A. R. McIntyre was voted Wheeling's choice last Tuesday in the heated election race for Village President. Mac, raised a total of 558 votes nosing out his nearest opponent, Ed Gieseke, who carried 373. Weiflin followed with a total of 216 votes and Cargill garnered 194. Mac was ahead from the start and steadily built up his lead of 185 votes. All of those on McIntyre's United Citizens ticket came out ahead except Dickey, who was edged out by Kastner, a candidate on the Gieseke ticket.

Charge 2 Officials In Bribery Plot

Wheeling Trustees, Hotel Owner Freed in \$2,000 Bond

Two Wheeling village trustees and a Wheeling hotel owner have been charged in an alleged bribery conspiracy.

The three were freed on \$2,000 bond each Tuesday after their arrest Monday night.

Complaints against them

were signed Monday by Frank J. Budnick, operator of the Wheeling Building Trust, a contracting firm.

HE TOLD Eldred Benz, assistant state's attorney, he paid a \$1,210 hotel bill for a village election victory party held April 24, 1959.

Budnick said that after he paid the bill, the village board approved his request to alter street requirements for a subdivision his firm is building at Wolf and Dundee rds.

The trustees — Edward Gleseke Jr., former village president, and Fred L. Cargill—were charged with conspiracy to take a bribe and taking the bribe.

Frank J. Miramonti, partner in the Union hotel, 124 S. Milwaukee, Wheeling, was charged with conspiracy.

BUDNICK, of 8110 Knox, Skokie, said one of his employes paid the \$1,210 to the

hotel by check Oct. 9, Benz

said.

Benz said the employe was given a receipt for the money that said the payment was for a party given by Budnick.

But, Benz said, Budnick had not given any party and the money went to pay for the victory party.

At the time the bill was paid,

Benz said, Budnick was seeking village board approval to use gravel instead of macadam in street bases in the subdivision.

GIESEKE, of 295 E. Walnut, and Cargill, of 167 S. Milwaukee, both in Wheeling, denied the charges.



It seems incredible, but it's true.

At a time when Wheeling Consolidated School District 21 is faced with critical problems of expansion and finance that concern every parent and taxpayer in the area, school board candidates are finding it almost impossible to present their views and qualifications to the public.

To cite one case in particular, a candidate with a background of study and work in the educational field and with a number of interesting comments to make regarding possible solutions for local school problems, last week requested a hearing before Wheeling's two largest homeowners' groups and the Parent-Teachers association.

The net result of his attempt to gain public audience for his school views was a promise of two minutes before at the Community Presbyterian the PTA.

It hardly needs to be pointed out that two minutes before one group is not enough time for a man of ideas to get his ideas across. Not only is this unfair to candidates seeking election, but it is unfair to the voting public which is charged with the responsibility of selectin the best possible educational leadership at the polls April 13.

Why supposedly school-conscious homeowners' groups and the PTA haven't reserved program time in advance to hear the views of school board candidates, we don't know. And why these groups didn't send special invitations to candidates to attend their meetings, we don't know.

But the fact is that an important school board election will be held in just three weeks. And the fact is that there are at least five candidates in the race for the board's two vacancies.

With the threat of double shifts hanging over Wheeling school, with subdivider E. A. Herzog holding a school IOU for \$45,000 for a school site, with an enrollment constantly on the rise, with the school already \$17,000 in debt to pay teacher salaries into May and with new homes going up within the village daily without donated money or dedicated land to help pay costs of educating the pupils yet to move here, we would say that it is of the utmost importance that the best possible candidates be elected to the board.

The district needs school board talent like it never needed it before.

And yet the public is not being given a chance to make an intelligent choice.

We hope that some group, perhaps even the school board, will arrange a public meeting where all candidates may freely express themselves and where voters may obtain useful information that will help make for intelligent voting in this important election.

Just Give Me The Facts -Mister!

CURTAIL INDUSTRIAL GROWTH ? Wheeling Flooded? Why Vote Straight? One Legged Government? Bankrupt School System? Buggywhips For Automobiles? No Water In My Fire Mydrant? Common Sense Action CHUCKHOLES IN THE STREETS? PIECEMEAL FINANCING COSTS MORE Health Epidemic Expected? NOT EVERYONE PAYS WATER BILLS ? Extra Taxes For Court Judgements?

Ues - get worried - turn the lights on bright voters! It's getting darker outside!

Do you want to base your vote on bushels of campaign promises or specific facts? Shouldn't you vote on the basis of things that affect your home, your streets, your children, your whole community — not only for today, but also "tomorrow?"

WHEELING FLOODED?

Where there once were farms now subdivisions grow. Wheeling farms soaked up much water before the excess storm water drained through the Wheeling drainage ditch to the Des Plaines River. A subdivision's homes and streets do not soak up water which now will flow too rapidly into a drainage ditch choked with overgrown trees. Yet the drainage district has sole jurisdiction and our village today is powerless. Nothing has been done or will be done. A good storm will flood some of us out! Do you really care?

SOLUTION: Wrest authority away from the original but inactive drainage commission, clean out the ditch, repair storm sewers, find the answers before the Red Cross comes to help Wheeling families!

BANKRUPT SCHOOL SYSTEM?

Our consolidated school district covers a much larger area than the village itself. It even extends beyond planning commission control over 1½ miles outside village limits. Ripe rumors hint that over 1000 homes may be built inside the school district but outside village control. Children from such a developement would swamp our school system yet an irresponsible contractor would probably provide no money or other aid. It's happened elsewhere and it can happen to us. When those children knock on our school door, it will be too late!

SOLUTION: Work closely with Cook County agencies so Wheeling authorities can be alerted in time to present a united front to prevent county approval and resultant sale of such homes.

ONE-LEGGED GOVERNMENT?

It may be comfortably old-fashioned to hang the bills on a large nail, but Wheeling is not a small country grocery store anymore. Other villages have advisory and administrative assistance from a planning commission, zoning board, board of local improvements, playground and recreation commission, health department (with doctors), Library commission, public works commission for sewer, water, lighting and garbage disposal. Wheeling hobbles along with one leg — its new planning commission. Such agencies are necessary to efficient government!

CHUCK-HOLES IN THE STREETS?

Do you really believe that the sub-surface of roads in Dunhurst and elsewhere conform to specifications? If so, why all the holes that are beginning to knock dollars worth of rubber off your auto tires? Why should it be necessary to pour more money continually into filling up such holes. Our roads should have been built right!

SOLUTION: Have the village engineer make perodic tests to check on conformity with tough regulations so Wheeling secures good roads from now on.

COMMONSENSE ACTION?

Without providing land, school buildings and financial aid no contractor should be permitted to build homes in Wheeling today! The only effective weapon your village could have to deter new construction by irresponsible builders is a tough building code. We don't have one now. We could have one in 60 days.

SOLUTION: Secure the National Building Code and get formal approval by the Village Board. This would give city planners real police control over unrestricted and unbalanced growth which is the cause of most of our present problems.

BUGGYWHIPS FOR AUTOMOBILES?

All political candidates agree that our ordinances and laws should be brought up-to-date today! But this action would make them obsolete by tomorrow. A buggywhip is out of date today!

SOLUTION: Draw up all ordinances on the basis of tomorrows needs after studying trends and projecting available facts into our future needs.

EXTRA TAXES FOR COURT JUDGEMENTS

Village records are so inadequate that they can't even be audited. Here's why this is important to you. Suppose a contractor sued the village for \$300,000 and no records could be produced in defense of the village. You and I would have to pay the court judgement through a special tax levy.

SOLUTION: Wake up and get proper records set up immediately!

NOT EVERYONE PAYS WATER BILLS ?

You're paying your neighbors water bill right now! Not everyone in Wheeling has a water meter! Also, its possible that thousands of dollars of water leak out of our water pipes each year! How do we know? The village of Brookfield saved \$30,000 in the first year by repairing leaks and similar actions! If five per cent of the Wheeling citizens now get free water, then your bill is five per cent too high!

SOLUTION: Survey our records and our water system so that everyone pays a fair share and no water is lost!

CURTAIL INDUSTRIAL GROWTH?

Other parties recognize the need for more industry to lower our taxes but increase our tax income. But, most importantly industrial tax money is needed to bail out our school system. We plan to do something about it. To attract industry of the right type to Wheeling you must provide roads, water, sewers and an invitation. We must exercise a public relations movement to tell industry that our land costs less than half that of comparable land elsewhere. Letters should be sent to property sales engineers and ex-

panding industries. A large plant was lost because of Wheeling's complacency recently. Can we afford that mistake again?

HEALTH EPIDEMIC EXPECTED?

Septic tank systems on Edgebrook Drive have resulted in one case of hepatitis already! Yet the sewer pipes lay on the ground month after month.

SOLUTION: A special committee should secure crash legislation to complete the sewer system so that the health hazzard doesn't endanger our whole village! Also, are we paying off the sewer bonds promptly as they fall due — thereby saving interest money? A complete course of action can be secured on this in 30 days!

NO WATER IN MY FIRE HYDRANT?

Sure, there is, and if a Dunhurst house caught on fire, water could be pumped out of that hydrant for a full two minutes! Just hope your fire could be put out in that time.

SOLUTION: Install three more pumps to bring water pressure up to what it should be.

PIECEMEAL FINANCING COSTS MORE?

Any businessman or home owner knows the value of being able to borrow money when necessary. Yet there is a limit to the amount anyone can borrow. The village supply of bonding power is also limited and precious money should be spent where it is most needed! Are streets more necessary than a village hall? Are recreation facilities more important than a larger fire department? What about drainage?

No one would buy a house but neglect to plant grass. Neither should a village acquire 5,000 people overnight without arranging to care for them by using long range bonding power instead of short range crisis financing! We're tired of hearing "Close your eyes, men, and they'll all go away!"

SOLUTION: Survey tomorrow's needs and obtain proper financing to secure maximum community benefits at low cost. Remember, the people through a referendum vote will decide whether to finance or not to finance. But, who'll give you the chance to decide?
