The owners of a family-run Vheeling supermarket that was estroyed by fire said Sunday hey are not sure whether they rill try to reopen the store else-

Elaine Kumkoski, who ran ranklin Finer Foods at Dundee load and Milwaukee Avenue vith her husband, son and aughter, said she and her famivare still numb about the blaze. "It was just such a shock," lumkoski said. "But we've still

ot our family — we've still got ach other."

The fire apparently started bout 9:30 a.m. Friday when a tack of plastic foam boxes in he meat department hit a ceilng light fixture and sparked, vitnesses said, but Wheeling ire officials said Sunday they ad not yet determined the ause.

Firefighters from 19 departnents assisted in battling the blaze and preventing it from spreading to other stores in the shopping center.

One store employee was treated for smoke inhalation, fire officials said, but no one was seri-

ously injured.

Wheeling fire officials said the store is a total loss. Damage is estimated at \$750,000. The Kumkoskis leased the building.

Although members of the Niles family have not yet been allowed to enter the remains of the store and survey the damage for themselves, many friends and customers have offered to aid in the cleanup of the store, Kumkoski said.

She attributes their helpfulness to the close relationships the Kumkoskis shared with many of their customers in the five years they owned the

store.

"We got to know a lot of them as friends," she said. "It was different than shopping at Jewel or Dominick's. The big stores just don't have that personal touch."
