient to allege a violation of Article 5 of this Ordinance, then the Commission shall notify in writing the attorney designated by the corporate authorities to prosecute such actions and shall transmit to the attorney the complaint and all additional documents in the custody of the Commission concerning the alleged violation.

- (d) On the scheduled date and upon at least 48 hours' public notice of the meeting, the Commission shall conduct a hearing on the complaint and shall allow both parties the opportunity to present testimony and evidence. The hearing may be closed to the public only if authorized by the Open Meetings Act.
- (e) Within 30 days after the date the hearing or any recessed hearing is concluded, the Commission shall either (i) dismiss the complaint or (ii) issue a recommendation for discipline to the alleged violator and to the President of the Board of Park Commissioners (where the alleged violator is a member of the Board) or to the Director of the Park District (where the alleged violator is a Park District employee), or impose a fine upon the violator, or both. The particular findings in the case, any recommendation for discipline, and any fine imposed shall be a matter of public information.
- (f) If the hearing was closed to the public, the respondent may file a written demand for a public hearing on the complaint within 7 business days after the issuance of the recommendation for discipline or imposition of a fine, or both. The filing of the demand shall stay the enforcement of the recommendation or fine. Within 14 days after receiving the demand, the Commission shall conduct a public hearing on the complaint upon at least 48 hours' public notice of the hearing and allow both parties the opportunity to present testimony and evidence. Within 7 days thereafter, the Commission shall publicly issue a final recommendation to the alleged violator and to the President of the Board of Park Commissioners (where the alleged violator is a member of the Board) or to the Director of the Park District (where the alleged violator is a Park District employee) or impose a fine upon the violator, or both.
- (g) If a complaint is filed during the 60 days preceding the date of any election at which the respondent is a candidate, the Commission shall render its decision as required under subsection (e) within 7 days after the complaint is filed, and during the 7 days preceding that election, the Commission shall render such decision before the date of that election, if possible.
- (h) The Commission may fine any person who intentionally violates any provision of Article 10 of this Ordinance in an amount of not less than \$1,001 and not more than \$5,000. The Commission may fine any person who knowingly files a frivolous complaint alleging a violation of this Ordinance in an amount of not less than \$1,001 and not more than \$5,000. The Commission may recommend any appropriate discipline up to and including discharge.
- (I) A complaint alleging the violation of this Act must be filed within one year after the alleged violation.

ARTICLE 25

PENALTIES

Section 25-1. Penalties. (a) A person who intentionally violates any provision of Article 5 of this Ordinance may be punished by a term of incarceration in a penal institution other than a penitentiary for a period of not more than 364 days, and may be fined in an amount not to exceed \$2.500.

- (b) A person who intentionally violates any provision of Article 10 of this Ordinance is subject to a fine in an amount of not less than \$1,001 and not more than \$5,000.
- (c) Any person who intentionally makes a false report alleging a violation of any provision of this Ordinance to the local enforcement authorities, the State's Attorney or any other law enforcement official may be punished by a term of incarceration in a penal institution other than a penitentiary for a period of not more than 364 days, and may be fined in an amount not to exceed \$2,500.
- (d) A violation of Article 5 of this Ordinance shall be prosecuted as a criminal offense by an attorney for the Wheeling Park District by filing in the circuit court an information, or sworn complaint, charging such offense. The prosecution shall be under and conform to the rules of criminal procedure. Conviction shall require the establishment of the guilt of the defendant beyond a reasonable doubt.

A violation of Article 10 of this Ordinance may be prosecuted as a quasi-criminal offense by an attorney for the Wheeling Park District, or, if an Ethics Commission has been created, by the Commission through the designated administrative procedure.

(e) In addition to any other penalty that may be applicable, whether criminal or civil, an officer or employee who intentionally violates any provision of Article 5 or Article 10 of this Ordinance is subject to discipline or discharge.

SECTION 2: This Ordinance shall be in effect upon its passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE USE OF THE PARKS AND PROPERTY OWNED OR CONTROLLED BY THE WHEELING PARK DISTRICT

CHAPTER 1 - DEFINITIONS, CONSTRUCTION, AND SCOPE

- <u>Section 1.01</u>. <u>Short Title</u>. This Ordinance regulating the use of the parks and property owned or controlled by the Wheeling Park District shall be known and may be cited as the "Conduct Ordinance of the Wheeling Park District."
- <u>Section 1.02</u>. <u>Definitions</u>. Unless otherwise expressly stated elsewhere in this Ordinance, for purposes of this Ordinance, the following words, terms, and phrases shall have the meanings given herein:
- 1. "Aircraft" means any device that is used or intended to be used for human flight in the air or is capable of flight in the air, including without limitation powerless flight.
- 2. "Alcoholic Liquor" is defined as provided in the Illinois Liquor Control Act of 1934 (235 ILCS 5/1-3.05) as amended hereafter.
- 3. "Aquatic Life" means all fish, reptiles, amphibians, crayfish, mussels, mollusks, and crustaceans.
 - 4. "Board" means the Board of Park Commissioners of the Wheeling Park District.
- 5. "Camping" shall include the erecting of a tent or shelter of natural or synthetic material, preparing a sleeping bag, hammock, or other bedding material for use, setting up any temporary or permanent camping equipment including without limitation food preparation equipment, and parking of a motor vehicle, motor home or trailer, or mooring of a vessel, for the apparent purpose of overnight occupancy.
- 6. "Cannabis" is defined as provided in the Illinois Cannabis Control Act (720 ILCS 550/3(a) as amended hereafter.
 - 7. "Carry" means to wear, bear, or have on or about the person.
- 8. "Controlled Substance" is defined as provided in the Illinois Controlled Substances Act (720 ILCS 570/102 (f), 204, 206, 208, 210 and 212 as amended hereafter.
 - 9. "Director" is the Executive Director of the Wheeling Park District.
 - 10. "District" is the Wheeling Park District, Cook and Lake Counties, Illinois.
- 11. "District Police Force" shall include the members of the Lake County Sheriff's Police, and the Village of Wheeling Police Department.
- 12. "District Property" is all of the property, real and personal, of every kind and description located within the jurisdiction of, or owned, administered, leased or licensed by, or otherwise in the possession or under the control of the District including without limitation every building, shelter, street, sidewalk, trail, path, beach, park, wilderness or open space, or other public place or facility and all District Waters located on or adjacent to or flowing over property located within the jurisdiction of, or owned, administered, leased or licensed by, or otherwise in the possession or under the control of the District.

- 13. "District Waters" shall include all water located on or adjacent to or flowing over land owned, leased, or generally administered or operated by the Wheeling Park District, including without limitation all natural or man-made lakes, rivers, creeks, streams, ponds, lagoons, bays, and drainage ways.
- 14. "Department Head" is the person immediately in charge of a given District department and its activities and to whom all employees of such department are directly responsible (e.g., Superintendent of Recreation and Superintendent of Parks).
- 15. "Fish" or "Fishing" means taking or attempting to take aquatic life in or from any District Waters by any method, and all other acts such as placing, setting, drawing or using any device commonly used for the taking of aquatic life whether resulting in such taking or not.
 - 16. "ILCS" is the Illinois Compiled Statutes.
- 17. "Operator" means a person who operates, drives, controls, otherwise has charge of, or is in actual physical control of a mechanical mode of transportation or any other mechanical equipment.
 - 18. "Ordinance" means the Conduct Ordinance of the Wheeling Park District.
- 19. "Permit" is the written authorization issued by or under the authority of the District, by a District officer or employee empowered to grant said authorization, to a Person to do or engage in a particular act or acts on District Property. Said authorization is subject to the terms and conditions specified in the Permit as well as all applicable federal, state, local, and District laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations.
- 20. "Person" is every natural person and every organization, firm, partnership, association, corporation, or entity of any kind or any employee, agent or officer thereof. This definition shall not include the District and any authorized officer, employee (full- or part-time, regular or short-term), or agent of the District when acting withing the scope of his authority.
- 20. "Possess" or "Possession" means exercising direct physical control or dominion, with or without ownership, over any kind of property, or archeological, cultural or natural resource.
- 21. "Refuse" includes without limitation trash, garbage, rubbish, waste, papers, bottles or cans, debris, litter, oil, solvents, liquid waste, or other discarded material whether solid or liquid.
- 22. "Services" shall include but not be limited to labor, professional services, transportation, leasing or renting any article, object, privilege, or service, giving of instructions or lessons, admission to exhibits, use of telephone or other utilities, or any act for which payment is customarily received.
- 23. "Smoking" means the lighting of cigarettes, cigars or pipes, the carrying of lighted cigarettes, cigars or pipes, or the intentional and direct inhalation of smoke from these objects.
- 24. "Take" or "Taking" means to pursue, hunt, harass, lure, harm, shoot, trap or ensnare, gig or spear, net, capture, collect, kill, destroy, wound, or attempt to do any of the above.
- 25. "Vehicle" means every device in, upon, or by which a person or property is transported or drawn on land, whether motor powered or self-propelled, except baby carriages, or strollers bicycles when properly used on walks or trails, and vehicles in the service of the District.

- 26. "Vessel" means every type or description of craft, other than a seaplane on water, used or capable of being used as a means of transportation on water, including without limitation boats, rafts, canoes, kayaks, jet skis, inflated devices, or any buoyant device permitting or capable of free flotation.
- 27. "Wildlife" shall include any water fowl, mammal, animal, amphibian, reptile, or bird or the young or eggs thereof.

Section 1.03. Construction and Scope.

- In the interpretation of this Ordinance, its provisions shall be construed as follows: (1) (a) Where the context permits, words in the masculine gender shall include the feminine and neuter genders and words in the singular number shall include the plural number; (2) The word "shall" is always mandatory and not merely directory; (3) The word "may" is always permissive and upon the discretion of the District; (4) This Ordinance is in addition to and supplemental to all applicable state, federal, local, and District laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations including without limitation the Park District Code (70 ILCS 1205/1-1 et seq.); (5) The meaning of any term, phrase, or word not otherwise defined in this Ordinance shall be construed and interpreted to mean the same as said term, phrase, or word is otherwise defined, construed or interpreted in such applicable federal, state, local, or District laws, ordinances, rules, or regulations; (6) The meaning of any term, phrase, or word not otherwise defined in this Ordinance or in such applicable federal, state, local, or District laws, ordinances, rules, or regulations shall retain its ordinary and properly understood meaning; (7) The descriptive headings of the various sections or parts of this Ordinance are for convenience only and shall not affect the meaning or construction, nor be used in the interpretation of any provision of this Ordinance; and, (8) An attempt to commit an act or engage in an activity prohibited under this Ordinance shall likewise be deemed prohibited in the same manner as the commission of such act or the engaging in such activity and subject to the same penalties.
- (b) This Ordinance shall apply to and be enforceable within and upon all District Property, and shall regulate the use thereof by all Persons. However, no provision hereof shall make unlawful any act necessarily performed by any officer, employee or agent of the District, member of the District Police Force when acting within the scope of his authority or in his line of duty, or any other Person summoned by such person to assist him.

CHAPTER II - SPECIFIC RESTRICTIONS ON CONDUCT AND BEHAVIOR

Section 2.01. Aircraft/Model Aircraft.

- (a) No Person shall fly, cause to be flown or permit or authorize the flying of Aircraft of any kind at any time over District Property at an elevation lower than the minimum safety requirements established by the Federal Aviation Administration or other governmental authority, at an elevation which is lower than is reasonably safe under the circumstances, or in a manner which endangers the safety of any Person on District Property.
- (b) No Person shall land, cause to be landed, or permit or authorize the landing of any Aircraft on District Property, except when necessitated by unavoidable emergency.
- (c) No Person shall fly or cause to be flown or permit or authorize the flying of model Aircraft on or over District Property unless a Permit therefor has first been obtained from the District in accordance with Chapter V of this Ordinance.
- (d) No Person shall parachute or otherwise descend from an Aircraft into or onto District Property or cause, permit or authorize another Person to parachute or otherwise descend from an Aircraft into or onto District Property except when necessitated by unavoidable emergency.

Section 2.02. Alcoholic Liquor.

- (a) No Person under the influence of Alcoholic Liquor intoxicating liquor, other drug, or a combination thereof, as defined in Section 11 501 of the Illinois Vehicle Code (625 ILCS 5/11-501), shall enter into, be, or remain on District Property.
- (b) No Person, other than the District or its agent, shall sell or deliver any Alcoholic Liquor on District Property, unless said Person has first obtained a Permit therefor from the District.
- (c) No Person shall bring into, possess, drink, consume, take, use, or transfer any Alcoholic Liquor on District Property, except in designated areas of the Chevy Chase Country Club, without having first obtained a Permit therefor from the District.
- (d) Every Person possessing, using, consuming, or transferring Alcoholic Liquor pursuant to this section, shall be subject to and shall comply with all applicable federal, state, local, and District laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations regarding the possession, use, consumption, or transfer of Alcoholic Liquor.

Section 2.03. Animals and Pets.

- (a) No Person shall bring or release onto District Property any Wildlife including without limitation any animal the capture or killing of which is authorized by the fish and game laws of the State of Illinois, or any other animal, except for domestic dogs, cats or other domesticated animal subject to the restrictions contained in this section. Provided, however, that the District may bring or release, or permit another Person to bring or release such proscribed animals onto District Property in conjunction with an activity or event conducted or sponsored by the District or in conjunction with a zoo, museum, nature center, or similar facility controlled, permitted or licensed maintained by the District.
- (b) No owner or agent of the owner having control of any domestic dog, cat, or any other domesticated animal shall cause or permit such animal to be on District Property unless the pet is on a leash which shall not exceed six (6) feet in length and such Person has in his immediate possession a device for removal, and a depository for the transportation of, animal excrement from such Property.
- (c) No owner or agent of the owner having control over any domestic dog, cat, or any other domesticated animal shall secure that pet by a leash to any tree, fence or other fixed object on District Property.
- (d) All owners or agents of the owner having control of any domestic dog, cat, or other domesticated animal, shall remove any excrement from District Property left by such animal.
- (e) No Person shall bring a domestic dog, cat, or any other animal onto or permit any animal to remain on any portion of District Property where the presence of animals is prohibited.
- (f) Any animal found on District Property in violation of subsections (a) or (d) may be apprehended, removed to an animal shelter, public pound, or other place provided for that purpose, and disposed of pursuant to the laws or ordinances of Cook and Lake Counties. The owner or Person responsible for such animal shall be responsible for all costs and expenses incurred or encumbered in the removal and housing of such animal and such charge shall be in addition to and not in lieu of any other penalties provided for in this Ordinance and any other applicable federal, state, local or District laws, ordinances, rules or regulations.

(g) Dogs for the visually impaired and other domesticated animals specially trained to assist Persons with disabilities are excluded from the prohibitions of this section when they are accompanying Persons with disabilities for purposes of providing such assistance.

Section 2.04. Assault or Bodily Injury.

- (a) No Person shall, without lawful authority, engage in conduct on District Property that which places another Person in reasonable apprehension of receiving bodily harm or physical contact of an insulting or provoking nature.
- (b) No Person shall intentionally or knowingly by any means cause bodily harm or make physical contact of an insulting or provoking nature with another Person on District Property.

Section 2.05. Begging and Panhandling.

- (a) No person shall beg or panhandle in District buildings or facilities or the entrances or stairways of such buildings or facilities.
- (b) No Person begging or panhandling on the Park District Property shall obstruct or impede pedestrians or Vehicles; harass park visitors with physical contact or persistent demands; misrepresent his affiliations; misrepresent what the solicited funds will be used for; or interfere, interrupt, or engage in conduct incompatible with the purpose of any program, activity, function, and/or special event conducted, sponsored licensed or otherwise permitted by the District; or coerce or intimidate another person into giving money, goods or services.

Section 2.06. Boating.

- (a) No Person shall launch any Vessel in District Waters, except from such places as may be designated therefor, and then only in compliance with applicable federal, state, local, and District laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations.
- (b) No Person shall use, employ, or be in or upon any District launching ramp or Vessel except on dates and during hours and established by the District.
- (c) No Person shall use or employ any District Property designated such for the launching or removal of sail boats, power boats, or other Vessels, unless he has purchased and is displaying a current daily fee ticket or a current season Vessel launching permit.
- (d) No Person shall allow any Vessel or watercraft equipment or accessories to remain on District Property beyond the close of the boating season designated by the District, other than in a storage area designated by the Park District.
- (e) No person may launch or remove a Vessel on or from District Property unless said Vessel has successfully pass an United States Coast Guard safety inspection.
- <u>Section 2.07. Camping.</u> No Person shall place, erect, or use any hammock, swing, tent, shelter, or any other type of temporary or permanent housing or camping equipment on District Property, nor otherwise camp in any manner on District Property unless a Permit therefor has first been obtained from the District.

Section 2.08. Charitable, Religious, Political, or Non-Profit Activities.

(a) For purposes of this section, charitable, religious, political, or non-profit activities shall include, without limitation soliciting contributions, the sale or distribution of merchandise, soliciting

votes or circulating petitions for or against any candidate for election to public office with respect to any referendum or other public question.

- (b) Soliciting contributions for charitable, religious, political, or non-profit organizations is permitted on District Property provided that a Permit therefor has first been obtained from the District in accordance with Chapter V of this Ordinance.
- (c) The sale or distribution of merchandise by charitable, religious, political, or non-profit organizations is permitted on District Property provided that a Permit therefor has first been obtained from the District in accordance with Chapter V of this Ordinance.
- (d) Soliciting votes and circulating petitions for or against candidate for election to public office or with respect to any referendum or other public question is permitted on District Property in areas open to the general public without a permit, subject to the limitations set forth in paragraphs (e) and (f) of this Section 2.08.
- (e) No Person shall engage in any activity described in subsections (a) through (d) of this Section 2.08 in District buildings or facilities in rooms in which any program, activity, class, function or special event conducted, sponsored by the District is in progress.
- (f) No Person engaged in the activities described in subsections (a) (d) of this section shall obstruct or impede pedestrians or Vehicles, harass park visitors with physical contact or persistent demands, misrepresent the affiliations of those engaged in such activities, misrepresent what the solicited funds will be used for or whether the merchandise is available without cost or donation, or interfere, interrupt, or engage in conduct incompatible with the purpose of any program, activity, function, and/or special event conducted or sponsored by the District.

Section 2.09. Commercial Sale, Exhibition, or Distribution of Goods or Services.

- (a) No peddler, vendor or any other Person involved in an endeavor for profit shall engage in the commercial sale, rental, exhibition, or distribution of goods or services, including without limitation the giving of instruction or lessons for a fee, upon District Property unless he has received a Permit, license or contract therefor from the District.
- (b) No Person engaged in the sale or distribution of goods or services under this section shall obstruct or impede pedestrians or Vehicles, harass park visitors with physical contact or persistent demands, misrepresent the affiliations of those engaged in such activities, misrepresent whether the goods or services are available without cost or donation, or interfere, interrupt, or engage in conduct incompatible with the purpose of any program, activity, function, and/or special event conducted, sponsored licensed or otherwise permitted by the District.

Section 2.10. Controlled Substances and Cannabis.

- (a) No Person under the influence of any Controlled Substance or Cannabis shall enter into, be, or remain on District Property.
- (b) No Person shall bring into, possess, take, use, sell, or transfer any Controlled Substance or Cannabis on District Property.

Section 2.11. Cooperation with Authorities.

(a) No Person shall physically hinder, threaten, resist, intimidate, disobey, or otherwise intentionally interfere with any member of the District Police Force or any District employee or agent in the performance of his duties.

- (b) No Person shall falsely represent that he is, or otherwise pretend to be, a District officer or employee, a member of the District Police Force, or an agent or other representative of the District.
- (c) No Person shall knowingly give a false report or false information (including, without limitation, information requested in a Permit application) for the purpose of misleading a District employee or agent, or a member of the District Police Force in the conduct of his official duties.

Section 2.12. Disorderly Conduct.

- (1) A Person commits the offense of disorderly conduct when he knowingly:
- (a) Does any act in such unreasonable manner as to alarm or disturb another and to provoke a breach of the peace; or
- (b) Makes or causes to be made any excessively loud or unreasonable noise which disturbs the peace. For purposes of this subsection 2.12(b), excessively loud or unreasonable noise is defined as noise inconsistent with or not attendant to appropriate and customary park and recreational activities, considering the nature and purpose of the actor's conduct, location, time of day or night, and other factors that would govern the conduct of a reasonably prudent person under the circumstances. This section shall include, without limitation, the loud or amplified playing of any type of audio equipment, noisemaker, musical instrument, or sound equipment. This section shall not apply to the playing of any musical instrument, public speaking, or the amplification thereof, in conjunction with activities conducted, sponsored or authorized by the District; or
- (c) Uses obscene or abusive language or gestures, or threatens violence or injury to the person or property of others, in a manner intended and likely to incite or produce an immediate breach of the peace or violent or disorderly response; or,
- (d) Congregates with other Persons on District Property with the intent to restrict vehicular or pedestrian traffic or with the intent to restrict the free ingress to egress from District Property and fails to comply with a lawful order of the District Police Force to disperse.
- <u>Section 2.13.</u> <u>Display of Permit or Pass</u>. Every Person shall produce or display a Permit or pass when requested to do so by any authorized Person for the purpose of enforcing compliance with any federal, state, local, or District law, ordinance, rule, or regulation, when such Permit or pass is required to engage in an activity on District Property.

Section 2.14. Dumping, Pollution, Sanitation, and Litter.

- (a) No Person shall litter, cast, throw, drop, leave, scatter, place, pile, or otherwise dump, leave, or deposit in any manner any kind of dirt, rubbish, placard, handbill, pamphlet, circular, book, notice, paper of any kind, ashes, garbage, waste material, snow, ice, or other substance, whether liquid or solid, or any other refuse in or upon District Property except as specifically permitted by the District. Provided, however, that paper, glass, cans, garbage and other refuse resulting from picnics or other lawful use of District Property may and shall be deposited in receptacles provided by the District for that purpose. Where receptacles are not provided, are missing, or are full to capacity, all such garbage, refuse, or other material shall be carried away from the area of use by the Person responsible for its creation and presence, and properly disposed of elsewhere.
 - (b) No Person shall spit upon District Property.

- (c) No Person shall urinate or defecate on District Property other than in toilets in rest room facilities expressly provided for such purposes.
 - (d) No Person shall drain refuse from a trailer or other Vehicle on District Property.
- (e) No Person shall bathe or wash himself or food, clothing, dishes, or other property at water outlets, fixtures or pools on District Property, except at those areas designated by the District for such use.
 - (f) No Person shall pollute or contaminate District Property or District Waters.
- (g) No Person shall dispose of fish remains on District Property, or in District Waters within 200 feet of boat docks or designated swimming beaches and areas, or within any park area of the District except as permitted by the District.
- (h) No Person shall dispose of human or animal waste on District Property except at designated locations or in fixtures provided for that purpose.
- (i) Any Person violating this section may be assessed the cost of removing any such improperly deposited substance or material and such charge shall be in addition to and not in lieu of any other penalties provided for in this Ordinance or applicable federal, state, local, and/or District laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations.
- <u>Section 2.15</u>. <u>Erection of Structure/Wires</u>. No Person shall construct, build, erect, or otherwise place any building, tent, stand, scaffold, platform or other structure of whatever kind, whether stationary or moveable and whether permanent or temporary in character, or construct, run, string, or otherwise place any electrical wire, conduit or pipe, or any public service or private utility, into, upon, above, or across or beneath District Property, unless a Permit, license, or contract therefor has first been obtained from the District.
- Section 2.16. Fairs and Special Events: Sale and Distribution of Merchandise; Soliciting Contributions. No Person shall sell and/or distribute merchandise or printed or written materials or solicit contributions, votes or signatures during fairs or special events conducted or sponsored by the District except at a fixed location designated by the District and unless a Permit therefor has first been obtained from the District in accordance with Chapter V of this Ordinance. The District shall allocate space at the fixed location to applicants on a first-come, first-served basis until no more space remains available.

Section 2.17. Fires.

- (a) No Person shall light, maintain, or make use of any fire on District Property, except at such places and at such times as the District may designate for such purpose and under such rules as may be prescribed by the District.
- (b) No fire shall ever be left unattended. Every fire shall be under the continuous care and direction of a competent adult from the time it is kindled until the time it is completely extinguished. All fires must be properly and completely extinguished prior to any Person leaving the site of the fire.
- (c) No Person shall throw or otherwise discard lighted or smoldering material in any manner that threatens, causes damage to, or results in the burning of District property or park resources, or creates a safety hazard.

Section 2.18. Fishing.

- (a) No Person shall fish or otherwise take aquatic life from District Waters except in areas designated by the District for such purposes.
- (b) Every Person fishing in District Waters shall comply with all applicable federal, state, local, and District laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations including, without limitation, conservation laws and licensing requirements.
- (c) Fishing in District Waters shall be conducted by means of a hook and line, with the rod or line being closely attended. No Person shall use drugs, poisons, explosives, electricity, or missiles of any kind to fish in District Waters.
- (d) No Person shall dig, scratch, or otherwise disturb District Property in order to locate or take bait.
- (e) Every Person shall carefully and immediately return to the water from which it was taken any fish that does not confirm to size or species restrictions imposed by any applicable federal, state, local or District law, ordinance, rule or regulation, or that the Person chooses not to keep.
 - (f) The provisions of this section apply to ice fishing.
- <u>Section 2.19</u>. <u>Gambling and Games of Chance</u>. No Person shall play or engage in selling fortunes or futures, games of chance, or in any other device or game of chance, hazard or skill, either as bookmaker, dealer, player or otherwise, for the purpose of gaming or gambling for money or other valuable things on District Property, except at a fair, carnival, or other organized event conducted, sponsored or authorized by the District.
- <u>Section 2.20</u>. <u>Hunting or Trapping</u>. No Person shall hunt or trap, nor bring any device for hunting or trapping into or onto District Property or District Waters.

Section 2.21. Interference with Other Users.

- (a) No Person shall walk, act, or conduct himself upon any portion of District Property designated for a particular game, sport, event, amusement or other use in such a way as to interfere with the use of such portion by other Persons who are properly using the same for the particular sport, event, game, amusement or other use for which it has been designated.
- (b) No Person shall unreasonably disturb or interfere with any Person occupying an area or participating in any activity on District Property under the authority of a Permit.
- (c) No Person shall engage in any activity on District Property in a manner calculated or which is reasonably likely to endanger, injure, or damage Persons or property in any way.
- <u>Section 2.22</u>. <u>Loitering in District Buildings</u>. No Person shall loiter or remain in any District building or facility in such a manner that: (1) unreasonably obstructs the usual use of entrances, hallways, corridors, stairways, or rooms designated for specific purposes; (2) impedes or disrupts the performance of official duties by District employees; or, (3) prevents the general public from obtaining the administrative or recreational services provided in the building or facility in a timely manner, after being requested to leave by any member of the District Police Force, or where the District has posted a sign or signs that prohibit loitering.

Section 2.23. Misappropriation of Property.

- (a) No Person shall knowingly obtain or exercise unauthorized control over the property of another.
 - (b) No Person shall knowingly obtain by deception control over property of another.
 - (c) No Person shall knowingly obtain by threat control over property of another.
- (d) No Person shall knowingly obtain control over stolen property knowing the property to have been stolen or under such circumstances as would reasonably induce him to believe that the property was stolen, where he:
 - (1) Intends to deprive the owner permanently of the use or benefit of the property; or,
 - (2) Knowingly uses, conceals, or abandons the property in such a manner as to deprive the owner permanently of such use or benefit; or,
 - (3) Uses, conceals, or abandons the property knowing such use, concealment, or abandonment probably will deprive the owner permanently of such use or benefit.

Section 2.24. Mob Action.

- (a) No Person shall collect with other Persons, in bodies or in crowds of two (2) or more Persons without authority of law, for unlawful purposes or any purpose of disturbance or obstruction of the lawful activities of other Persons or otherwise disturb, obstruct, or interfere unreasonably with the lawful activities of other Persons using District Property in a manner which creates immediate violence or breach of the peace or threat thereof or endangers the person or property of others.
- (b) No Person shall knowingly commit an act or engage in conduct that urges or incites other Persons to riot, engage in immediate violence or lawlessness, or commit any unlawful act.
- (c) No Person shall organize, promote, encourage, or otherwise participate in a riot or other breach of the peace involving crowds of two (2) or more Persons gathered, without authority of law, for unlawful purposes or any purpose of disturbance or obstruction of the lawful activities of other Persons.

Section 2.25. Parades, Public Assemblies or Meetings.

- (a) Public parades, processions, theatrical or dramatic presentations, meetings, assemblies, gatherings, and demonstrations, are permitted on District Property provided that where the number of participants is reasonably expected to exceed twelve (12) or more persons and/or vehicles, a Permit therefor must first be obtained from the District in accordance with Chapter V of this Ordinance.
- (b) This section shall not apply to students going to and from school classes or participating in educational activities under the immediate direction and supervision of school authorities or their agents, a governmental agency acting within the scope of its functions, or normal or scheduled District programs or activities.

Section 2.26. Posting Printed or Written Material In Designated Area.

(a) The District shall designate an area for the posting of printed or written public information material ("Community Bulletin Board").

- (b) No Person shall post, place, display, or cause to be posted, placed, or displayed any printed or written material on the Community Bulletin Board without presenting the material to the District. The District shall stamp and date the material as received, and post the material, space permitting, on the Community Bulletin Board unless the said material is obscene as defined in 720 ILCS 5/11-20. The material may remain posted for a period not to exceed one (1) week after which a Person may resubmit his public information notice for posting, space permitting.
- (c) Space on the Community Bulletin Board shall be allocated on a first-come, first-served basis, except that the District's own printed or written public information may be given priority. The printed or written material shall be no larger than 8 1/2 inches x 11 inches and only one copy of each public information notice shall be posted.
- (d) The District may remove printed or written material that has not been posted in accordance with this Section. The Person responsible for said posting shall be liable for the cost incurred in the removal thereof. The provisions of the Illinois Parental Responsibility Law (740 ILCS 115/1 et seq.) are specifically incorporated in this Ordinance by reference for purposes of this section.

Section 2.27. Posting Printed or Written Material On Public Places or Objects.

- (a) Except as provided in Section 2.26 of this Ordinance, no Person shall paint, write on, or in any way mark or deface, or post or otherwise affix, any printed or written words, symbols, materials, or other marks to or upon District Property or any thing or object located on District Property.
- (b) The District may remove any printed or written word, symbol, material, or other mark found posted or otherwise affixed upon any District Property or any thing or object located on District Property contrary to the provisions of this Section. The Person responsible for any such defacing, writing, or posting shall be liable for the cost incurred in the removal thereof. The provisions of the Illinois Parental Responsibility Law (740 ILCS 115/1 et seq.) are specifically incorporated in this Ordinance by reference for purposes of this section.

Section 2.28. Protection of Animals.

- (a) No Person shall hunt, pursue, hurt, molest, wound, kill, trap, catch, poison, abuse, chase, shoot, touch, throw or propel objects at, endanger in any way, remove or cause to be removed, have in his possession, or release or cause to be released, any Wildlife on or upon District Property.
- (b) No Person shall give or offer to any Wildlife any harmful, poisonous, or noxious substance on or upon District Property.
- (c) No Person shall touch, tease, frighten, disturb, or otherwise intentionally interfere with any Wildlife while feeding, nesting, breeding, sleeping, resting, flying or otherwise moving, conducting or participating in any activity on or upon District Property.
- (d) No Person shall molest, touch, throw or propel object at, destroy, dig up, crush, shake, or in any way tamper with or damage the nest, lair, den, burrow, or home of any Wildlife found on or upon District Property.

Section 2.29. Protection of Property.

(a) No Person shall mark, carve, bend, cut, paint, deface, affix any sticker or sign to, break down, destroy, damage, alter, change, sever, uproot, dig, excavate or otherwise remove, or attach or suspend any rope, wire, or other material or contrivance to, on, or from, District Property or any thing or object on or upon District Property, or otherwise take, damage or destroy such Property, thing or object unless a Permit, license or contract therefor has first been obtained from the District.

- (b) No Person shall climb upon, walk on, hang from or stand or sit on, any plant, fence, structure, or other District Property of any kind except such benches or other property designated or customarily used for such purposes, or recreational equipment installed for such purposes.
- (c) No Person shall bring into, throw, cast, drop, deposit, or otherwise leave or lay down any smoke bomb, stink bomb, or other offensive smelling compound on District Property.
- (d) No Person shall bring any plant or portion of a plant or plant product onto District Property.
- (e) The District may give rewards to the Person(s) (other than District employees or agents, or members of the District Police Force) who furnish information to the District, directly resulting in the arrest and conviction of any Person who unlawfully takes, damages, or destroys District Property. All claims for said reward must be made to the District within thirty (30) days after conviction and the District shall be the sole judge of any dispute arising over a reward, if any, and the Person(s) entitled to share therein. The District's decision on any matter connected with the reward shall be final, conclusive, and binding and shall not be subject to judicial review.

Section 2.30. Public Indecency.

- (a) No Person shall perform or commit any of the following acts on District Property:
- (1) An act of sexual penetration or sexual conduct as defined in 720 ILCS 5/12-12; or,
- (2) A lewd exposure of the body done with intent to arouse or to satisfy the sexual desire of the Person.
- (b) No Person shall exhibit, sell, give away, offer to sell or give away, display or hold or place in such a manner as to be open to public view any obscene book, pamphlet, drawing, picture, photograph, model, cast, instrument, or any other obscene article while on or upon District Property. For purposes of this subsection, obscene shall have the meaning ascribed to it in 720 ILCS 5/11-20.
- <u>Section 2.31</u>. <u>Reporting Accidents</u>. A Person involved in an incident on District Property resulting in personal injury or property damage, other than an accident reportable under section 3.08 of this Ordinance, shall report the incident to the District Police Force within twenty-four (24) hours after the incident.

Section 2.32. Restricted Areas.

- (a) No Person shall enter or remain in any building or portion of District Property where Persons are prohibited by the District from entering, or, except as provided in Section 2.34(c) of this Ordinance, where use is restricted to Persons of the opposite sex as indicated by a sign or notice posted by the District.
 - (b) No Person shall enter or remain in any District Property when it is closed to the public.
- (c) No Person shall enter any District Property which is reserved or scheduled for a specific group or activity, unless such Person is invited by the individual, group, or agency responsible for such activity and, if applicable, such Person has paid all appropriate admission and/or registration fees.

Section 2.33. Restrictions Applicable to Specific Recreational Activities.

- (a) Golf. No Person shall play or practice golf on District Property, except when involved in an established golf class under the supervision and direction of the District, or in an area designated for golf and the Person has satisfied all requisites before playing or practicing, including without limitation the paying of appropriate fees.
 - (b) Baseball and Softball Playing.
 - (1) No Person shall engage in softball or baseball games except in those parks which have established diamonds and backstops constructed for that purpose, or such other areas as may be specifically designated by the District;
 - (2) In those parks having established softball or baseball diamonds, participation in softball or baseball in areas other than established diamonds is limited in accordance with signs or notices posted by the District;
 - (3) In those parks having established softball or baseball diamonds, the type of recreation on said diamonds shall be in accordance with posted signs or notices posted by the District.
 - (c) <u>Picnics</u>.
 - (1) Picnics requiring fires shall be held only in those areas where fireplaces, stoves, grills, or pits have been provided for that purpose and upon issuance of a Permit by the District in accordance with Chapter V of this Ordinance;
 - (2) No group of Persons exceeding twelve (12) in number shall picnic on District Property unless a Permit therefor has first been obtained from the District in accordance with Chapter V of this Ordinance. The District may designate areas for preparing, consuming, and dispensing food, beverages and other products. Persons holding a Permit and dispensing any of such products may do so only in the area designated in the Permit. In the event the dispensing of the permitted products is by sale, the Person must also comply with Section 2.09 of this Ordinance. No Person may dispense, prepare, consume, sell or otherwise use products, items or things otherwise prohibited in this Ordinance or any other federal state, local, or District law, rule, regulation or ordinance.
- (d) <u>Classes and Camps</u>. No Person shall bring or cause to be brought onto District Property any class, play class, day camp, or similar organized group activity of any kind unless a Permit allowing such use or activity has first been obtained from the District in accordance with Chapter V of this Ordinance.
- (e) <u>Tournaments, Leagues, or Other Organized Recreational Activities</u>. No Person shall utilize any District Property, including without limitation playing fields and other District facilities, for tournaments, leagues, or other organized recreational activities and outings unless a Permit allowing such use or activity has first been obtained from the District in accordance with Chapter V of this Ordinance.
- (f) This section does not apply to normal or scheduled District programs or activities. Where a conflict between normal or scheduled District programs or activities and a requested activity occurs, District programs and activities shall take precedence.

Section 2.34. Rest Rooms, Washrooms and Locker Rooms.

(a) Every Person shall cooperate in maintaining rest rooms, washrooms and locker rooms in a neat and sanitary condition.

- (b) No Person shall deposit objects of any kind in the toilets or plumbing fixtures of a rest room, washroom facility or locker room.
- (c) Only Persons four (4) years of age and under may use rest rooms, washrooms and locker rooms designated for the opposite sex.
- (d) Only persons six (6) years of age and under may use rest rooms, washrooms and locker rooms designated for families.
- (e) No Person shall use any camera, video recorder or other device to record or transmit visual image(s) in or from any rest room, washroom facility or locker room of the District.
- <u>Section 2.35</u>. <u>Rollerskates, Skateboards, and Other Similar Objects</u>. No Person using rollerskates, rollerblades, skateboards, rollerskis, coasting vehicles, or similar devices shall interfere with pedestrian use of sidewalks or Vehicle use of the streets, or otherwise act negligently, recklessly or without due caution, or in any manner so as to endanger any Person or property nor use same where such use has been posted as prohibited.

Section 2.36. Selling or Distributing Printed or Written Material.

- (a) The distribution of printed or written material available without cost or donation is permitted on District Property.
- (b) The sale or distribution for donation of printed or written material is permitted on District Property provided that a Permit therefor has first been obtained from the District in accordance with Chapter V of this Ordinance.
- (c) Any Person engaged in the sale or distribution of printed or written materials under this Section 2.36 shall not obstruct or impede pedestrians or Vehicles, harass park visitors with physical contact or persistent demands, misrepresent the affiliations of those engaged in such activities, misrepresent whether the materials are available without cost or donation, or interfere, interrupt, or engage in conduct incompatible with the purpose of any program, activity, function, and/or special event conducted or sponsored by the District.

Section 2.37. Sledding, Ice Skating, and Snowmobiling.

- (a) No Person shall skate, sled, toboggan, innertube, ski, slide, or engage in similar activities on District Property except at such places and at such times as the District may designate for such purposes.
- (b) No Person shall engage in any such activity in a reckless manner that endangers themselves or others or at a speed greater than is safe and proper under the circumstances.
- (c) No Person shall tow, push, pull, or otherwise propel another Person on skis, sled, or other sliding device by use of any Vehicle on District Property.
- (d) No Person shall drive, ride, or otherwise operate a snowmobile on District Property. For purposes of this subsection, a snowmobile shall be defined as any self-propelled vehicle intended for travel primarily on snow, driven by a track or tracks in contact with the snow, and steered by ski or skis in contact with the snow.

- <u>Section 2.38.</u> <u>Sleeping on District Property</u>. Except as permitted in Section 2.07 of this Ordinance, no Person shall sleep on benches, sidewalks, parking lots, picnic grounds or tables, playgrounds or playground equipment, stairways or doorways of District buildings or other District Property so as to unreasonably obstruct or hinder the movement of other Persons or the use of facilities.
- <u>Section 2.39</u>. <u>Smoking</u>. Smoking or any use of a tobacco product is prohibited in all District buildings, facilities and Vehicles, except in designated areas of the Chevy Chase Country Club. Smoking is also prohibited in all wooded areas on District Property and within 100 feet of any point on a soccer, baseball, or football field, tennis court, or basketball court.
- <u>Section 2.40</u>. <u>Swimming</u>. No Person shall bathe, swim, wade, float, splash, or otherwise enter District Waters except at such times and places and in compliance with all policies, rules and regulations as the District may designate for such activities.
- Section 2.41. Weapons, Fireworks, Explosives, Rockets. No Person shall bring onto, carry, have in his possession or on or about his person, concealed or otherwise, or use, fire, set off or otherwise cause to explode, discharge or burn, or throw onto or while on District Property any bludgeon, black-jack, billy club, sand-club, sand-bag, metal knuckles, throwing star, switchblade knife, ballistic knife, any other dangerous knife (including without limitation a dirk, dagger, or stiletto), razor, broken bottle or other dangerous piece of glass, firearm, pistol, revolver, rifle, shotgun, automatic weapon, firearm silencer, air gun, pellet gun, stun gun or taser, bow and arrow, slingshot, any weapon capable of discharging a projectile by air, spirit, gas or explosive, any explosive substance, rocket, firecracker or other firework, missile, bomb, grenade, or other explosive device, liquid or gaseous substance, any other dangerous weapon, or any object whose intended use is as a weapon, not specifically named herein. All weapons named herein shall have the definitions, if any, set forth in 720 ILCS 5/24-1.

CHAPTER III - MOTORIZED VEHICLES, PARKING, AND TRAFFIC CONTROL

Section 3.01. All-Terrain Vehicles. No Person shall drive, ride, or otherwise operate an all-terrain Vehicle on District Property. For purposes of this section, an all-terrain Vehicle shall be defined as any motorized off-highway device 50 inches or less in width, having a manufacturer's dry weight of 600 pounds or less, travelling on three (3) or more low-pressure tires, designed with a seat or saddle for operator use, and handlebars or steering wheel for steering control.

Section 3.02. Bicycles.

- (a) When two (2) or more Persons in a group are operating bicycles on District Property, they shall not ride abreast, but shall ride in single file.
- (b) No Person operating a bicycle on District Property shall cling or attach himself or his bicycle to any other moving Vehicle.
- (c) The operator of a bicycle emerging from an alley, driveway or building on District Property shall, upon approaching a sidewalk or the sidewalk area extending across any alley or driveway, yield the right-of-way to all pedestrians approaching on said sidewalk or sidewalk area, and upon entering the roadway shall yield the right-of-way to all Vehicles approaching on said roadway.
- (d) No Person operating a bicycle on District Property shall carry another Person on the same bicycle. This restriction does not apply to tandem bicycles equipped with two or more seats or saddles or an ordinary bicycle equipped with a seat or saddle for an infant or small child if used properly. In that event, there shall be only the number of Persons on the bicycle as there are seats or saddles.

- (e) No Person shall operate a bicycle on District Property between 30 minutes after sunset and 30 minutes before sunrise, without a clear, white, properly lighted headlight, visible under normal atmospheric conditions from the front thereof for not less than 500 feet and firmly attached to the bicycle, and without a red reflector firmly attached to the bicycle, which is clearly visible in the headlight beam of an automobile for a distance of 500 feet to the rear of the bicycle.
- (f) No Person shall operate a bicycle on District playgrounds, ball fields, tennis courts, or sidewalks except that children under the age of 4 years old riding three- or more-wheeled cycles may operate such cycles on sidewalks while under the supervision and control of an adult.
- (g) No Person shall ride a bicycle on any District street or path where signs are posted prohibiting riding bicycles.
- (h) Bicycles shall not, at any time, in any place, be indiscriminately parked on District Property in such manner as to interfere with pedestrian or vehicular traffic, or with Persons getting into or out of Vehicles. No Person shall leave a bicycle on District Property lying on the ground or paving or set against trees or otherwise in a place other than a bicycle rack when such is provided and there is space available. No Person shall move or in any manner interfere with, any bicycle which is properly parked on District Property, nor shall any Person interfere with, or, in any manner, hinder any Person from properly parking a bicycle.
- (i) All bicycles, when operated on District roadways, shall be kept to the right and shall be operated as nearly as practicable to the right-hand edge of the roadway.
- (j) No Person shall operate a bicycle on District Property unless the bicycle is equipped with a signaling device (e.g. bell or horn), in good working order and audible at a distance of 100 feet when sounded.
- (k) No Person shall operate a bicycle on District Property at a speed faster than is reasonable and proper under the circumstances, and every bicycle shall be operated with reasonable regard for the safety of the rider and of other Persons and property.
- (I) Every Person operating a bicycle on District Property shall obey all federal, state, local, and District traffic laws, rules, and regulations applicable to motor Vehicles, except those provisions which by their nature can have no application to the operation of a bicycle and except as otherwise provided by this section.
- <u>Section 3.03</u>. <u>Change of Oil/Cleaning</u>. No Person shall change the oil or grease of, or wash, clean or polish Vehicles on District Property, unless a Permit therefor has first been obtained from the District in accordance with Chapter V of this Ordinance.

Section 3.04. Commercial Vehicles.

- (a) The term "commercial vehicles" as used in this section shall include, but not be limited to trucks, station wagons, vans, pickups, passenger cars, or other Vehicles when used in transporting Persons or movable property for a fee or profit, either as a direct charge to another Person, or otherwise, or used as incident to providing services to another Person, or used in connection with any business.
- (b) All roadways on District Property shall be used for pleasure driving only. No Person, other than District employees, shall drive any truck, tractor or other commercial vehicle of any kind on District Property without first obtaining a contract therefor from the District.

- (c) This section shall not apply to commercial vehicles making authorized deliveries to or performing authorized services for the District.
- <u>Section 3.05</u>. <u>Driving Areas</u>. No motor Vehicle shall be driven or otherwise operated upon District Property except over and upon such roadways, parking lots, or other areas designated or marked by the District for use by motor Vehicles. A bicycle path shall not be deemed a roadway for the use of motor Vehicles under this section.
- <u>Section 3.06</u>. <u>Duty of Operator in Accidents</u>. No Person shall leave the scene of a collision with another Vehicle, Person or property occurring on District Property, without giving his true name and residence address to the injured Person or any other Person or member of the District Police Force requesting same, and in the event no public officer is present, he must immediately report the occurrence to the nearest police station or police headquarters.

Section 3.07. Emergency Vehicles.

- (a) For purposes of this section, emergency Vehicles shall include all ambulances, fire trucks, police, fire, and ranger cars, and other Vehicles used to protect the public health, safety, and welfare.
- (b) The provisions of this chapter regulating the movement or parking of Vehicles on District Property shall not apply to the operator of any emergency Vehicle when responding to an emergency call or pursuing an actual or suspected violator of the law. However, such operator shall exercise extreme caution when on or approaching District Property including without limitation slowing down as necessary for safety, cautiously proceeding through traffic lights or stop signs, and having the Vehicle's warning system signals operating (e.g. siren, lights).
- (c) During non-emergency times, when not responding to an emergency call or in the pursuit of an actual or suspected violator of the law, the operator of an emergency Vehicle shall obey the provisions of this Chapter.
- (d) Every Person operating a Vehicle on District Property shall, at the immediate approach of an emergency Vehicle making use of its warning system signals, yield the right-of-way and shall stop, if possible, and pull to the side of the road and remain in such position until the emergency Vehicle has passed, unless otherwise directed by a member of the District Police Force.
- <u>Section 3.08.</u> <u>Enforcement of Traffic Regulations</u>. No Person shall fail to obey a member of the District Police Force or other District employee who is directing traffic or enforcing sections of this Chapter on District Property.
- <u>Section 3.09</u>. <u>Fleeing or Attempting to Elude the District Police Force</u>. No Person driving or otherwise operating a motor Vehicle on District Property shall willfully fail or refuse to obey a visual or audible signal by a member of the District Police Force to bring his Vehicle to a stop. The signal given by a member of the District Police Force may be by hand, voice, siren, or red or blue light. The member of the District Police Force giving such signal shall be in uniform or driving a Vehicle appropriately marked showing it to be an official District Police Force Vehicle.
- <u>Section 3.10</u>. <u>Gas and Smoke</u>. No Person shall drive or otherwise operate a Vehicle on District Property which emits excessive noxious fumes or dense smoke.
- <u>Section 3.11</u>. <u>Hitchhiking</u>. No Person shall solicit a ride nor stand in or near a roadway on District Property for the purpose of soliciting a ride from the operator of any Vehicle.

Section 3.12. Incorporation of State Statutes. In addition to the provisions of this Chapter, and to the extent not inconsistent therewith, no Person shall drive or otherwise operate a Vehicle or perform any act in any manner on District Property in violation of Chapters 11 and 12 of the Illinois Vehicle Code (625 ILCS 5/11-100 et seq. and 625 ILCS 5/12-100 et seq.) which provisions are specifically incorporated in this Ordinance by reference.

Section 3.13. Intoxicated Operators.

- (a) No Person shall drive or otherwise operate nor attempt to drive or otherwise operate a Vehicle on District Property while under the influence of intoxicating liquor, drugs, or a combination of liquor and drugs.
- (b) Upon trial for such offense, in addition to other evidence, evidence of the amount of alcohol in the Person at the time of the act alleged, as shown by a chemical analysis of his breath, blood, urine, saliva, or other bodily substances, is admissible, and the result of such analysis shall give rise to the presumptions set forth in Section 11-501.2(b) of the Illinois Vehicle Code (625 ILCS 5/11-501.2(b)) which provision is specifically incorporated in this Ordinance by reference.
- <u>Section 3.14.</u> <u>Minibikes and Trailbikes</u>. No Person shall drive, ride, or otherwise operate any minibike or trailbike on District Property. For purposes of this section, every motor Vehicle which is self-propelled by power obtained by the combustion of gasoline which is designed with a seat or a saddle for the use of the rider, and is designed to travel mostly off-road on not more than three (3) wheels shall be a minibike or trailbike.
- <u>Section 3.15.</u> <u>Negligent Driving.</u> No Person shall drive or otherwise operate a Vehicle on District Property negligently, recklessly or without due caution, or in any manner so as to endanger any Person or property. All Vehicles shall be driven or otherwise operated on the right side of any roadway open to travel, except when passing other Vehicles.

Section 3.16. Parking.

- (a) No Person shall park a Vehicle on District Property in other than established or designated parking areas, and such shall be in accordance with the posted directions and markings or with the directions of any attendant who may be present.
- (b) No Person shall park any Vehicle or allow any Vehicle to remain parked in any area of District Property beyond the normal closing hour of the park system, except when a different closing hour has been designated by the District for that area or unless permission therefor has first been obtained from the District. In no event shall any Vehicle except District Vehicles be parked on District Property later than 11:30 p.m., except with the approval of the District which approval shall automatically be deemed given in connection with activities conducted by the District.
- (c) No Person shall stop, park, or place any Vehicle on District Property so as to obstruct or interfere with traffic or travel or endanger the public safety, and no Person shall stop, park, or place any Vehicle in any of the following places except when otherwise designated, or when necessary to avoid conflict with other traffic or when in compliance with the instructions of a member of the District Police Force: (1) on the left side of any roadway; (2) on parkways, lawn areas, and grounds; (3) in front of a public or private driveway; (4) within any intersection; (5) within any crosswalk; (6) within 20 feet of any intersection or crosswalk; (7) within 30 feet of any stop sign or traffic control signal; (8) on the roadway side of any Vehicle stopped or parked at the edge or curb of the roadway; (9) in a position to block another Vehicle lawfully parked; (10) on any sidewalk; (11) at any place where official signs or other markings prohibit parking, or where curbs have been painted yellow; (12) within 15 feet of a fire hydrant; (13) in a fire lane or within 8 feet of the entrance to a fire lane; (14) within 20 feet of the driveway entrance to any fire station and on the side of a street opposite the entrance to any fire

station within 75 feet of such entrance (when properly sign-posted); (15) between a safety zone and the adjacent curb or within 30 feet of points on the curb immediately opposite the ends of a safety zone, unless a different length is indicated by signs or markings; (16) alongside or opposite any street excavation or obstruction when stopping, standing, or parking would obstruct traffic; (17) upon any bridge or other elevated structure upon a roadway, or within a roadway tunnel; (18) on any railroad tracks or within 50 feet of the nearest rail of a railroad crossing; (19) on a controlled-access roadway; (20) in the area between roadways of a divided highway, including without limitation crossovers; and, (21) at any place or time where a permit or sticker is required by the District for parking unless the required permit or sticker has been obtained and is displayed on the Vehicle.

- (d) No Person shall park a Vehicle upon any roadway or in any public off-street parking facility on District Property for any of the following purposes:
 - (1) To display such Vehicle for sale; or,
 - (2) To perform maintenance or repair of such Vehicle, except for repairs necessitated by an emergency; or,
 - (3) To sell goods or services from such Vehicle.
- (e) The operator of an authorized emergency Vehicle, as defined in section 3.09 of this Ordinance, may park or stand irrespective of the provisions of this Ordinance.
- (f) Every Person in whose name a Vehicle is registered pursuant to law and who leases such Vehicle to others, after receiving written notice of a violation of this Ordinance involving such Vehicle, shall upon request provide the District with a written statement of the name and address of the lessee at the time of such offense and the identifying number upon the registration plates and registration sticker or stickers of such Vehicle.
- (g) No Person who is the lessor of a Vehicle pursuant to a written lease agreement shall be liable for the violation of any parking or standing regulation of this Ordinance involving such Vehicle during the period of the lease provided that upon the District's request received within 120 days after the violation occurred, the lessor provides within 60 days after such receipt the name and address of the lessee. The driver's license number may also be requested by the District if needed for enforcement of this Ordinance.
- (h) Except as otherwise provided, every Vehicle stopped or parked upon a two-way roadway on District Property shall be stopped or parked with the right-hand wheels parallel to and within twelve (12) inches of the right-hand curb or as close as practicable to the right edge of the right-hand shoulder.
- (i) No Person shall move a Vehicle not lawfully under his control into any such prohibited area or away from a curb such distance as is unlawful.
- (j) Except as otherwise provided, every Vehicle stopped or parked upon a one-way roadway on District Property shall be so stopped or parked parallel to the curb or edge of the roadway, in the direction of authorized traffic movement, with its right-hand wheels within twelve (12) inches of the right-hand curb or as close as practicable to the right edge of the right-hand shoulder, or with its left-hand wheels within twelve (12) inches of the left-hand curb or as close as practicable to the left edge of the left-hand shoulder.

(k) Penalty Provisions for Parking Violations.

- (1) Whenever any Vehicle shall have been parked in violation of any section of this Ordinance prohibiting or restricting vehicular standing or parking, the Person in whose name the Vehicle is registered with the Secretary of State of Illinois shall be prima facie responsible for the violation and subject to the penalty therefor.
- Whenever any Vehicle is parked in violation of any parking provision of this Ordinance, any law enforcement officer observing such violation may issue a parking violation notice, and serve the notice on the owner of the Vehicle by handing it to the operator of the Vehicle, if he is present, or by affixing it to the Vehicle in a conspicuous place. The issuer of the notice shall specify on the notice his identification number, the particular parking regulation allegedly violated, the make and state registration number of the cited Vehicle, and the place, date, time, and nature of the alleged violation and shall certify the correctness of the specified information by signing his name to the notice.
- (3) A parking violation notice issued, signed, and served in accordance with this section, or a copy of such notice, shall be prima facie correct and shall be prima facie evidence of the correctness of the fact, shown therein. The notice or copy thereof shall be admissible in any subsequent administrative or legal proceeding.
- (4) Any violation of the parking provisions of this Ordinance or any provision of the Illinois Motor Vehicle Code prohibiting or restricting vehicular standing or parking shall be a civil offense punishable by fine, and no criminal penalty, or civil sanction other than that prescribed in this Ordinance, shall be imposed.
- (5) Any Person who violates or fails to comply with any provision of this section shall be fined \$25.00 for each offense.
- (6) Any Person on whom a parking violation notice has been served shall within fourteen (14) days from the date of the notice either pay the indicated fine or, in the manner indicated on the notice, request a court hearing to contest the charge, violation, or violations.
- (7) If no response is made in accordance with subsection (k)(6) of this section, the Clerk of the Circuit Court shall serve a second notice of violation, by first-class mail, postage prepaid, to the address of the registered owner of the cited Vehicle as recorded with the Secretary of State of Illinois. The notice shall specify the date of a violation, and make and state registration of the cited Vehicle, the Ordinance or Code provision violated, the applicable fine and penalty in an amount equal to the relevant fine to be paid by the final notice date or request for hearing. The final notice date for payment shall be 21 days from the initial due date.
- (8) If the respondent requests a court hearing in person to contest the cited violation or violations, the Clerk of the Circuit Court shall notify the respondent in writing of the time and place of the hearing.
- (9) A notice sent pursuant to subsections (k)(6), (7), and/or (8) shall state that failure to pay the indicated fine or failure to request a court hearing will constitute a debt due and owing the District, and as such may be collected in accordance with applicable law. Payment in full of any fine and/or penalty resulting from a standing or parking violation shall constitute a final disposition of that violation.
- (10) The Clerk of the Circuit Court shall notify the County State's Attorney of each respondent who fails to make payment or who fails to request a court hearing pursuant to subsections (k)(6), (7), (8), and/or (9). Upon being notified by the Clerk of the Circuit Court, the County State's Attorney shall institute a civil action against the respondent in an amount of the fine plus a penalty double the relevant fine and costs. Any action instituted and proceeding therein shall be conducted in accordance with the Rules of the Circuit Court of Cook County, the Civil Practice Act and the laws, rules and regulations of the State of Illinois.

Section 3.17. Riding Outside Vehicles.

- (a) No Person shall ride upon the fenders, running boards, bumpers, hood, or any other exterior part of any Vehicle on District Property.
- (b) No Person shall cling or attach himself, his Vehicle, or any other object, to any other Vehicle on District Property.

Section 3.18. Right of Way.

- (a) Every operator of a Vehicle shall yield the right of way to a pedestrian at any marked crosswalk or within any unmarked crosswalk at any intersection on District Property.
- (b) Every operator of a Vehicle shall exercise due care to avoid colliding with pedestrians upon any roadway on District Property, shall give warning to any pedestrian in the roadway by sounding the horn when necessary, and shall exercise proper precaution upon observing any child, confused Person, or disabled Person upon a roadway.
- (c) Every pedestrian crossing at a roadway on District Property at any point other than within a marked crosswalk or within an unmarked crosswalk at any intersection shall yield the right of way to Vehicles upon the roadway.
- (d) Except as otherwise provided herein, the operator of a Vehicle approaching an intersection on District Property shall yield the right-of-way to a Vehicle which has already entered the intersection from a different roadway. When two (2) Vehicles approach an unmarked intersection from different roadways at approximately the same time, the operator of the Vehicle on the left shall yield the right-of-way to the Vehicle on the right.
- <u>Section 3.19.</u> <u>Siren Devices.</u> No Person shall sound any siren-sounding device or other type of signaling device which makes unusually loud or unnecessary noise on District Property unless that Person is driving or operating an authorized emergency Vehicle, as defined under section 3.09, responding to an emergency call, or pursuing an actual or suspected violator of the law.

Section 3.20. Speeding.

Except as provided in Section 3.09(b) of this Ordinance:

- (a) No Person shall drive or otherwise operate a Vehicle on District Property at a speed greater than is reasonable and safe under the circumstances, having due regard for traffic, pedestrians, weather conditions and the intended use of the roadway and at no time at a speed greater than 10 miles per hour.
- (b) No Person shall drive or otherwise operate a Vehicle on District Property at a speed which endangers the safety of any Person or property.

Section 3.21. Traffic Signs and Signals.

- (a) No Person shall fail to observe all traffic signs indicating speed, direction, caution, stopping, parking, crosswalk lanes, traffic lane markers, and any other sign posted by the District for safeguarding life and property.
- (b) No Person shall deface, injure, move, or otherwise interfere with any traffic sign or signal on District Property.

<u>Section 3.22</u>. <u>Unattended Motor Vehicles</u>. No Person driving, operating, or otherwise in charge of a motor Vehicle on District Property shall permit it to stand unattended without first stopping the engine, locking the ignition and removing the keys. When the motor Vehicle is standing upon any perceptible grade, the Person shall set the parking brake thereon and turn the front wheels to the curb or side of the roadway.

Section 3.23. Unauthorized Use of Parking Places Reserved for Handicapped Persons.

- (a) For purposes of this section, handicapped person means every natural person who is unable to walk 200 feet or more unassisted by another person or without the aid of a walker, crutches, braces, prosthetic device, or a wheelchair or without great difficulty or discomfort due to the following impairments: neurological, orthopedic, respiratory, cardiac, arthritic disorder, blindness, or the loss of function or absence of a limb or limbs.
- (b) No Person shall park on District Property any motor Vehicle which is not bearing registration plates or decals issued to a handicapped person, pursuant to 625 ILCS 5/3-616, 11-1301.1, 11-1301.2, or to a disabled veteran pursuant to 625 5/3-609 of the Illinois Vehicle Code which provisions are specifically incorporated in this Ordinance by reference, as evidence that the Vehicle is operated by or for a handicapped person or disabled veteran, in any parking place, including without limitation any private or public off-street parking facility, specifically reserved by the District, by the posting of an official sign as designated under 625 ILCS 5/11-301, for motor Vehicles bearing such registration plates. Any motor Vehicle bearing a handicapped license plate or a handicapped parking decal or device containing the international symbol of access issued to handicapped persons by any local authority, state, district, territory or foreign country shall be recognized by the District as a valid license plate or devise and receive the same parking privileges as handicapped residents of this State.
- (c) The District may remove or cause to be removed to the nearest garage or other place of safety any Vehicle parked within a stall or space reserved for use by the handicapped which does not display handicapped registration plates or a special decal or devise as required by this section.
- (d) Any Person found guilty of violating the provisions of this section shall be fined \$100 in addition to any costs or charges connected with the removal or storage of any motor Vehicle authorized under this section.

CHAPTER IV - PARK HOURS, CLOSING, AND GENERAL OPERATION POLICIES

Section 4.01. Hours.

- (a) Except as otherwise provided in this Section 4.01, District Property shall be open to the public from sunrise in the morning until sunset in the evening of that same day and District Property shall be closed to the public from sunset each day until sunrise the following day. Lighted fields shall remain open to the public so long as the lights are illuminated.
- (b) The Board may establish other hours during which District Property or any parts thereof shall be closed to the public. The Board may periodically revise these hours.
- <u>Section 4.02</u>. <u>Special Closings</u>. The Board or the Director may close one or more District parks, buildings, and facilities or any part thereof to the public at any time and for any interval of time, either temporarily or at regular intervals, and either entirely or merely to certain uses, as deemed advisable and in the best interest of the public and District.

- <u>Section 4.03</u>. <u>Use of Closed Property Prohibited</u>. No Person shall use, occupy, be in, or remain upon District Property or leave any personal property in or upon District Property which is closed to the public, or after closing hours, unless permission therefor has first been obtained from the District.
- <u>Section 4.04.</u> Schedules, Fees, Rules, and Regulations. Time schedules for the operation of, and the activities to be conducted on, District Property and the amount of facility, Permit and program fees, may be reviewed and approved periodically by the Board. As permitted by law, fees charged non-residents of the District need not be the same as fees charged residents of the District. The Board may otherwise establish policies, rules and regulations for proper conduct by Persons using District Property. Specific policies, rules and regulations pertaining to District Property and programs may be posted at or on the applicable District Property and/or published in District program brochures or otherwise made available to the users of District Property, who shall be charged with actual knowledge thereof. All Persons shall abide by all District policies, rules and regulations and with the direct orders or requests of employees and agents of the District when using District Property.
- <u>Section 4.05.</u> <u>Admission/Identification.</u> No Person shall enter into, be, or remain in or upon District Property without paying proper admission fees, without complying with registration requirements, if any, which may be established by the District, and without displaying the required admission identification. All admission identification cards, papers and tickets are non-transferable and must be individually registered, unless otherwise specifically noted thereon. A charge may be made by the District for replacing lost admission identification cards, papers and tickets.

Section 4.06. Lost, Found, and Abandoned Property.

- (a) No Person shall abandon property on District Property.
- (b) Property left unattended for longer than twenty-four (24) hours or unattended property that interferes with any park visitors' safety, orderly management of the park area, or presents a threat to park resources may be impounded or removed by the District at any time. The owner of such property shall be responsible and liable for all costs and expenses associated with the impounding, removal, storage, or other disposal of the property.
- (c) Any Person finding lost or unattended property on District Property shall report such finding to the District as soon as is practicable. Whenever a District employee or agent finds lost or unattended property on District Property he shall report such find to his Division Head. The District will attempt to make every reasonable effort to locate the property's owner(s).
- (d) Unattended property that has been impounded or property that has been found shall be stored for a minimum period of thirty (30) days. Unless claimed by the owner or an authorized agent thereof, the property may be claimed by the finder of such property unless the finder is an employee, officer, or agent of the District or Board. All property not claimed shall be disposed of as the District deems appropriate.
- <u>Section 4.07</u>. <u>Building Use</u>. No Person shall use any District building or facility for an event or activity which is not conducted or sponsored by the District unless a Permit therefor has first been obtained from the District in accordance with Chapter V of this Ordinance and/or a license agreement has been executed with the District. All Persons using District buildings or facilities shall comply with the provisions of this Ordinance and with the provisions and conditions of the Permit and/or license agreement and with all other applicable policies, rules, and regulations of the District regarding the use of District Property.

CHAPTER V - PERMITS AND OTHER AUTHORITY

Section 5.01. Permits.

- (a) Permits may be granted upon proper application and approval where the applicable section of this Ordinance or any other District ordinance, policy, rule, or regulation provides for the issuing of a Permit in order to engage in a particular activity.
- (b) Every Person requesting a Permit shall complete and file a written application with the Director, on forms provided by the District, and pay applicable application fees at the District's administrative offices located at 333 W. Dundee Road, Wheeling, Illinois. When received, the application shall be dated and stamped as received and a receipt issued to the applicant.
- (c) Except as provided in subsection 5.01(c)(1), applications for Permits must be received by the District at least forty-eight (48) hours prior to the activity for which a Permit is sought.
 - (1) This application deadline shall not apply to applications for Permits under sections 2.02, 2.09, 2.33 and any other section of this Ordinance or any other District ordinance, rule, or regulation not involving the exercise of First Amendment rights. For such Permits, applications must be received by the District at least three (3) weeks prior to the requested activity.
- (d) Except as provided in subsection 5.01(d)(6), the District shall issue the Permit without unreasonable delay unless:
 - (1) The proposed activity violates any federal, state, local, or District law, rule, or regulation; or,
 - (2) A prior application for a Permit for the same date, time, and location has been or will be granted and the activities authorized by that Permit do not reasonably allow multiple occupancy of that particular area; or,
 - (3) The proposed activity is of such a nature that it cannot reasonably be accommodated in the particular location applied for, considering, without limitation, the likelihood of such things as damage to park resources or facilities, damage to an environmentally sensitive or protected area's ecosystem, impairment of a protected area's atmosphere of peace and tranquility, unreasonable interference with District functions, buildings, facilities, operations, programs or activities, or unreasonable interference with the use or purpose of the District Property applied for; or,
 - (4) The proposed activity would substantially impair the operation or use of facilities or services of District concessionaires or contractors; or,
 - (5) The proposed activity would so dominate the use of District Property as to preclude other Persons from using and enjoying the park.
 - (6) This subsection 5.01(d) is not applicable to applications for commercial activity Permits under sections 2.09 and 2.16 of this Ordinance and Permits for alcohol under section 2.02. The District reserves the right to exercise its discretion in issuing Permits under sections 2.02, 2.09 and 2.16.
- The District shall have at least twenty-four (24) hours from the time of the application's receipt to review the application. However, for applications under section 2.16 of this Ordinance, the District shall have at least forty-eight (48) hours from the time of the application's receipt to review the application. For applications under sections 2.02, 2.09, 2.33 and any other section of this Ordinance or any other District ordinance, rule, or regulation not involving the exercise of First Amendment rights, the District shall have at least two (2) weeks from the time of the application's receipt to review the application. However, the District reserves the right to take additional time to review any application. If the District determines that it will exercise this right, it shall notify the applicant within twenty-four (24) hours after the District's receipt of the application.

- (f) If the application is approved, the District shall issue a written Permit to the applicant. If the application is denied, the District shall issue to the applicant written reasons for denying the application.
- (g) If an application is denied on the basis of a scheduling conflict or inappropriateness of the location, duration, or time of the activity, the District will make a reasonable effort to arrange an alternative that is acceptable to all parties. If an application under sections 2.08, 2.25 or 2.36 is denied, or the applicant is dissatisfied with such Permit as issued, he may appeal the decision to the Board within ten (10) days after the decision is rendered. If the Board rejects the appeal after full review, or if time for full review is not available, the applicant may appeal the decision to the appropriate state or federal court. All other decisions on the issuance of Permits by the District are final.
- (h) Any Permit granted by the District may contain lawful prerequisites to the issuing of the Permit and restrictions on the conduct of the permitted activity including without limitation: general liability insurance coverage; an agreement to fully indemnify and hold the District harmless from any liability or costs resulting from the activity; a requirement that the Persons involved in the activity observe all federal, state, local, and District laws, rules, and regulations; time, duration, and location restrictions; restoration deposit; a written agreement by the applicant to fully restore any District Property soiled or damaged by the activity; and, any reasonable restriction necessary for the efficient and orderly contemporaneous administration of the activity, other activities with a Permit, and regular District uses, functions, programs, and activities.
- (i) Any Person holding a valid Permit issued by the District for use of District Property shall take precedence for use of that District Property over any Person other than the District.
- (j) The District may make necessary changes or place necessary additional restrictions on any Permit after it has been issued.
- (k) Violation of the terms and conditions associated with the Permit may result in the suspension or revocation of the Permit.
- (I) Except as provided in subsections 5.01(I)(1)(2), no Permit shall be issued for a period in excess of seven (7) consecutive days. A Permit may be extended for like periods of time upon a new application, unless another Person has requested use of the same location and multiple use of that location is not reasonably possible.
 - (1) This subsection shall not apply to Permits granted under section 2.09 of this Ordinance. For Permits granted under section 2.09, the District shall determine the length of time that a Permit will be valid.
 - (2) This subsection shall not apply to Permits granted under section 2.36 of this Ordinance for newsracks or newsstands. Such Permits granted under section 2.36 shall be issued for a period of six (6) months.

Section 5.02. Insurance and Hold Harmless Agreement.

(a) Except as provided in subsection 5.02(a)(1), every applicant for a Permit shall acquire general liability insurance to protect himself and the District from liability resulting from his use of District Property and provide proof of such insurance to the District before the District will issue a Permit to an otherwise valid applicant. The District must be named on such policy as additional insured. Where possible, an applicant may acquire a rider to the District's insurance policy at the applicant's cost and expense. Applicants should contact the District's administrative office for more information.

- (1) For activities involving the exercise of First Amendment rights, including without limitation parades, public gatherings, speeches and rallies, this requirement may be waived by the District if the applicant can demonstrate that he or his organization cannot procure general liability insurance or that the cost of procuring such insurance or acquiring a rider to the District's insurance policy is prohibitive.
- (b) Every applicant must execute and deliver to the Park District an agreement to indemnify and hold the District harmless from legal liability, property damage or injury to persons caused by the negligent or unlawful acts of the applicant or any member, volunteer, employee, agent, participant, or other Person associated with the applicant or his group or organization.

Section 5.03. Restoration Deposit.

- (a) A restoration deposit may be required for any Permit. The District shall refund the deposit if the Person responsible for the activity cleans any refuse caused or left by the activity or the activity's participants and restores District Property to the condition it was in prior to the activity to the District's satisfaction. If the District is required to cleanup or restore District Property after the activity, the Person responsible for the activity shall reimburse the District for all costs and expenses associated with the cleanup and restoration. The cost of the cleanup and restoration shall be taken from the restoration deposit. If there are any funds remaining after the cleanup and restoration costs have been subtracted, they shall be returned to the appropriate Person. If the costs and expenses for the cleanup and restoration exceed the amount of the restoration deposit, the District reserves the right to pursue any and all legal options.
- (b) If the restoration deposit would create a financial hardship for the applicant which the applicant can so demonstrate, the District may accept a written agreement to cleanup and restore District Property after the activity. If the applicant does not satisfactorily perform according to the agreement, the District reserves the right to pursue any and all legal options.
- <u>Section 5.04.</u> Other Authority. Activities otherwise prohibited under this Ordinance, or any other District ordinance, policy, rule, or regulation may be conducted or engaged in by a Person, his agents and/or employees, if done in strict conformance with the provisions of an agreement with the District which has been duly authorized by the Board.

CHAPTER VI - ENFORCEMENT

Section 6.01. Police/Security Force.

- (a) The District Police Force shall be the conservators of the peace on District Property, and shall be responsible for the enforcement of all federal, state, local, and District laws, rules, and regulations on District Property.
- (b) The members of the District Police Force shall have the authority to eject from District Property, arrest, or issue citations to any Person who violates any applicable federal, state, local, or District law, rule, or regulation on District Property.
- <u>Section 6.02</u>. <u>Rules to be Obeyed</u>. No Person shall violate or disobey any provision of this Ordinance or any other District ordinance, policy, rule or regulation regulating conduct or activities on District Property even though the same may not have been posted. No Person shall violate or disobey the directions or instructions contained in any notice or sign posted by the District relating to the use of District Property, or the directions or instructions of any member of the District Police Force, or any employee of the District seeking to enforce compliance with federal, state, local or District laws, rules, or regulations.

Section 6.03. Parties to Ordinance Violation.

- (a) Every Person who commits, attempts to commit, conspires to commit, or aids or abets in the commission of any act in violation of this Ordinance or other ordinance, rule or regulation of the District, as a principal, agent, or accessory, shall be guilty of such offense, and every Person who falsely, fraudulently, forcibly or wilfully induces, causes, coerces, requires, permits, or directs another to violate any provision of this Ordinance is likewise guilty of such offense.
- (b) Any Person who is the owner, registered owner, or Person in control of any animal, Vehicle or other property of any kind brought, placed, parked or allowed to remain on District Property in violation of this Ordinance or other District ordinance, rule, or regulation, shall be deemed prima facie responsible for such violation and shall be subject to the penalties provided herein.
- (c) It is unlawful for the owner or any other Person employing or otherwise directing the operator of any Vehicle, to request or knowingly permit operation of any such Vehicle on District Property in any manner contrary to this Ordinance.

CHAPTER VII - PENALTIES

- Section 7.01. Revocation of Privileges; Fine. Any Person violating or disobeying any section or part of this Ordinance, or any other District ordinance, policy, rule, or regulation, may be forthwith evicted from District Property, may have his admission rights to District Property terminated, revoked, forfeited or suspended for the remainder of the season, and/or may, upon conviction, be fined not more than \$500.00 for each offense.
- <u>Section 7.02</u>. <u>Restitution</u>. In addition to, or instead of, the fines and penalties provided for in Section 7.01, any Person violating or disobeying any section or part of this Ordinance, or any other federal, state, local, or District law, rule, or regulation, may be required to make restitution for damage resulting from such violation(s). The provisions of the Illinois Parental Responsibility Law (740 ILCS 115/1 *et seq.*) are specifically incorporated in this Ordinance by reference for purposes of this section.
- Section 7.03. Seizure/Removal/Impoundment of Property. Any property, substance, or thing brought into, utilized, placed, or left on District Property in violation of this Ordinance, or any other District ordinance, rule, or regulation may be removed, seized, and destroyed in the case of property and substances referred to in sections 2.02, 2.03, 2.10 and 2.41, or seized and impounded in the case of any other property, substance or thing (including without limitation Vehicles and bicycles). Property so impounded shall not be returned to the owner(s) thereof until such Person(s) provides the District with acceptable proof or evidence of ownership and until such Person(s) has reimbursed the District in full for all costs and expenses to the District of such impoundment including without limitation any removal and storage charges. Property not claimed by the rightful owner(s) thereof within sixty (60) days after such impoundment may be sold by the District which shall be entitled to the entire proceeds thereof, or otherwise disposed of. Any motor Vehicles towed and/or impounded shall be disposed of according to the applicable laws of the State of Illinois.
- <u>Section 7.04.</u> <u>Non-Exclusivity of Penalties.</u> The penalties provided for in this Chapter 7 are in addition to and not exclusive of any other remedies available to the District as provided by applicable law. The penalties provided for in section 7.01 may be imposed or assessed in addition to and not necessarily in lieu of the penalties provided for in section 7.02, and vice versa.

CHAPTER VIII - REPEAL

All District ordinances, resolutions, policies, rules and regulations in conflict or inconsistent with any of the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

CHAPTER IX - SEVERABILITY

Provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed to be severable. Should any section or part of this Ordinance be declared invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining part or parts of such section and/or the other sections, as the case may be, of this Ordinance shall nevertheless be valid, binding and subsisting.

CHAPTER X - PUBLICATION AND EFFECTIVE DATE

<u>Section 10.01</u>. <u>Publication in Book Form</u>. In lieu of other publications, this Ordinance shall be published in book or pamphlet form, and when so published, shall become effective with the same force and effect as if otherwise published. Such book or pamphlet shall be received as conclusive evidence of the passage and legal publication of this Ordinance in all courts and other places without further proof of the passage and publication of this Ordinance.

<u>Section 10.02</u>. <u>Effective Date</u>. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force ten (10) days after the date of its passage, approval, and publication in book or pamphlet form as provided for herein.

Wheeling Park District Waiver and Release of All Claims

This waiver must be signed in order to register.

The Wheeling Park District is committed to conducting its recreation programs and activities in a safe manner and holds the safety of participants in high regard. The Wheeling Park District commutally strives to reduce such risks and insists that all participants follow safety rules and instructions that are designed to protect the participants' safety. However, participants and parents/guardians of minors registering for the below listed programs/arxivities must recognize that there is an inherent risk of injury when choosing to participate in recreational activities/programs.

You are solely responsible for determining if you or your minor child/ward are physically fit and/or skilled for the activities contemplated by this agreement. It is always advisable, especially if the participant is pregnant, disabled in any way or recently suffered an illness, injury or impairment, to consult a physician before undertaking any physical activity.

When using the Wheeling Park District indoor and outdoor aquatic facilities please understand and recognize that lifeguards are not responsible for providing supervision or assessing your swimming akills or that of your minor child; rather, lifeguards are responsible for enforcing safety rules and responding to emergencies. Adult pool pass holders and parents of minor pool pass holders are solely responsible for supervision of any and all activities when using these facilities. Therefore, the Wheeling Park District requires that children under 10 years of age must be supervised at all times by a responsible person, 17 years of age or older.

WARNING OF RISK
Recreational activities are intended to challenge and engage the physical, mental and
emotional resources of each participant. Despite careful and proper preparation, instruction, medical advice, conditioning and equipment, there is still a risk of serious injury
when participating in any recreational activity. Understandably, not all hazards and
dangers can be foreseen. Depending on the particular activity, participants must understand that certain risks, dangers and injuries due to inclement weather, alip and falls,
overeversion and fatigue, ignoring safety rules and instructions, collision with stationary
objects or other participants, poor skill level or conditioning, carelessness, horseplay,
unsportsmathike conduct, premises defects, madequate or defective equipment, inadequate supervision, instruction or officiating, and all other circumstances inherent to
indoor and outdoor recreational activities exist. In this regard, it must be recognized that it
is impossible for the Wheeling Park District to guarantee absolute safety.

Dependent upon a person's physical condition, age and/or skill level, aerobics and fitness activities can involve a substantial risk of the following types of injuries. This list is by no means complete, but includes some of the more common ones.

- !. Heart smack, stroke and circulatory problems 4. Shin splints
- 2. Bone and jourt insuries S.
 3. Back and neck insury 6.
- 5. Muscle strain and other muscle mysries

6. Foot problems

Swimming and other aquatic activities challenge and engage the physical, mental and emotional resources of each participant. However, despite careful and proper preparation, mstruction, medical advice, conditioning and equipment, there is still a risk of serious injury, including but not limited to drowning, head/frain injury, and spinal cord injury.



In sports we find many great stories, which may inspire us and many that make us remember what sports is all about. Lou Gehrig is considered one of the greatest baseball players of all times. His story is one which may be the greatest show of mental toughness ever. He demonstrated class throughout his career and set a great example for all young athletes to follow.



"The Babe is one fellow, and I'm another and I could never be exactly like him," Gehrig said. "I don't try. I just go on as I am in my own right."

His "own right" was an example in consistent excellence. The great pride that carried him beyond illness and injury allowed him to set one record in baseball which will probably never be broken—playing in 2,130 consecutive games.

It took a rare illness, amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (now known as Lou Gehrig's disease), to stop him in 1939. Yet, he never complained, and set an example even as he neared death.

On July 4, 1939, the Yankees honored Gehrig. On that day he said, "Fans, for the past two weeks, you have been reading about a bad break I got. Yet today, I consider myself the luckiest man on the face of the earth."

He closed his speech, saying, "I might have had a tough break, but I have an awful lot to live for."







Workout Q & A

Does running on the treadmill burn fewer calories? Will running indoors compromise my training for an upcoming marathon?

f you're running at speeds under 9 miles an hour (a very fast 6:40-minute-mile pace), treadmill running burns about the same number of calories as running outdoors," says John Porcari, Ph.D., a professor in the department of exercise and sports science at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse. But if you run faster than 9 mph, you'll burn fewer calories on the treadmill. "The difference can be up to 8 percent." Porcari says. "That's because you don't have to overcome wind resistance and because the treadmill belt does propel you along a bit."

"As for your upcoming marathon, doing a portion of your training on the treadmill is fine, and it's a smart idea on



hot, humid days. But try to do at least 60 percent of your training runs outdoors," advises veteran marathoner Mindy Solkin, owner and head coach of The Running Center in New York City. "Since there isn't a downhill mode on the treadmill, your muscles don't get used to running downhill. Also, there are no turns, so you don't get to train for making rights and lefts and going around bends."

However, if weather forces you to do more training indoors than out, take heart: Christine Clark, a runner from Anchorage, Alaska, won the 2000 women's Olympic marathon trials after doing the bulk of her training on the treadmill.




Wheeling park board race:

The Lehmann family would like to extend a HUGE thank you for participating in the Wheeling Fall Fest 5K run and 1.5 mile walk. As you are aware, the proceeds from this event are being donated to the Les Turner ALS Foundation located in Skokie, IL. The Les Turner ALS Foundation is the only independent publicly supported non-profit organization in the Chicagoarea devoted solely to the treatment and elimination of amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), better known as Lou Gehrig's disease.



Trevor Lehmann, a former Village of Wheeling trustee, was diagnosed with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) in January 2004. Since we had limited information on the disease we began researching it. The more research we did the more overwhelmed we became. Fortunately, in the course of our research we became aware of the Les Turner ALS Foundation. Not knowing what to do, we

contacted the Foundation for assistance. Immediately the staff took us under their wing -embracing us and giving us reassurance. Through the Foundation, we participated in support
groups and received information on how to access appropriate care. Although the people at the
Les Turner ALS Foundation could not make this horrible disease go away, they helped us
tremendously in coping with the disease. In addition, the Foundation staff introduced Trevor to
doctors at Northwestern's Feinberg School of Medicine who were researching ALS and who
were very experienced in treating individuals with the disease.

Trevor was a fighter, and so, he was not content to sit idly while this disease took over his life. With the help of the Foundation staff, we began an awareness campaign. Trevor and I felt that by raising awareness of what this disease was and what it could do, we could help to raise money for research and perhaps someday, a cure. For Trevor the cure did not come in time. After fighting the disease for twelve short months, Trevor lost his battle in January 2005.

Although Trevor is no longer with us, his memory and will to fight this disease live on. We continue to raise awareness and money in his honor to someday find a cure. In the meantime, the

Les Turner ALS Foundation continues to provide emotional support to our family, and continues to help many other families that are dealing with this terrible disease.

Artichoke and Olive Pizza

This feel-good recipe is based on the classic preparation from the birthplace of healthy gourmet cuisine, the Mediterranean. Though the original dish may be laden with a little extra oil and a lot more cheese, this slimmed-down version includes all that old-country flavor without the added calories. Heat oven to 450 degrees. Place pizza crust on baking sheet; top with pasta sauce, leaving a 1-inch border. Arrange artichokes and olives on top and sprinkle with cheese. Bake 15 minutes, or until cheese melts and pizza is hot.

Chocolate Angel Food Cake With Strawberry-Raspberry Sauce

The secret to a tender, high-rising angel food cake is to make sure that the beaters, mixing bowl and pan are completely free of any latent oil or grease. To do that, wipe them down with a few drops of vinegar. Also, fold in ingredients gently to reduce deflation of the egg whites.

Strawberry-Raspberry Sauce

2 cups fresh strawberries, hulled

I tablespoon granulated sugar

I cup fresh raspberries

Cake

1 cup cake flour (not self-rising) 1/2 cup unsweetened Dutch processed cocoa powder

- 12 large egg whites, at room temperature
- 1 teaspoon cream of tartar 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 1/3 cups granulated sugar
- l teaspoon vanilla extract
- l teaspoon chocolate extract

Heat oven to 325 degrees F. On a sheet of waxed paper, sift together flour and cocoa powder. In a large bowl with an electric mixer, beat egg whites on low speed until foamy. Add cream of tartar and salt and beat on high speed until soft peaks form. Add sugar, 2 tablespoons at a time, and beat until whites thicken and form soft, not dry, peaks. Sift 2 to 3 tablespoons flour mixture over egg whites and gently fold into egg mixture with a large rubber spatula. Repeat with remaining flour mixture until completely incorporated. Fold in vanilla and chocolate extracts. Spoon the batter into an ungreased 10-inch tube pan. Tap pan lightly on counter to eliminate any air bubbles. Bake 45 to 50 minutes, or until cake springs back when touched. Let cool upside down by inverting pan onto the neck of a bottle. Meanwhile, prepare strawberry-raspberry sauce. In a food processor or blender, puree the berries and sugar with 2 tablespoons water until mixture is smooth. Strain through a sieve into a bowl, pushing down with a spoon to release all the juice; discard seeds. Serve with cake. Makes 12 Servings.

Letter From the Trainer



Club Etiquette by Hank Dennis, ACE-Certified Personal Trainer

Proper etiquette should be exercised for working out at a fitness facility. Following proper etiquette while working out will ensure a pleasurable experience for all guests of the facility.

Dumbbells and plates should always be placed back on the appropriate weight rack after you are finished with the equipment. It ensures that guests don't have to hunt around for the weights, and it climinates some of the clutter which could cause a potential accident or injury.

Cell phones are not allowed in the fitness center. The noise of cell phone conversations is distracting to other and often people who are talking on their phones are not fully aware of what is occurring in their surroundings. This could lead to a potential accident or injury. If you must talk on your phone you should leave the workout area and talk in the lobby area.

If you are performing "super-sets" (one exercise performed immediately after another without any rest in between) or working out in a group, please allow other guests to "work in" between sets. "Working in" means that after an individual is done with his/her set of exercise he/she should allow the next guest to use the equipment for one set. The two individuals can then take alternating turns until one or both have completed their sets. Since muscles require rest between sets to replenish their energy supply, "working in" is a perfect way to allow that much needed rest for the muscles and ensure more effective workout results.

Weights should be lifted under control and not banged into each other during a set. Banging the weights together is dangerous in many ways. Metal chips can fly off the equipment and onto guests' skin or in their eyes. The noise of banging weights is also distracting to others who are concentrating on their workouts. Banging together weights creates a shock wave to the joint in question (ex: banging together dumbbells when the arms extend during a chest press sends a shockwave force down into the shoulder and other joints which could potentially be damaging).

Following these simple rules of club etiquette will ensure a safe and pleasurable experience for all patrons.

Weight Loss O & A

Q. Most of my friends are heavier after childbirth than before getting pregnant. Celebrities, on the other hand, seem to regain their pre-pregnancy shape very soon after giving birth. How are some women able to lose weight so quickly?

A. Don't compare yourself to photographs of celebrities. "Magazine photos can be very deceiving," says Richard Frieder, M.D., an obstetrician/gynecologist at Santa Monica-UCLA Medical Center and a clinical instructor at the UCLA School of Medicine in Los Angeles.

Even under the best circumstances, it typically takes at least six months for a woman to get her body back after childbirth. According to Frieder, the women who are most likely to return to their pre-pregnancy shape - or close to it - are those who are not overweight prior to pregnancy, who don't gain more than 10 pounds in the first 20 weeks of pregnancy or more than 20 pounds in the last 20 weeks, and who exercise almost daily (for at least 30 minutes) before and during pregnancy. "Your habits before and during pregnancy make a big difference." Frieder says. Exercising after pregnancy, as soon as you're cleared by your doctor, is also important, as is watching how much and what you eat.


O. No matter what exercise program I do, my body fat composition stays the same and my muscles just get bigger. I quit lifting weights and now alternate running and powerwalking almost daily for 30 minutes, but it's not working, Would I burn more fat if I tried something less strenuous, like very long, slow walks? What is the secret to burning fat without gaining muscle?

A. "It's a myth that if you train at a lower intensity, you'll burn more fat," says Dale Huff, R.D., C.S.C.S., a fitness trainer and nutritionist in St. Louis and a spokesman for the American Council on Exercise. "What you want to focus on is burning more calories." The only "secret" to losing fat is to create a calorie deficit - in other words, to burn more calories than you consume. Along with boosting the number of calories you burn through exercise (by working out longer or harder), you may need to reduce the number of calories you're eating. You can estimate your current calorie intake by entering the foods you eat into the U.S. Department of Agriculture's nutrient database. www.nal.usda.gov/fnic/cgi-bin/nut_search.p.l. The database can also tell you the amount of fat, protein and carbohydrates, as well as important nutrients, in the food you're eating.

In addition, Huff recommends resuming your weight training. If you do one set per muscle group and 10-12 repetitions per set, you're not likely to develop significantly larger muscles. However, a program like this will help you maintain the muscle you already have, which is crucial for fat loss. "If you start losing muscle, your metabolism will slow down," Huff says.







PROS Consulting Hired to Develop Parks and Recreation Comprehensive Plan

The Wheeling Park District Board of Commissioners has entered into an agreement with PROS Consulting LLC to develop a Park and Recreation Comprehensive Plan. This Plan will serve as a guide for the Board and staff to make decisions that best serve the long-term park and recreation needs of the community.

The goals of the Park and Recreation Comprehensive Plan are to:

- Assist the Park District in determining and prioritizing where to invest resources with regard to recreation services, maintaining current facilities, and park improvements.
- Assist the Park District in determining best land use and land management practices.
- Assist the Park District in determining what recreation programs and services should be
 offered and evaluating those that should be discontinued.
- Evaluate the Park District's current open space, indoor recreation space, and recreation services compared to community needs and current standards and trends.
- Provide guidelines for future planning and updates to the Park and Recreation Comprehensive Plan.

In August of 2005, Leisure Vision of Olathe, Kansas completed a Community Attitude and Interest Citizen Survey (CAIS) to help establish priorities for the future development of parks and recreation facilities, programs and services within the community. This document was undertaken as the first step to assist the Park District in developing a Park and Recreation Comprehensive Plan. Prior to finalizing the needs assessment, the Wheeling Park District went through a process to revise its mission statement to better reflect and articulate its purpose. This process instilled a sense of a common purpose, identified shared organizational values and established a set of key, strategic initiatives that provide and aligned course of direction in meeting the Park District's mission.

Upon revising the mission, completing the needs assessment and evaluating community input, the Park District's first vision statement was created. The vision provides direction for what the Park District is working to achieve in the future, while continuing to meet its mission. The Park and Recreation Comprehensive Plan and the associated documents are integral to achieving the Park District's vision over the next five to seven years. The plan will serve as a strategic guide in assisting staff and Board to make decisions that best serve the long-term park and recreation needs of the community.

PROS Consulting is charged with considering the results of the CAIS, the Needs Assessment, the Vision, and the available financial resources in meeting the goals of the Park and Recreation Comprehensive Plan.

The Parks and Recreation Comprehensive Plan is on schedule to be completed in the spring of 2007 and will guide staff in developing park and recreation experiences for all Park District residents and provides long-range direction for open space and facility improvements.

The results of that study guided the Park District in crafting its Vision. In the future, additional community surveys will be performed to measure the Park District's effectiveness in achieving its Vision.

"As a people-driven organization, the Wheeling Park District is committed to fulfill its mission every day in everything we do," said Executive Director Jan Buchs. "And by concentrating efforts in the areas of focus, the Park District will ultimately achieve its Vision."

This year's partnership with the family and friends of Matthew Claver lends added importance to the 2006 Wheeling Park District Fall Fest "4-Claver" 5K Run/Walk.

In December of 2005, Wheeling High School sophomore, and Wheeling Park District employee, Matthew Claver, was diagnosed with brain cancer. Wheeling Park District Community Attitude and Interest Survey

The Wheeling Park District conducted a Community Attitude and Interest Survey this past summer to establish priorities for the future development of parks and recreation facilities, programs, and services within the community. The survey was designed to obtain statistically valid results from households within the Wheeling Park District boundaries and adjacent areas in the villages of Prospect Heights and Buffalo Grove. The survey was administered by a combination of mail and phone.

Leisure Vision, a division of ETC Institute that specializes in conducting market research and analysis for the parks and recreation industry, worked extensively with Wheeling Park District officials and residents of the Wheeling Park District in the development of the survey questionnaire. These efforts included a series of stakeholder interviews and focus groups with Wheeling Park District residents and Wheeling Park District officials, in addition to a public forum for Wheeling Park District residents held April 13 and April 14, 2005. This work allowed the survey to be tailored to issues of strategic importance to the community.

In June of 2005, surveys were mailed to a random sample of 2,003 households within the Wheeling Park District boundaries and the adjacent areas. Approximately three days after the surveys were mailed, each survey recipient received an electronic voice message

reminder to complete the survey. Additionally, about two weeks after the surveys were mailed, Leisure Vision began contacting households by phone. either to encourage comple-Assessment tion of the mailed survey or to administer the survey by phone.

The goal was to obtain 500 completed surveys, with at least 425 of those from residents of the Wheeling Park District. The final tally of 516 completed surveys included 442 from Wheeling Park District residents. The random sample of 516 households resulted in a 95% level of confidence with a precision of at least +/-4.3%. The results


of the random sample of 442 Park District households have a 95%


level of confidence with a precision of at least +/-4.7%.

The results of the survey finalized the comprehensive report that Leisure Vision presented to the Board of Commissioners on September 6, 2005. This report will be one of several components utilized in preparing the Wheeling Park District's Strategic Plan 2006-2009.

Chevy Chase Annexation Update

The Wheeling Park District Board of Commissioners would like to take this opportunity to clear up any misconceptions regarding the annexation of the Chevy Chase clubhouse and a portion of the golf course by the Village of Buffalo Grove and to provide an update on the continuing efforts to reverse this action.

The Chevy Chase property belongs to the residents of the Wheeling Park District. The Park Board considers the annexation an act of disrespect to the Park District and its residents who worked so diligently to support the initial purchase and subsequent renovation. The Chevy Chase clubhouse and Traditions golf course are, and will remain, owned and operated by the Wheeling Park District. The Park Board continues to pursue an outcome that results in disconnection from the Village of Buffalo Grove of the property that was annexed involuntarily in March of 2004. Whether that success comes through a lawsuit, or through an agreement formed outside the court system, the Park District Board maintains that it has a responsibility to protect and preserve this asset for the future and to uphold Chevy Chase's Wheeling identity. It is important for Park District residents to understand that the only way this annexation could have been prevented was for the Village of Buffalo Grove not to have taken such action in the first place. Since it has occurred, the Park District has disputed their action vehemently in order to disconnect the property.

The following is a summary of the Park District's disconnection efforts to date. This information is current as of April 19, 2005.

March 15, 2004: The Village Trustees of Buffalo Grove voted to involuntarily annex the Chevy Chase clubhouse and a portion of the golf course into the Village of Buffalo Grove at the regularly scheduled board meeting. The Wheeling Park District was given no notice of any impending annexation action and became aware of the situation through the newspaper account the following day.

March 16, 2004: The Park Board began working with legal counsel to evaluate the legal rights of the Park District and to consider every alternative to disconnect the property.

August 31, 2004: The Park District submitted a petition to the Village of Buffalo Grove Board of Trustees requesting disconnection of the property from Buffalo Grove.

No response from the Village of Buffalo Grove Trustees.

October 7, 2004: The Park District submitted a petition to the Lake County Circuit Court requesting disconnection of the property from the Village of Buffalo Grove.

Litigation is ongoing.

November 24, 2004: The Park District filed a lawsuit challenging the legal authority of the Village of Buffalo Grove to annex the Chevy Chase property.

Litigation is ongoing.

March 2005: The Wheeling Park District received Buffalo Grove's Village News, dated March/April 2005. The publication presented the Village of Buffalo Grove Goals for 2005, as declared by Village President Elliott Hartstein. One of the goals specifically cited by President Hartstein is to "Work toward long term comprehensive resolution of land use and annexation conflicts with neighboring communities and taxing bodies..."; another is to "Evaluate and implement new avenues for intergovernmental cooperation with Park District and other taxing bodies to enhance benefits for the community at large."

Park District Commissioners took this public statement as an overture to open a dialogue between the two Boards to work towards a resolution of the Chevy Chase annexation conflict. Representatives of the Wheeling Park District Board and Village of Buffalo Grove Board met with the explicit intent to explore opportunities that would resolve the annexation conflict outside of the court system and lead to improved intergovernmental relations between the agencies.

Unfortunately, at this time, the Park District is unable to report any resolution resulting from this meeting.

The Wheeling Park District will continue to appeal to the Village of Buffalo Grove Trustees' integrity and their genuine desire to improve intergovernmental relations and enhance benefits for the community-at-large. The Park District is responding with viable solutions to the annexation conflict in the hope that this resolution may take place outside the court system and in a more cost-efficient manner.

It is imperative to reiterate that the Wheeling Park District Board pledges to uphold its responsibility to its residents to nurture and protect Park District assets and maintain Chevy Chase's valuable Wheeling identity. Again, the Park Board will only accept an outcome that results in disconnection of the property that was annexed involuntarily on March 15, 2004, by the Village of Buffalo Grove.

This is the result of the Wheeling Park District signing a three-year agreement with the Dr. Pepper/Seven Up Bottling Group-Midwest Division to be the exclusive non-alcoholic beverage provider to the Park District. As the #1 independent soft drink and non-alcoholic beverage bottler in America, Dr. Pepper/Seven Up Bottling Group will offer Park District guests the #1 or #2 brand in almost every flavor category. From the Executive Director

Dear Residents:

The Board of Commissioners recently approved the Wheeling Park District's 2004 budget in the amount of \$15,631,626. This figure includes operating expenses of \$11,755,023, \$3,268,182 in debt service, and \$608,421 for capital improvements. The 2004 budget reflects the Park District's aim to continue to build and strengthen internal structure, while improving the efficiency of existing operations.

Representative of this effort is the amount budgeted for capital improvements in 2004. With the golf course renovation and addition to the Aquatic Center completed, this year's capital improvement budget is significantly less than previous years when the Park District was developing new, and improving existing, facilities. The 2004 budget indicates a conservative approach to capital projects, while concentrating on increasing community awareness and communications, maintaining existing assets, and improving efficiency of services.

The Park District is challenged by the inability to access additional tax dollars despite the fact that basic facility maintenance and personnel costs continue to rise. To illustrate this point, consider that the 2003 Park District tax rate is estimated at 52.8 cents per \$100 of equalized assessed valuation (EAV). In comparison, the 1997 Park District tax rate was 62.3 cents per \$100 of equalized assessed valuation. The Park District tax rates have been on a downward

trend since the Illinois Property Tax Limitation Act went into effect in 1995. This law caps the increase in the Park District levy at the Consumer Price Index (CPI). Even with EAV increases outpacing the CPI increase each year, no additional revenue becomes available to the Park District. In fact, the total levy allowed by law funds only 34 percent of the Park District's overall budget. The balance is made up by facility and program user fees, donations and sponsorships.

Despite the realities of tax rate limitations, the Park District is committed to continuing to provide our guests with a high level of quality services and experiences. We persist in our efforts to explore alternative revenue sources such as advertising and increased sponsorships to assist in supporting our operations and reducing expenses where we can.

One of the improvements you will see in 2004 is a new user-friendly website. This website will improve communication between Park District staff and our guests, enhance on-line services, and increase overall awareness of services and programs. Immediate improvements already have been made to the website, and staff projects the complete new site to be up early this summer.

Another initiative slated for 2004 is the development of a Comprehensive Master Plan for the Park District. The purpose of the Master Plan is to provide direction and a course of action for the Park District's future. As a people-driven organization,

Park District Adds New Lightning Detection Equipment

As always, the Wheeling Park District will continue to watch the skies and weather reports and take prudent action when the threat of serious storms, lightning, or actual strikes are observed. This year the district has added a lightning prediction and warning siren system to Traditions at Chevy Chase and has added handheld lightning detectors at Heritage Park and the Aquatic Center.

The handheld lightning detectors are meant to provide notice of approaching lightning storms to guests at the Aquatic Center as well as participants in day camp and athletic programs held in and around Heritage Park. Field supervisors, when alerted to an approaching lightning storm by the handheld detector, will clear athletics fields and surrounding areas and camp counselors will lead day camp participants indoors to safety.

At Chevy Chase a state-of-the-art lightning prediction and warning system was installed in July to protect golfers from lightning hazards. A lightning hazard in this area will be signaled with one long siren blast and golfers must clear the course and seek appropriate shelter inside a building or vehicle. Golfers will be alerted by three short siren blasts when conditions are safe to return to play.

For your safety, it is important that you recognize and understand these warnings. Notices will be distributed to all recreation program participants and will be posted at the Aquatic Center and at Chevy Chase. Public information sessions regarding these lightning warning systems will occur later this year. For further information, call 847-465-7679.

Wheeling Park District Community Attitude and Interest Survey

The Wheeling Park District conducted a Community Attitude and Interest Survey this past winter to establish priorities for the future development of parks and recreation facilities, programs, and services within the community. Administered by a combination of mail and phone, the survey was designed to obtain statistically valid results from households within the Wheeling Park District boundaries.

Park District officials developed the survey questionnaire in consultation with Leisure Vision. This collaboration allowed the survey to be tailored to issues of strategic importance to the future of the District. A division of ETC Institute, Leisure Vision specializes in conducting market research and analysis for the parks and recreation industry.

Surveys were mailed to a random sample of 2500 households throughout the Wheeling Park District. The goal of at least 500 completed surveys was far exceeded with a final total of 592 surveys completed. The results of the random sample of 592 households have a 95 percent level of confidence with a precision of at least +/-4.0%.


And the Survey Says ...

The survey covered 28 separate categories pertaining to respondents' recreation and park usage and preferences. Here are a few of the highlights:

- 60 percent of households visited Wheeling Park District parks during the past year and 88 percent of those households rated the physical condition of the parks as either "excellent" (32%) or "good" (56%)
- Parks visited by the highest percentage of households: Heritage Park,
 Childerley Park, and Chamber Park
- Facilities used most during the past 12 months: CRC (50%), Aquatic Center (40%), and the Arctic Splash (31%)
- Sports fields and recreation facilities rated most important: Indoor swimming pool (37%), indoor fitness and exercise facilities (37%), outdoor aquatic center (34%), and indoor recreation centers (31%)
- Most important parks and items: Walking and biking trails (54%), small neighborhood parks (28%), large community parks (25%), and nature areas/wildlife habitats (23%)
- 32 percent of households participated in Wheeling Park District programs during the past 12 months and 93 percent rated the quality of the programs as either "excellent" (47%) or "good" (46%).
- Recreation programs needed by the highest percentage of households: Fitness and wellness (51%), community special events (39%), adult programs (30%), and water fitness programs (25%)
- Recreation programs participated in most often: Fitness and wellness programs (19%), community special events (12%), and youth sports programs (10%)
- Most frequently mentioned way respondents learn about Wheeling Park District programs and activities: Wheeling Park District Program Guide (86%)

- Organizations used most often for parks and recreation programs and services: Wheeling Park District (45%), Indian Trails Library (40%), schools (19%), and churches (15%)
- Improvements that received the most support: Developing new walking/biking trails and connecting existing trails (84%) and upgrading existing neighborhood parks (77%)

- Most important benefits provided by the Wheeling Park District: Improve physical health and fitness (47%), make Wheeling a more desirable place to live (39%), increase property values in Wheeling (32%), and help reduce crime (30%)
- 66 percent of households are either very satisfied (29%) or somewhat satisfied (37%) with the overall value their household receives from the Wheeling Park District.







Background/Analysis

The Village of Wheeling is currently working with Christopher B. Burke Engineering on a project to stabilize the Buffalo Creek stream bank in Wheeling. As presented to the Board of Commissioners in September of 2007, the first phase of the project will impact the stream bank in Childerley Park. At the same time, staff met with the Village of Wheeling Engineering Staff to discuss project access and construction staging. Based on that discussion, the Village of Wheeling prepared Easement Agreements as follows:

- Permanent Easement for Creek Maintenance.
- Temporary Easement for Construction Staging.
- Temporary Site Access Agreement to get to the staging area.
- Temporary Site Access Agreement to get from the staging area to the west side of the pedestrian bridge.
- Temporary Sign Easement to place a construction sign on the site.

The form of the document has been reviewed and was found to be acceptable by the Park District's legal counsel. It is anticipated that the Board of Trustees will take action on this item at the Village meeting on August 4, 2008. At the August 5, 2008 meeting of the Park Board, staff will distribute the resolution in its final format to the Board of Commissioners and provide additional information regarding the location and uses of the various easements.

Staff is recommending that the resolution granting the easements to the Village of Wheeling be approved.

Background/Analysis

In January of 2008, staff completed a Chevy Chase Country Club parking lot concept that was subsequently presented to the Board of Commissioners for discussion and approval. The completed concept proposed a total of 290 parking spaces (283 spaces + 7 handicap spaces). This amount was a reduction from the current 319 spaces available after construction of the new sign.

Over the course of the next four months, staff worked with Manhard Consulting to engineer the proposed design and increase the number of spaces if possible to accommodate the heavy usage as identified by Chevy Chase staff.

In May of 2008, it was determined that number of spaces could not be increased within the proposed design and the needs of the facility required more parking than the proposed amount. To meet the parking demands, staff developed a revised concept that not only matched the current parking spaces but also kept the design intent and vehicular flow of the original conceptual plan. Staff will present the new design, which has received approval from the Lake County Department of Planning, to the Board of Commissioners.

Background/Analysis

In response to a sink hole developing within Chevy Chase Drive adjacent to Chevy Chase Country Club, the Village of Buffalo Grove conducted a TV inspection of the sanitary sewer line south of the Country building crossing Chevy Chase Drive and extending to the residences on the south side of the street.

The Director of Public Works for the Village of Buffalo Grove informed Park District staff that the sink hole was cause by a sagging in the pipe south of the sink hole location. Although a portion of the sanitary sewer line was replaced as part of the Chevy Chase Country Club renovation project, the area of the sink hole and the sagging pipe is the original piping installed many years ago. Park District staff was further informed that it is the responsibility of the Park District to remedy this condition.

Staff has spoken to the Village of Buffalo Grove and will update the Board of Commissioners on the discussion as well as the plan to repair current condition.

Background/Analysis

On October 6, the Administration Committee gave its support to post the Proposed Supplemental Budget and Appropriation Ordinance at the CRC (and on the website) for a minimum of 30 days so that the Board could vote on the ordinance at the November 17, 2009, meeting. Subsequent to that meeting, staff has become aware of a number of items that would materially impact the budget.

As a result, staff believes that it would be in the best interest of the District to remove the previously posted Ordinance and replace it with one that more accurately reflects known, or likely, activity. Attached to this memorandum is a copy of the previously issued memorandum, which lists all of the recommended amendments to the approved 2009 Budget. That list will stay the same, with the following adjustments:

1. Recreation Fund (Fund 2):

- a. Staff is recommending that the sealing and caulking of the stairs leading up to the cave at the Family Aquatic Center be completed in 2009. Staff had originally planned to complete this project in 2010. The cost of this project is \$12,000, and is under account 520400 (Contractual Services).
- b. Staff is recommending that the underground leaks recently detected at Tsunami Splash be repaired in 2009. This project was also originally slated for 2010. The cost of this project is \$10,000, and is under account 530800 (Maintenance and Repairs).

2. Capital Projects Fund (Fund 26)

- a. Staff had anticipated that the District would receive a grant in 2009. Staff now believes that this is unlikely to happen. The anticipated amount of \$3.6 million dollars has been removed from the budget. The potential grant will be included in the 2010 budget.
- b. Staff had anticipated that the District would acquire property at a cost of \$1.5 million in 2009. This acquisition is unlikely to occur in 2009. The potential acquisition will be included in the 2010 budget.

3. Capital Projects Fund – Bonds (Fund 31)

a. Staff has recognized the need to include a change order for \$22,800 to complete the Chevy Chase parking lot project. Additionally, engineering and permit fees totaling \$8,335 (not initially included in this total) will be added to the budget. The total impact is \$31,135.

ORDINANCE 2009-G OF THE WHEELING PARK DISTRICT BOARD OF PARK COMMISSIONERS

SUPPLEMENTAL BUDGET AND APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE

RE: AN ORDINANCE CREATING A SUPPLEMENTAL COMBINED ANNUAL BUDGET AND APPROPRIATION OF FUNDS NECESSARY TO DEFRAY ALL NECESSARY EXPENSES AND LIABILITIES OF THE WHEELING PARK DISTRICT, COOK AND LAKE COUNTIES, ILLINOIS, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING JANUARY 1, 2009 AND ENDING DECEMBER 31, 2009, AND SPECIFYING THE OBJECTS AND PURPOSE FOR WHICH SUCH APPROPRIATIONS ARE MADE, AND THE AMOUNT APPROPRIATED FOR EACH OBJECT OR PURPOSE.

WHEREAS, The Board of Park Commissioners of the Wheeling Park District, Cook and Lake Counties, Illinois, caused to be prepared in tentative form a supplemental Budget and Appropriation Ordinance, and the Secretary of the Board has made the same conveniently available for public inspection for at least thirty (30) days prior to final action thereon; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held as to such a Budget and Appropriation Ordinance on the 15th day of December 2009 and notice of said hearing was given at least one week prior thereto as required by law, and all other legal requirements have been complied with;

- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Park Commissioners of the Wheeling Park District, Cook and Lake Counties, State of Illinois as follows:
- Section 1. A sum of money in the total amount of sixteen million four hundred thirty-nine thousand fifty-nine dollars (\$16,439,059), or as much thereof as may be authorized by law, be and the same is hereby budgeted, and that the sum of money in the total amount of eighteen million, eighty-two thousand, three hundred eighty-nine dollars (\$18,082,389), or as much thereof as may be authorized by law, be and the same is hereby appropriated for the corporate purposes of the Wheeling Park District, as herein specified, for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2009 and ending December 31, 2009.



All receipts and revenue not specifically appropriated, and all unexpended balances from preceding fiscal years not required for the purpose for which they were appropriated and levied shall constitute the Corporate Fund and shall be placed to the credit of such fund.

Section 5. All ordinances, or parts of ordinances, conflicting with any of the provisions of this Ordinance and the same are hereby modified or repealed. If any item or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of such item, or the remainder of this Ordinance.

Section 6. This Ordinance is not intended or required to be in support of or in relation to any tax levy made by the Park District during the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2009 and ending December 31, 2009, or any other fiscal year.

Section 7. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption, as provided by law. A certified copy of the Ordinance shall be filed with the County Clerks of Cook and Lake Counties, Illinois, together with the Certificate of the Chief Fiscal Officer of the Park District certifying revenues by source anticipated to be received by the Park District, within thirty (30) days after its passage and approval, as provided by law.
